

IS NOW CHIEF JUSTICE New York Broker Has Been Placed Under Arrest.

> New York, June 1.-Henry C. Wade, a roker, was arrested last night on a warrant charging theft of \$775.

Joseph Baguely, the complainant, leges that he paid this sum to Wade in an underwriting deal for the bonds of the Ontario Lumber Company, of Kingston, Ont. Baguely asserts he was acting for a Mr. Gordon, member of the Canadian parliament. The police allege Wade was the treasurer of the Empire Bond and Security Company, and that he claimed to be able to place the bonds through the Imperial Trust Co., of New Jersey, which came into public notice last February when its president was arrested.
