

Quest, VI. Who have died since last Conference ?

Answer.

1. JOSEPH STINSON, D.D.

His birth-place was Castle Donnington, Leicestershire, England; but the place of his second birth was Gainsborough, Lincolnshire, a few miles from where the founder of Methodism was born. His was the advantage of godly parentage: his father and mother having been both honored and useful members of the Methodist Church. Before he reached his twentieth year he was soundly converted to God -a change which was demonstrated by a difference in his spirit, employments, and associations. His promising talents commanding the attention of the Church after the usual probation and acceptance as a Local Preacher, he was proposed and accepted for the Missionary work; and in 1823 was appointed to Eastern Canada, where, in Montreal and other places, there are fruits of his popular and useful ministry remaining to this day.

On the Gibraltar Mission he labored successfully for three years, enjoying the confidence and respect of the civil authorities, and leaving the Church in much prosperity. In 1833 he resumed his work in Canada, spending three years in Kingston and five in Toronto, faithfully discharging the duties of his office as General Superintendent of Missions, and part of the time President of the Canadian Conference.

Providential intimations pointing out his way across the Atlantic, he labored with the Pinces of our Israel in Sheffield West, Leeds First, London Third, Bradford East, and then Manchester, from which place he again removed his family to this country, as he expressed himself, "To live and die in Canada." His re-appointment to the Presidency of the Canadian Conference in 1857, drew forth all his energies of mind and body; he sparing neither pains nor labors to meet the numerous demands upon his time and talents.

There was a genial warmth and suavity in the spirit and manners of our departed brother, which rendered his companionship pleasant and instructive. His well-cultivated mind yielded both fruit and flowers; this with a fine tasts, and choice, simple, but expressive language, rendered him a welcome visitor to the pulpit and platform

Few men have passed through life with greater exemption from personal affliction than Dr Stinson; in body and mind he enjoyed, with but slight exception, health and power to devote to his beloved Master's work; and not until he was.in the 39th year of his Ministry was he heard to complain of confirmed debility, or that in any of his long journeys he suffered inconvenience. Notwithstanding his growing indisposition, his indomitable energy enabled him faithfully to keep his engagements until the 12th of January, 1862; his last exercise was a lecture delivered at Mil-

ton, on a subject truly in harmony with his religious sympathies, —"The Aborigines of Canada,": he reached his home on the 11th, where, with alternate hope and discouragement to himself, family, and numerous friends, he pined away under the slow destructive progress of an internal malady, which although it occasionally prevented consecutive thought and expression, his days of suffering were accompanied with holy communications, which enabled him to convey to his brethren not only a sense of the absence of the fear of death, but by the radiancy of his countenance, and expressed reliance solely upon the merits of the Redeemer, a joyous assurance of eternal life.

He died in Toronto, on the 26th of August 1862, in the 61st year of his age, and the 40th of his itinerancy. Universally beloved by the Members of Conference, and the Members of our Church and Congregations throughout entire Canada.

"Thus saints, who seem to die in earth's rude strife,
Only win double life:
They have but left our weary ways
To live in memory here; in heaven, by love and praise."

2. HENRY WILKINSON.

Henry Wilkinson was a native of Boltonlee-Moors, Lancanshire, England. He was born Oct. 27th, 1804. When about seven years of age his father came to America, and resided for several years in the State of Pennsylvania, from which place he removed to Canada, and settled in the town of St. Catharines. His parents were members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and as he says, taught their children "the good knowledge of the Lord, and he also speaks of the very peculiar advantage enjoyed in attending the Wesleyan Sabbath School in his native town. But notwithstanding the early religious influences with which he was surrounded, he lived without God until in the nineteenth year of his age, when, through the preaching of the Methodist Ministers, and the death of his father, he was brought after many resolves to give his heart to God. He was received on trial, in the Church, February, 1824. He was soon after called to fill the office of Class Leader. In the year 1828 he received license as an Exhorter, and his talents and zeal pointed him out for a wider sphere of usefulness in the

Church. In 1826 he was licensed as a Local Freacher, and preached his first sermon at a Camp-meeting held in Burford.

In the early part of the year 1831, he made preparations to remove from St. Catharines and commence business in Colborne, Long Point, when unexpectedly to himself, he was called to supply a vacancy on the Long Point Circuit, caused by the failing health of one of the ministers. Very reluctantly he consented to obey the call, fully expecting at the ensuing Conference, to resume his secular employments, but the Divine blessing which attended his labors in this new and unexpected work pointed out to him the ministry of the church as his providential designation. And the whole of his subsequent history abundantly proved that his call and ordination was of God. At the Conference of 1832 he was received on trial, and what was a rare occurrence at that time, he remained two years longer on the Long Point Circuit. The stations to which he was successively appointed during a ministry of thirty years, showed the high estimation in which he was held, and in all he acquitted himself as a man of God and a workman which needeth not to be ashamed. In addition to occupying most of the important appointments in various parts of the Province, and holding the office of Chairman of District during a large portion of his ministerial life, in the year 1845, at the Conference held in St Catharines, he was elected to the highest office in the church, that of President of the Conference. Brother Wilkinson was an evangelist indeed. His preaching was eminently spiritual, and the character of his ministrations was best seen in its practical results, in the conversion of sinners, and the edification of believers. And few, if any, have ever surpassed him in pasterial diligence and faithfulness. His zeal for God, and his untiring efforts to premote in every way the interests of the church. were often carried beyond his physical strength, and several times brought him near to death, and compelled him to seek a temperary release from the responsibilities of a circuit or station. At the Conference held in Kingston his appointment to the office of Co-Delegate was requested, and he was appointed to the Toronto East Circuit; but the labors and anxieties of that station proved too much for his already enfeebled frame, and at the close of the year he was compelled to take a superannuated relation. The rest and quiet of the following year seemed so far to improve his health as to fit him again to undertake the work, to which in feeble health

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No ux tre and advancing age, he maintained an undying devotion. The failing health of the President of the Conference imposed upon him as Co-Delegate, the duty of conducting the preliminary proceedings of the Conference, held in Belleville in 1862, and his cheerful and earnest zeal, gave good hope that the church would enjoy a few more years of his truly evangelical labors He was appointed to the North Yonge Street Circuit, and entered upon his work with his usual earnestness and activity. But he unhappily overrated his physicial ability, and was soon laid upon what proved to be the bed of death.

