BRITAIN TO RETAIN CONTROL OF EGYPT'S FOREIGN AFFAIRS

Otherwise Independence Will Be Granted--When General Plan is Approved Treaty Will Be Negotiated.

Washington, Aug. 27.—The proposed new relationship between Great Britain and Egypt, growing out of conferences in London between Lord Milner's mission and Egyptian representatives, was described here today as relatively the same as that existing between the United States and Cuba. Should the plan be accepted and be made effective by treaty, as proposed, it was said Great Britain would retain control of Egyptian foreign affairs and guarantees would be required for protection of the Suez Canal; but

otherwise the Egyptians would be independent.

A statement issued today at the British embassy said that "certain heads of agreement" had been reached during the London conferences and were awaiting approval both by the British government and the Egyptian people. When the general plan is approved, it added, the next step will be the negotiation of a treaty.

"As has been already unofficially announced in the press, a conference between the board of commerce and the sugar refiners has resulted in a reduction of two cents a pound on the price of sugar. This reduction extends to all grades, and effective for that, leaving the selling price of refiners at 22c a pound. Former orders of the board of commerce, which remain in effect, limit to 2c per pound the increased cost to the consumer, this lim-

itation of profits applying equally to purchases made at prices below 22c. "The sugar markets of the world remain an uncertain quantity, with a tendency downward during the last Bran and Shorts to Decline week or two. 

URGE SALES TAX ON IMPORTATIONS

Wholesale Grocers Prefer Collection From Manufacturers -Officers Elected.

Favoring the collection of the "sales tax" by the government solely from the manufacturers and on importations by the customs authorities, the wholesale grocers of Canada at the second session of their convention held in the King Edward Hotel yesterday gassed a resolution accordingly.