The second Sabbath previous to his death he preached three times, renewed tickets in two classes, and conducted a fellowship meeting, though unable all day to take any food. The Rev. James Elliott, says:

"I saw him on the afternoon of the day previous to his death,—He said 'I suppose it is all over with me now, but it is all right'—Being greatly exhausted he said, 'poor humanity!' and then as if passing suddenly in thought from the present to the glorious future he exclaimed, 'glorious humanity!' He repeated with deep feeling the hymn commencing, 'Let not the wise his wisdom boast,' but his soul seemed especially to release the great truth stated in the second verse:—

"One only gift can justify
The boasting soul that knows his God;
When Jesus doth His blood apply,
I glory in His sprinkled blood."

"He asked me to pray with him—he responded with great energy to every petition, and though suffering from constant agonizing pain, he rejoiced with joy unspeakable. He lingered till the next morning, when in holy triumph he finished his race and passed to his reward."

He died on the 14th of August, in the 58th year of his age and the 31st of his ministry.

3 JOHN HENRY MULHOLLAND.

John H. Mulholland was born in the city of Toronto, 7th November, 1838, was converted to God in early life, and under the influence of careful intellectual and religious training, grew up to be a young man of respectable talents, amiable disposition, and sound piety. Upon the recommendation of the Quarterly Meeting of the Toronto City East Circuit, he was received as a probationer for the Christian Ministry in 1862, and appointed to labour on the Mono Mission His health having failed during the first quarter of the year, he was obliged to return to his home in Toronto, where, after lingering a few weeks, he died in great peace on the 21st Oct., 1862, in the 25th year of his age.

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4. EDMUND STONEY.

Edmund Stoney was born in Newport, County of Tipperary in Ireland, in the year 1790. In the twenty-second year of his life he was converted to God by the instrumentality of that man of God, the Rev. Gideon Ouseley. Soon after his conversion he was led to labour for God and souls as a Leader and an Exhorter; and in his own country was made useful to many. In the year 1818 he emigrated to this country and laboured zealously as a Local Preacher until the year 1826, when he was ordained a Deacon in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, by Bishop Enoch George; and in 1830 Bishop Hedding ordained him an Elder in the same church. Our brother was useful in converting many of the poor degraded Indians. He was fearless in his denunciations of sin, simple and unaffected in his manner, and affectionate and urgent in his appeals to the conscience With no pretensions to learning or superior ability, he was nevertheless always a welcome, useful, laborious minister of the Gospel, and laboured on some of our more prominent stations.

During the last eleven years of his life, Brother Stoney was "made perfect by suffering." The greater part of that time was spent in his lonely chamber, entirely dependent upon the kind offices of his devoted wife. Few have suffered more severely or more patiently. The grace of God eminently sustained him. When unable to speak, he, by signs, would make known his confidence in God and his entire trust upon the merits of his Redeemer. Heaven seemed to be reflected on his countenance. His look was divine.

He died in sure and certain hope of a resurrection to eternal life on the evening of the 8th Angust 1862; and on the following Sabbath was interred in the Wesleyan Burial Ground at Siloam, in the presence of a very large and deeply-affected congregation.

5. THOMAS HARMON.

Brother Thomas Harmon was a native of Connecticut, United States, and was born Oct. 10th, 1783. He left his native land, when a young man, and came to Canada in 18.8. He was converted to God Dec. 26th, 1809, and immediately united with the church. He gave early indications of usefulness, and in obedience to the call of God, and in compliance with the decision of the authorities of the church, he commenced soon after his conversion to God, to call sinners to repentance. He received license as an Exhorter in 1810, and Local Preacher's license in 1812. He was a man of strong powers of mind, a clear and logical reasoner, a sound divine, and a powerful preacher. He was called to the more active scenes of life, by engaging in the itinerant work, and unreservedly consecrated himself to God and the services of the church He was ordained Deacon in 1819 by the late Bishop Roberts of the M. E. Church of the United States, and in 1833 he was ordained a minister by the Rev. George Marsden, President of the Wesleyan Conference in Canada. He had seen much affliction, both personal and domestic, but he was not forgotten of the Lord. During his last illness he suffered much from lowness of spirits, but was sustained by the comforts and consolations of religion. He died at the residence of his son in the Township of Westminster on the 24th day of July ,1862, and in the 79th year of his age.

6. JAMES MUSGROVE.

Br. Musgrove was a native of Devonshire, England. He was converted to Godia tree own of Lostwithel, in Cornwall, in the year 1827, at a revival in which several of the Ministers of our Church were made partakers of saving grace.

He was eminently devoted to God, and zealous in His service, and was soon employed as an exhorter.

In 1831 he emigrated to Canada, came to Cobourg. and was in the same year sent by the presiding elder, the Rev. Wm. Ryerson, to the Belleville Circuit, under the superintendency of the Rev. Richard Jones.

Since that time Bro. M. has occupied some of the best Circuits in our work, and filled some of the highest offices in the gift of the Conference; and at the time of his decease he sustained the important position of Co-Delegate, by the suffrages of his brethren and the appointment of the English Conference.

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As his early religious life was distinguished by devotion to God, so all his future career was marked by growing piety and fidelity. As a preacher he was remarkably clear and forcible, and on most of his fields of laboury eminently successful; and many, we doubt not, won to Christ by his instrumentality, preceded him to the skies, and have jountly welcomed him to his rich and lasting reward.

He was ardently attached to Methodism in its doctrines, policy, and usages. In his official relations, in the administration of discipline, though uniformly kind, he was firm and highly conscientious. His piety was unobtrusive, yet cheerful, sustaining him under the most painful afflictions through which he was called to pass. His hope being lively, proved to be an anchor to his soul. He was truly happy as long as consciousness remained, and in death, as in life, he could say "all is right."

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7. ABRAHAM DAYMAN.

The subject of this brief sketch, Bro. A. Dayman, was born on the 4th of December, 1818, in Devonshire, England. Of his early life we have no record. At the age of 17 years he was converted to God, and very soon afterwards commenced his labours as a Local Preacher In 1843 he emigrated with his father's family to this country, and the same year was taken out by the Conference into the regular work of the ministry. Having passed his term of probation, he was ordained at Belleville by the Rev. James Dixon, D.D., and for nearly 20 years performed the work of a faithful evangelist, at the various stations to which he was in the providence of God appointed. In 1862 his health which had been failing for some time previously, became so impaired, that in the middle of the year he was obliged to quit his field of labour, and seek retirement at his home in Columbus, on the Whitby Circuit, when his friends hoped he might so far recruit his strength as to be able occasionally to perform the sacred duties connected with his vocation. But in this they were disappointed. Consumption, that scourge of the human family, had fastened its remorseless hand upon him, and it was evident to all who saw him, that he was gradually wasting away. But while his earthly tabernacle was being dissolved, bright visions of the heavenly home gladdened his spirit, and he was enabled to anticipate with rapture the moment when freed from this earthly coil, he would "soar away," and mingle with the blaze of day.

His last hours were peaceful. It might be truly said of him that "he fell asleep in Jesus," on the 13th of April, in the 45th year of his age.

8. JAMES HUGHES

Was born on the 13th of December, 1832, and died on the 17th of November, 1862 Both his parents being members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, he was blessed with that most invaluable blessing, christian nurture, which, through the divine blessing resulted in his conversion to God, at the age of fourteen years, after which he immediately united with the church of his fathers. He emigrated to this country from Ireland in 1847, and settled in the Township of Darlington. No Wesleyan Church being convenient now to him, after the lapse of a year, he united in christian fellowship with the Bible Christians, and was shortly after taken out to travel in connection with their Conference. After travelling five years with them, he applied for, and was admitted into connection with the Wesleyan Conference of Canada. During our deceased Brother's connection with the Canada Conference he travelled one year, on Bowmanville, and two years on Moretown Circuits, where he laboured with success, and was much beloved for his work's sake. At the close of his second year's labour on the Moretown Circuit, he was compelled to ask for a superannuated relation, in consequence of the inroads which consumption had made upon his constitution. Our deceased Brother's piety was of the right type, intelligent, consistent, and earnest. As his life was christian, so his death was triumphant. A few moments before his death he called his beloved partner to him and said, "my dear, I am going." She said, "do you find Christ precious?" when he replied, "O yes, I am going to heaven," and shut his eyes on time and sorrow, and waked up in eternal glory.

9. JOHN SHANNON,

Died, September 9th, 1862, in the 26th year of his age, and in the 4th year of his ministry. He had obtained permission of the Conference to spend the year at Victoria College. Just a month had passed, and he was suddenly cut down. With Bro Shannon religion was a fact of experience, and of life. He had been made very useful on his circuits. The Church was hoping n uch from him, but God took him to rest early. He died in great peace, trusting in that Saviour whom, in life, he so gladly and efficiently preached to others.

10. PHILIP ROSE,

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Was born in the County of Prince Edward, C. W., in 1820; convert d to God in the winter of 1841, and died December 29th, 1862 His piety was uniform and consistent.

In his domestic relationships he was anxious to secure the comfort of his family. As a preacher, he was remarkable for his punctuality in attending his appointments, frequent in his visitations of the members, and, by his assiduous labours, greatly endeared himself to his people.

A faithful attendance at a Protracted Meeting, doubtless hastened his death, when his constitution had been previously undermined by disease. He was useful in leading sinners to Christ, and reclaiming backsliders, and building up believers. As he lived respected, so he died regretted.

11 REV. JAMES ASH,

Was born in Devonshire, England, A.D., 1834, and from infancy enjoyed the instructions of a pious mother. He was converted in 1851, and in 1855 emigrated to Canada and entered the Christian Ministry in connection with the Canada Conference. He was ordained at the Kingston Conference in 1860, and was appointed to the Napanee Circuit; his health, however, failing shortly after his appointment, he retired from the field of toil, and by the gradual but sure progress of disease, was brought down, until, in great peace, on the 6th of June, 1863, at Clarke's Mills, Camden, O.W., he fell asleep in Jesus.

Our brother was an earnest and faithful preacher of the Gospel, and was ardently devoted to his work. It is not improbable that a want of conformity to the direction not to preach "too long or too loud," had much to do in cutting short his days.

# REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

The Committe of the Children's Fund beg to report, that a draft of a revised constitution was prepared by the Sub-committee appointed by last Conference: but a Committee having been appointed for revising the whole Discipline, it is recommended that that Sub-committee, consisting of I. B. Howard, J. C. Slater, and Thomas S. Keough, be re-appointed, in order that they may report their labors to the Committee of Revision.

The number of children to be provided for this year is 669, an increase of 51. During the year, 77 were born, 9 have died, and the claims of 25 have expired by age.

The sum of \$20,070 is required to meet the claims of 669 children. The rate agreed to by the Conference for the present year is 36 cents per member, including those on trial, which will produce \$20,092 68, leaving a surplus of \$22 68.

The Treasurer's balance sheet shows that the rate imposed last year was insufficient to meet the claims, by nearly \$200: this has been provided for out of the amount in hand last year.

The Committee are happy to acknowledge the general accuracy of the returns presented from the districts, and the certainty with which all disputed claims can now be decided.

#### REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

In presenting their report, your Committee feel grateful to Almighty God, that he still vouchsafes to this department of His church His continued blessing.

The year now closed, has been one of unusual prosperity in the conversion of many of the children. The returns from the various Districts show, that over two hundred and fifty have given very clear evidence of the soundness of their conversion to God, and are now regularly meeting in class, making a grand total of one thousand six hundred and thirty, or about one in every twenty-four Scholars. On the Montreal District, the Lord has graciously blessed the labours of his servants, as they report over one hundred conversions, one Circuit returning not less than seventy-two, who were brought under religious influence during the Winter, and are now regularly meeting in class. With such an effective agency at work, as is found in our widely extended field, your Committee, however, believe that a much larger proportion ought to be members of the Church, and

they would earnestly urge upon the Conference, the propriety of directing the attention of the Ministers and the Church generally, to a point so vital.

A steady progress is evinced in the formation of Bible and Catechumen Classes, and an addition of about sixty to former returns is presented. Your Committee, impressed with the value and importance of Catechumen classes, as preparatory to the admission of the more seriously disposed children into the general Class-meeting, strongly recommend their more general formation, and would urge the most careful selection of persons of piety and experience to take charge of them.

Believing that our incomparable Catechism oughts to have a much more extensive circulation, and that a more thorough and extensive catechetical system of instruction ought to prevail, your Committee respectively suggest to the Conference the desirableness of our admirable series of catechisms being illustrated,

and issued at a very cheap rate.

The returns from Districts, while they reveal the pleasing facts of the formation of several new schools, and an addition of over twelve hundred scholars, nevertheless show a decrease in the number of votumes in Libraries. Your Committee believe that this discrepancy is not true in point of fact, but has arisen chiefly from the want of proper returns from the various Circuits, and that they would recommend that all Superintendents fulfil the requirement of the Discipline, and present a written report at the May District Meeting, and so furnish to the representative, with all necessary information, to enable him to make correct returns to the Conference.

The Sunday School Advocate, while it has a wide circulation in some sections of our work, in others it is but little known. Your Committee submit, if so valuable and interesting a paper cannot be made available for the publication of short obituaries, of some

of our Sabbath School children who die in the Lord. We would further submit,—Could it not be reduced in price, and brought within the reach of many who

are ignorant of its value?

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at as aat aaIn-many of our Schools, the teachers are ignorant of our Constitution as contained in our Book of Discipline; in order, therefore, that we may have uniformity, and the more effectually carry out this admirable system, your Committee recommend to the Conference, that the Book Steward be requested to print a small edition of the Constitution, in Tract form, for general distribution, and that our people be urged to adopt it generally.

## COMPARATIVE TARCLAR VIEW OF SCHOOLS FOR 1862-63.

### WESLEYAN FEMALE COLLEGE.

GOVERNOR AND CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The operations of this important Institution for the past year have been in most respects satisfactory and hopeful. The number of students in attendance, both of boarders and day pupils has been nearly one third more than attended the previous year; being about one hundred for the Fall and Spring terms, and one hundred and thirty during the two Winter terms. The total number attending during the year has been one hundred and seventy three, about one half boarding in the College. The general department and behaviour of the young ladies has been on the whole very commendable, being characterized by a cheerful and ready observance of the rules of the College; due attention to their studies, and proper respectful courtesy and kindliness in their associations with each other. In the fall of the year, for a considerable length of time, a very powerful religious influence pervade I tise College, as the result of which about twenty or thaty of the young ladies professed conversion; and all residing in the building, with the exception of four or five were brought under religious concern. Since then there has been a regular and due atten in to the ordinary religious observances of the Institution, and though some, it is feared, have fallen into a spiritual decline, others have remained steadfast, and will, it is land, continue so, to the glory of Divine grace. Those meeting in class, exclusive of the day pupils, have averaged from twenty to thirty-five.

The health of the students, considering their number and varied constitutions, has been as good as could have been reasonably expected. There have been a few cases

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of sickness, and one young lady, we regret to say, has died during the year. She died, however, in the faith of Christ, and passed, we have no doubt, to celestial rest

Financially, though by reason of the increase of students, there has been a slight improvement upon the preceding year, yet matters are not so encouraging as could be desired. The debt is very heavy; to meet the interest on which, and other items of expense, it is requisite that a very large amount of profit be realized. This can be accomplished only by a very extensive patronage. If however the ministers of this Conference deemed it proper kindly to exert themselves to secure such patronage, by obtaining at least one pupil for the College from every two or three Circuits, every difficulty might, it is thought, be surmounted. Hoping this suggestion may have its due consideration, we submit all with profound respect.

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

The important duties of our Annual Conference being now nearly fulfilled, we avail ourselves of the privilege of addressing you. "We would not have you ignorant, brethren, what great conflict we have for you," "that your hearts may be comforted, being knit together in love." Although absent from you at this period, our affectionate and earnest attention has been given to such matters as will, we trust, tend to your edification and the advancement of the Church of Christ.

The unity and peace existing throughout the extent of our work is a subject of congratulation. To God give all the glory, as we do, while we "behold your order and the steadfastness of your faith in Christ."

In sending you our warmest salutations, we think with great satisfaction of your regard for the Saviour, the Bible, and the Sabbath; of your piety and cordiality; belief of Wesleyan doctrines; respect for your economy; sustenance of your Ministers; erection of churches and parsonages; and support of our institutions,—that the Redeemer's name may be known; and we pray, "that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."

We are admonished; but while we mourn, bless God that they all finished their useful course with joy.

The Session has been one of unusual interest and importance. Not that any new or grand schemes have been projected, but the review of our work has awakened desires for enlarged usefulness throughout our great Country. Fidelity to each other and a determination to maintain the purity of the ministry in order to the peace and purity of the church, have secured an uncompromising examination of character. Be careful then to maintain good works, avoiding all appearance of evil, that co-operating thus, we may all appear before the throne complete in Christ, not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing.

We have this year been visited by two honored Representatives of the General Conference of the United States Methodist Episcopal Church, the Rev. Dr. Hibbard and the Rev. Dr. Hodgson, They have cordially avowed and fully recognized our unbroken lineage. Their communications have been most frank and affectionate, and their ministrations most fragrant with heavenly unction. You will, with us, rejoice in this renewed proof of Methodistical unity, while the occasion furnishes a just reproof to the vain and groundless asser-

tions of "many adversaries."

The returns from the several Districts show an increase of numbers in our Church and Sabbath School. For particulars we with pleasure refer to the printed Minutes, but while from them you will find cause for thankfulness, there are also grounds for humiliation

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before God. Our increase is not in proportion to our means and agencies. With more laborers, let there be more prayer, more zeal, more conformity to the spirit of Christ, and then we shall have occasion to triumph and say, thanks be unto God for his abundant lovingkindness! "He that goeth forth weeping, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again rejoicing, bringing

his sheaves with him."

For the future, we deprecate retrogression, and unanimously exhort you to advancement. As a community we have no new principles to discover, though its circumstantials may change. The system the Father of Lights have vouchsafed to the Wesleyan Methodist Church is scriptural, and sufficient for all the purposes of spiritual conservatism, and of progression. Whilst, however, a system may be complete, its utility may be circumseribed by human infirmity, or selfishness, or inactivity, and therefore individual responsibility becomes a matter of weighty consideration. No agency is efficient until the Spirit of Power vitalizes it. First prayer, then

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mightier achievments for Christ. There must be personal, experimental religion. "The Methodists were raised up to spread scriptural holiness." And we have, before God, vowed to be holy ourselves. Nothing should be better understood, than that we have not derived our polity and speciality from either sentimentalism, expediency, morals, or politics; and it is a fatal mistake to make our perfection to depend on secular theories. Certain pleasurable, evanescent sensations are not to be taken for holiness. By holiness here we understand more than regeneration. By holiness we mean christian perfection by the blood of Jesus; and by christian perfection we mean, not only power by faith over remaining sin, which the child of God has with the Spirit's witness and his own, but sin abolished, and the soul continually filled with, and ruled by the love of God. What Mr. Wesley said to his Societies should be indelibly impressed on our consciences :-- "Let us

steadily look into the perfect law of liberty, and continue therein. Let us not rest until every line thereof is

transcribed into our hearts."

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The orthodoxy of the Wesleyans in every country is a remarkable fact, for which we praise God; but this is a day of bold and perilous latitudinarianism and agitation; and we caution you against the masks and seductions of The preventatives are, a steady maintenance of your spirituality, a candid and devotional study of the Inspired Scriptures, and a determined adherence to the teachings of the standard works of Wesleyan Methodism. "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ."

It is one of our unalterable General Rules that every member shall attend all the means of grace; and absence, when we have opportunity and health, is a sin. It is not the talent, or imagined want of talent, in the pulpit, which is to govern your attendance, but this injunction, "Worship God." Congregational singing is the authorised usage in our congregations; and where instrumental music is used in our benevolent and social gatherings, it is hoped that due attention will be paid to that important rule, which prohibits "singing those songs, or reading those books which do not tend to the

knowledge and love of God."

Class-Meetings, Lovefeasts, and Bands are among our most precious and essential privileges, where Charles Wesley's poetry inspires the soul; and attendance at Class is indispensable to membership in our Church; and perhaps no means with which the God of grace has blessed us, conduce more effectually to the sanctification of the Spirit. They are necessary for you, if you are to retain the glow and simplicity of your first love, your closet communion with God, and uneclipsed the light you are called to shed upon the world. "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another." Next to your own piety is that of your Families: and

how momentous! This was said by God of Abraham: "I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Such a course is condemnatory of parental obsequiousness to children, and associates success with the exercise of christian authority and example. Dedicate your children to God in baptism; instruct them in our Catechism; winning them in childhood to religion. Discountenance all books and pictures, trades, connexions, amusements, dress, music, expenditure, and parties which do not minister to the virtuous habits and good taste of youth. Statedly, and with a high object, read the Scriptures and pray in your dwellings, and require the presence of all your children and domestics. Deplorable is the estrangement of some children from the faith of their Methodist parents. Be Christian and Wesleyan Parents, and it is more than probable God will honour you with Christian and Wesleyan children. How delightful the emotions of St. Paul when writing to Timothy of his sanctified ancestry!

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Forget not your public responsibilities. God says, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour." Use your talents. Help the sick and the poor. Care for our new converts. and young persons. Personal spiritual defection in our Classes often results from neglect of others. Like John Nelson, Carvosso, and Reeves, "be ye also enlarged," and seek to save souls,—seek them in the field, in the family, in the sanctuary, and prevent sinners from complaining of the apathy of christian men. Sympathy softens adamant. Allure them to the means. Pray for them, and many a soul will then "surname

himself by the name of Israel."

We again confide to your enlightened judgment and generous regards the diversified interests, institutions, and funds of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. The Church Relief, Contingent, Educational, Superanuated, Children's, and College Sustentation Funds are necessary and very useful, and for these rea-

sons, and on the ground of Connexional importance and loyalty, need to be everywhere heartily supported. The Superannuated Ministers' Fund is not a charitable one, but exists simply as a mode to enable our members and hearers to make a righteous return to venerable and beloved men, for protracted and invaluable services rendered by them to our Connexion and to Canada; and to them ministers and people should gratefully do justice.

The Conference places a high estimate on its Book Room and Christian Guardian, and earnestly recommends for your attention and support an establishment founded to secure the widest circulation of Wesleyan divinity, hymnology, history, biography, and intelligence, and the most select works in every department of useful knowledge. Ours is called after Mr. Wesley's original Book Depository. He said of his "end" in preparing and selling Books, "My only one is, to do good." His object is ours. Our Book Room and presses have been established at great expense, and the preferences and patronage of so extended and able a Connexion as ours now is, would, if universally rendered, be quite sufficient to multiply the sale of our Books, and the Conference paper, and thereby immensely promote their religious usefulness in your societies and families, and augment our finances for carrying on the work of God.

We glorify God in you for the willing liberality with which you year after year aid the flourishing Missionary Society of our Church! for the zealous co-operation of many fathers and mothers, and sons and daughters; and especially your prayers for the Society's advance, -an advance which, by Divine Grace, appears in the growing spiritual and social happiness of thousands, and in many remunerative gifts and joys sent back into your own bosoms. Permit us to say, however, that in no year is the income of the Society fully adequate to the claims of God's providence upon it, and that there are now inviting

fields vacant, which cannot be occupied, because our means are insufficient. Our appeal to you, therefore, is for more fervour, more faith, and more funds. Our duty is to be aggressive: our object, the honour of the Redeemer.

We have pleasure in calling your attention to the University of Victoria College, which has our undiminished approval, for its government, professorships, and continued large attendance of students,-the Institution, an evidence of the same love of learning which Wesley, a Fellow of Oxford, wisely exhibited. While we sincerely rejoice in the countenance received by other wellconducted Collegiate Institutions, we beg to say that your own College has the first claim upon you: and we shall be gratified to learn that the authorities and agent of the College obtain your co-operation in their endeavours to increase its limited monetary resources, secure its rights, and add to its graduates, -who, already, in large numbers, in our cities and settlements, are doing themselves credit by their capabilities and application, and contributing to the respectability and fame of Canada.

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The opening of the Wesleyan Female College at Hamilton will afford you, doubtless, as it does us, much gratification, and you will readily unite with us, and the worthy directors, in acknowledging the Guiding hand which has led us to an early success, by many desired and anticipated, and evident in a frequent accession of students, and in their maturing accomplishments; and our chief joy is, that, as in Victoria College, not a few of those whom the parents we address, love, become "wise unto salvation." These are your own Institutions. Patronize them; and be sure that our wish is one with yours when you thus express yourselves:

—"That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth; that our daughters may be as corner stones, polished after the similitude of a palace."

We hardly need enjoin it upon a Methodist people that

they energetically sustain Bible, Tract, Sunday-School, Sabbath, Scriptural Temperance, and other valuable Societies. To such a duty true religion prompts, and the abolition of modern evils requires: and you will do much good by allowing the fullest liberty to your Chris-

tian catholicity.

In all your activities, Brethren beleved, remember the necessity of the Bible, and the ceaseless need of the seven-fold energies of the Holy Spirit, and never act independently of them. And if Moses could not win other conquests without the stay of Aaron and Hur, fail not to pray for us. Your special and Providential Wesleyan position is lofty and responsible. Awake fully to its demands upon you! Give to your faith, your hopes, and your purposes amplitude; giveto your prayers, and love, and energy perpetuity: Ye are my witnesses saith the Lord;" and by the agency of Christ's faithful Church the earth must become radiant with Divine truth and holiness, and millennial hymns be sung by every nation, and people, and tongue.

May "the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost, be

with you all !"

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE

### IN CANADA.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

We have received and heard your Annual Address with the respect which is due to the claims of that great work which the Head of the Church has committed to your nurture. We rejoice with gratitude

over its still expanding greatness.

This year we are chastened ourselves, in our brotherly sympathies, by the removal from us of a greater number than usual of eminent and valued men; and by the retirement of others equally eminent, through age and affliction, into the ranks of Supernumerary Ministers. We are all the more fitted to mourn, there fore, over the painful and we fear hopeless illness of the Rev. Dr. Stinson, your beloved President. It is our earnest prayer that the Divine consolations may richly abound to him in this extremity, and that the Gospel which he has preached for so many years, as well amongst us as in your country, may be his stay and triumph under the present dispensation of the Master's will.

It is matter of honest glorying to us, that, when your community appeared to be in some external peril through the convulsions and civil war of the neighbouring States, your people gave intenseness to that

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outburst of loyalty to the throne of our Sovereign, and to the institutions of the British Government, which was so quickly responded to by measures of defence. Your reference to the loss we have sustained in the death of the noble Prince Albert is one which appeals to a still lingering grief in the hearts of all in this nation, and in none deeper than in those of our own spiritual charge. In cherishing profound and tender respect for the sorrows of our august Queen, we have a mournful pleasure in adding your condolence to our It is most fitting that the children of John Wesley, all the world over, should daily offer thanks to God for the inestimable boon conferred on this empire, and in this age, by the British throne and constitution. It is pleasing in God's sight, that those who have been taught to "weep with those that weep" should offer their earnest prayers for the Royal Family of the home country, and especially for the widowed and well-beloved Sovereign at its head.

We mark with gladness and gratitude to God all the features of your evangelical and pastoral work ;the unction of grace on your ministry and congregations, the awakening of sinners, the increase and efficiency of your Sunday Schools, the calls for spiritual labour arising on every hand, your promotion of spiritual education through the province, and especially your taking thought for the training of your daughters by the new institution at Hamilton.

It is a striking and encouraging fact, which is noted in your Address, that you are with your adherents the most numerous of the Protestant communities of British America. This is high vantage ground, which we trust you will have grace to occupy yet more influentially. We commend your resolve, beloved brethren, to preach with uncompromised fidelity and clearness the whole Gospel of our Salvation, as it is held and expounded in the standards of our

Body. Never did we take firmer hold of our doctrines; and never had we fuller proof of their saving

efficiency.

Days may be advancing when, through the influence of a false philosophy, and the love of novelties, "the truth as it is in Jesus' will be fearfully assailed; and therefore it behoves you and ourselves to provide and train, by such means as the Lord may put within our reach, a Ministry which shall be firm to defend, as well as mighty to promulgate, the priceless treasure of the pure truth. Our Theological Institution becomes of greater value, as the exigencies of our Home and Foreign work increase; and we are only waiting to consider what may be the best methods of enlarging this most needful provision for the training of candidates for the sacred office.

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In the meantime your safety and defence will practically lie—for so have we also hitherto proved it—in a more entire consecration to the great work of seeking to save the lost, directing special effort toward those who are farthest off from truth and righteousness, and nurturing with assiduous care the precious souls whom you gather from the world and associate in

your class-meetings.

Faithfulness to Christ casts us upon His guardian care. It is our humble but fervent hope, that the Methodism of Canada, in purity and power, may honour the memory of our Founder, may stimulate ourselves to higher effort, may grow exceedingly, and

become a praise in the earth.

We receive your representative, the Rev. John Douse, with most affectionate recognition. His exposition in our assembly of your principles and purposes, and his clear statements relative to your varied statistics, were heard with due attention, interest, and respect. To so faithful a brother we cordially give the right hand of fellowship. We join with you in desire for that closer fellowship which a more frequent

interchange of messengers would supply; and assure you that we shall not be unwilling to use every en-

deavour to bring about this result.

We are glad to be informed that under the peculiar circumstances in which your last Assembly was held, the choice of a President fell upon a brother so highly respected and so competent as the General Superintendent of Missions, the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D.; and we appoint the Rev. Dr. Anson Green as your next President,—a Minister well known and highly esteemed among us; and the Rev. John Carroll, Co-

And now, beloved brethren, we commend you and your great work to the hands of the Lord Jesus Christ, whose it is, and who will prosper and crown it by His own methods and in His own time. We solemnly acknowledge His supremeright in and over us, for life and for death. We give ourselves mutually to fulfil His will, until, with our fathers and brethren, we "rest, and stand in our lot at the end of the

### REVEREND AND DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

Your kind and valuable reply to our address, was received and read at an early part of our sitting, and was heard with respectful attention.

Our assembling this year in the city of Quebec is an event of importance in the history of Methodism in Canada. The city itself has historic interest, and the Methodism of Quebec is of long standing in the benevolent operations of the Wesleyan Missionary Society. But the connection of the Eastern District with the Canada Conference is of recent date, and this is the first time of our meeting so far East of our Central work. Considering the position of Romanism in this city we entertain the hope that the largest body of Protestant Ministers in Canada meeting here, may be attended with benefit in many respects, while, at the same time, the cordial reception we have met, and the warm-hearted hospitality we have experienced, demonstrates the wisdom and acceptableness of those measures which have resulted in the union and consolidation of Methodism in this important portion of the British Empire,

The obituary record of this year is unusually large, including the names of several who have for a long series of years distinguished themselves as indefatigable and successful ministers of our Lord Jesus Christ. The

early death of some of our promising young men, is to us a subject of affliction, but the memory of the lamented, and ever-diligent Stinson, - the fervid and devoted Wilkinson-the laborious and consistent Musgrove, is embalmed on every heart, and extends throughout the land. God in his mercy continues to raise up faithful men for the work of the ministry. Of this our Minutes bear testimony from year to year. The heart of Wesleyan Methodism beats strong and healthy. Life and growth are still manifest everywhere. Men, as the instruments of Christ, may fall in the field of conflict with sin and error, but the principles and institutions of the Church have perpetual vigour and eternal youth. Our dependence is on the Holy Spirit, whom we honour as the source of power and grace.

The reference in your welcome answer to our address, to probable advancing error and "false philosophy," is regarded by us with solicitude. Your anticipations have been realized and an insidious attack has been made on the strongholds of our faith. The dangerous rationalism of these times, seeks to lodge itself on this side of the Atlantic, but the simple faith of our fathers in Him "of whom Moses and the Prophets did write," and an unwavering adherence to the substantial doctrines of the Gospel, will continue to be our defence in the day of battle, and our hope for all future generations. The Church is safe. "God is in the midst of her; she shall not be moved; God shall help her, and that right

early."

You will again rejoice with us in the peace and properity of the Church providentially placed under our care. In many places the word of the Lord has been attended with divine power; sinners have been awakened and converted; believers have been quickened and sanctified. Our numbers are this year 52,533 and there are reported 3,805 on trial. Our Sabbath Schools have been conducted with increased efficiency and blessing to our children, of whom we have 37,618 under

our care. Our Collegiate Institution at Cobourg never before presented more satisfactory evidences of usefulness. Our Female College at Hamilton gives proof of the wisdom and forethought of those who have promoted its establishment. In these respects, we seek to be worthy followers of our beloved fathers and brethren, and by all Scriptural means to spread truth and holiness

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We respond cheerfully to your expressions of desire for "that closer fellowship which a more frequent interchange of messengers would supply." The union happily existing between us is, as we believe, of the utmost consequence. The Christian loyalty of our people has been tested, and they rejoice to feel themselves with us, an integral portion of the British Empire. The religious fellowship and fraternal interchange proposed, would be, in our opinion, conducive to the peace and prosperity of the nation in general, as well as calculated to promote the religious advancement of our church in particular. We should deeply regret any change of our relations, which would deprive us of the wise and hallowed consels which your age and experience enable and authorize you to give. These will always receive the most reverent consideration, and the propositions we submit at this time will, we are persuaded, meet with your full approbation.

The appointment of the Reverend Dr. Green to the Presidency of this Conference, in accordance with our request, has afforded us much satisfaction, and has been accepted as an additional evidence of the readiness with which our wishes are met by your venerable body, and we now request that the President of our next Conference may be a member of the British Conference from England, and having full confidence in your wisdom and knowledge of necessary qualifications, we leave entirely to yourselves the selection of a minister for the office of President of this Conference:

The Conference requests that the Rev. Samuel D.

Rice, may be appointed to the honourable office of Co-Delegate of our next President. His fervent piety, superior theological attainments and pulpit ability, his thorough acquaintance with our Discipline and work, and his unceasing devotion to the interests of our church, render him eminently qualified to fill the office to which he is thus designated.

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The conduct of our affairs during the past year, under the Presidency of the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., has fully justified your confirmation of our desire for his appointment. His prudence and kindness, united with experience and firmness, have more than ever bound him to our hearts, and we most respectfully request his re-appointment to the onerous duties involved in his appointment to the office of General Superintendent of Missions.

We have appointed as our representative at your next Conference, the Rev. John H. James, a brother in whose judgment and piety we have the highest confidence, and to whom we refer you for any further information respecting our affairs.

The difficult work of assigning to each of us our respective spheres of labour, having been completed and confirmed, we are about to proceed on our missions. We "covet earnestly" the spirit of Paul, who said to the Corinthians, as we would say to the people throughout our whole territory, "And I, brethren, when I came unto you, came not with excellency of speech, or of wisdom, declaring unto the testimony of God, for I am determined to know nothing among men save Jesus Christ and Him crucified." We trust ever to be actuated by the same certainty of conviction as the same Apostle, when he said to the Romans, "I am sure that when I come unto you, I shall come in the fullness of the blessing of the gospel of Christ." Privations and toils are not unknown to us, but we undertake our work in the self-sacrificing spirit of Him who bore the cross for our sakes. We rely on the energy of the Holy Ghost, of whom the Son declared, "He shall glorify me," and "he that believeth on me, the works that I do, shall he do also, and greater works than these shall he do because I go to the Father."

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#### THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA

TO THE

GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.

REVEREND AND FONDLY REMEMBERED FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

We greet you much in the Lord, and desire to express the exquisite pleasure afforded us by your last fraternal epistle to us, as also by the visit of your excellent representatives, the Revs. Doctors, Hibbard, and Hodgson, who brought us good tidings of your faith and charity, and whose urbane and brotherly intercourse with us, whose efficacious, evangelical sermons in the pulpit, and whose discriminating, eloquent, and nobly Methodistic addresses on our Conference platform, afforded us great pleasure and refreshment of spirit, The recollection of our former nearer relationship to you. and the religious indebtedness of our church and country to yours at the commencement of their history, is as grateful to our hearts as it can be to yours. As you have a few of the early pioneers who traversed the intervening forests on horse-back, in days gone by, to reach our then wilderness country, so have we at least a few survivors out of those who constituted their work in the Lord, who fondly dwell on the self-denying spirit of those devoted evangelists—a spirit which we their sons in the Gospel, on both sides of the dividing line between

our respective Governments, would do well to cherish and preserve. As we are proud to acknowledge our parentage, so also we humbly presume to trust that we have not compromised the Methodism planted by the early Missionaries from the United States.

It is true Providential circumstances prevented our consecrating any one of the three excellent men elected successively from among your ranks to superintend our infant Canadian Church, in the character of Bishops, and it is also true that we do not now even bear the name of Episcopal Church, yet the substance of a true Scriptural and Methodist Episcopacy is preserved in the person of our annual President, who performs all the functions and receives all the respect of your Episcopal. These and all the subordinate changes in our church, have been made in accordance with the Constitution adopted from the model of your own Church, when you consented to our independence-changes which have stood the ordeal of civil persecution in our provincial courts of justice, from those who claimed to be the original church, and to possess its property,-the claims of these changes to constitutionality coming forth as Furthermore, our subsequent and now long established connexion with the British Conference, we opine constitutes a pledge for the maintenance of all that is essential in Methodism; such as our evangelical Arminian doctrine; our ministerial itinerancy in its integrity; and the faithful preservation of our peculiar prudential means of grace, the class meeting in particular. We flatter ourselves that in no branch of the Methodist family, will more of the ancient simplicity of character, more clearness of experience in divine things, and more reverence in the form, and more fervor in the spirit of devotion be found, than among the Wesleyan Methodists of United Canada. Our Circuit system is honestly maintained. Upwards of five hundred ministerial laborers are permeating every settled part of our vast country, for the Hudson Bay Territory and the Colonies of British

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Columbia and Vancouvers Island, as well as the two Canadas, are comprehended within our Mission field. Fishermen, new settlers, and miners, of English origin, share our attention; while our French and German populations are now enlisting our sympathies, as well as the Indians of our forest, to whom we had an early and strikingly providential call, and among whom glorious trophies have been won. Our Missions in all, Domestic and Foreign, French, German, and Indian, are about one hundred and sixty in number, comprising no less than a hundred and seventy-five ministers in that department alone; besides interpreters, school teachers and other agents paid and unpaid. As far as the circumstances and extent of our country will allow, we are endeavoring to follow your worthy example in promoting the work of liberal christian education. We lend one of our most highly endeared senior ministers to superintend the common school education in the Upper Province. University of Victoria College has educated and given 2 right impulse to hundreds of the most active public men of the country. It has graduated a large number in the several faculties of Arts, Medicine, and Law, all of which faculties it now comprehends. The number of students the last year was 308. Nineteen graduated at the last convocation in the faculty of Arts alone—the largest that ever graduated at once in any British North American Although it has no Theological chair it has done much to liberalize and give efficiency to our rising ministry, who are also put through an extensive course of theological training during the four years of their probation, by examiners appointed for that purpose. Within the last few years we have succeeded in establi-hing a Collegiate Institution, for the liberal education of the daughters of our people also. This institution in its situation, buildings, and faculty, is of the most approved character, and promises much in the future. The large number of 173 students received instruction within its walls the last year.

We deeply sympathize with you in the calamity of civil war which your country is now enduring, and in which you as a church are no doubt largely sufferers. We pray that the interests of true religion may be preserved throughout the whole, and that the Ruler of all events may crown the struggle with a peace which shall be favorable to national unity, the supremacy of law and order, and the freedom of those who are now enslaved. We feel that on the christian people of both your country and ours depends the perpetuation of that feeling which ought to be preserved among Anglo-Saxons, and which will tend to make our common Protestantism a power for good in the evangelization and advancement of the religious freedom of the world.

Praying that Almighty God may abundantly multiply your seed sown and increase the fruit of your righteousness, we would beg, dear fathers and brethren, to subscribe ourselves your affectionate fellow laborers in the Gospel field, and fellow soldiers in the kingdom and

patience of Jesus Christ.

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#### CONFERENCE ADDRESS

TO THE

### GOVERNOR GENERAL OF BRITISH N. AMERICA,

#### AND HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

To His Excellency, the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Monk, Governor General of British North America, etc., etc., etc.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :-

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We, Her Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Ministers of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, in Conference assembled, gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity afforded us by our present annual meeting, to offer to your Excellency our most respectful and cordial congratulations on your assumption of the government of United Canada; and to express our grateful satisfaction at the assurance, as well from your past career as from your expressed sentiments, that it is your intention to administer the Government for the equal benefit of all classes of Her Majesty's Canadian subjects, without regard to national origin or religious predilection.

In renewing to your Excellency the avowal of devoted loyalty to the Throne and the Constitution of Government under which it is our privilege to live, and in expressing our deep sympathy with our beloved Sovereign in her sore bereavement, we but express the cordial feelings, not only of the 500 Ministers composing this Conference, but those of the nearly 2,000 congregations under our pastoral oversight, who with us earnestly pray for the Divine blessing on our gracious

Sovereign and her Representative in this country, and for its continued connection with the British Empire.

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To establish and mature a system of popular education in Upper Canada, we have permitted one of our own members to devote himself nearly eighteen years, and we feel how well that system of day schools accords with the circumstances of the country, where the children are under the daily and weekly care of their parents and pastors in regard to their religious instruction and Upon the same principle, in the higher branches of education, for the acquisition of which, youths must leave their parents and pastors, we believe the home and pastoral oversight and instruction should be provided in the Constitution and Administration of the College to which such youth are sent. While, therefore, we admit the wisdom and justice, upon the ground of equal rights to all classes, that liberal provision should be made by the Legislature for that class of the community who desire to have their sons without parental or pastoral oversight during their course of collegiate education, we think that provision equally liberal should be made for the larger class or classes of the community who erect their own Colleges in order that their sons may be under religious oversight while they pursue the national curriculum of collegiate education, and are subjected to a national standard of examination. It is under the influence of such convictions of duty, that we have established a College, which has already sent forth many hundreds of educated youths, and which, with similar Colleges, we believe, is entitled to liberal and permanent endowment by the Legislature.

We trust that under the enlightened and liberal administration of your Excellency, objects so important and national will be accomplished, and that this noble part of Her Majesty's dominions will be blessed with a career of unprecedented peace and prosperity.

We offer up fervent prayers for the Divine benediction upon your Excellency and family; and earnestly

hope that the period of your Excellency's administration of the Government of Canada may be attended with as much happiness to your Excellency as to Her Majesty's Canadian subjects.

I am glad to find that you express your adhesion to the principle that the money appropriated by the Legislature for the purposes of education should be applied without distinction of creed or class, and I trust that the sacrifices which the tax-payers of Canada are making for the promotion of education may ensure to them a large return of moral and material improvement.

You will not expect me on the present occasion to give any opinion on subjects which may become matters for discussion in the Legislature of the country, but I may be permitted to say that in the arrangement of the system of education, every facility should be afforded to parents and pastors to enable them to supply the religious element.

I heartily thank you for your good wishes for myself and my family, and I trust that I may be so enabled to act, in the position in which my Sovereign has placed me, as to advance the prosperity and happiness of the people of this important Province.
