



PERCIVAL SPENCER WAS MASTER OF HIGH ALTHUDES

Celebrated Aeronaut and Balloon Manufacturer, Who Died Recently In Britain, Inherited His Love For High-Flying From His Grandfather and Father—Used Bailtoon in Was in 1890.

Of almost world-wide reputation as a balloonist, which career he started at the early age of eight, Mr. Percival Spencer, of Spencer Bros., the famous balloon manufacturers, died at his home, Aberdeen Park, Highgate, N., (Eng.) at the age of 48. Mr. Spencer, who was a widower, was the eldest of three brothers, who conduct the business of balloon manufacturers at Highbury, and he was a daring and successful aeronaut. Mr. Spencer must have spent more time in the air than any contemporary aeronaut. successful aeronaut. Mr. Spencer must have spent more time in the air than any contemporary aeronaut. He said quite recently that he thought ballooning was the safest way of traveling in the world. And he recommended it for jaded nerves. He also said that a day aloft did one as much good as a week or even a fortnight of any other sort of relaxation. The Spencers are a ballooning family. Mr. Spencer's grandfather made ascents as far back as 1836, and his son carried on the family tradition by making an ascent at the Crystal Palace when only eight years old. On that occasion he was accompanied by his father, and afterwards he made balloon ascents and parachute descents in Egypt, India, the Straits Settlements, China, and Japan. He made special ascents that were witnessed by the Czar of Russia and the Emperor of Japan. Mr. Spencer was a familiar figure not only at the Crystal Palace, but also at lease and galasthroughout the country. On seven occasions he crossed the Channel by balloon, and he has flown across the Irish Sea from the Iale of Man to Scotland. From ballooning Mr. Spencer passed enthusiastically to the air



ship problem, and he believed that he was the first balloonist to take an active part in military aeronautics. The occasion was the war in Acheen, Sumatra, is 1890. Accompanied by Major Droese, of the Dutch Army, he made a series of investigations that afforded useful information to the Netherlands officers. During part of the operations the balloon, attached to the last truck of an armor-plated train, was drawn through dense tropical forests. When the aerostat was liberated it rose high in the air and showed the position of the enemy's forces, and at a given signal the guns of the forts poured out shot and shell on the native insurgents. The effects were noted from the balloon and orders issued to the forces below. In the pursuit of his profession he had many thrilling experiences. One of his most serious occurred in India. He made an ascent outside Calcutta and came down in the jungle. Quite outside his bearings, and with no knowledge of his whereabouts, Mr. Spencer wandered about the jungle for three days. When eventually he found his way into Calcutta, he was so emaciated and weak that he was thought by the natives to be a ghost, and was so described by them. In Japan he fell with his balloon into the ocean, and was only saved from drowning through the timely appearance of a boat from a battleship. MR. PERCIVAL SPENCER.

Lower Iron Ore Beds at Wabana Found to be Practically Inexhaustible

ats Show One of the Most Important Deposits Known-Quality Superior to That of Any Ore Uncovered on the

(From Wall Street Journal.)

One of the most important discoveries made in recent years on any of the iron ore areas situated in Canada has been made during the past few months on the lower beds of the areas of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Coa to Westian. The results of these discoveries go to prove that Wabana is undesibledly one of the most important

Scotia Co.'s submarine stopes, eriven seaward from the upper bed, and as the work advanced bore holes were sunk from the upper beds to the lower beds, in order that the company might have an opportunity of testing the quantity and quality of the underlying ore. The results obtained from the last bore holes have been perfectly satisfactory, proving as they do that the big increase in thickness of the seam after it dips under the sea, as shown by the former bore holes, as fully maintained. If This seam in the submarine areas is 20 to 30 feet thick, as against 11 or 12 feet thick on the land.

The submarine development has shown that this lower bed in the Scotia holdings, which is approximately 20 feet thick, has so far been proven to be over 3,000 feet wide, and its estimated length is about eight or ten miles. The lower bed is supposed to be shaped like a saucer, and at the present time the operators of the company have only crept down a very short distance along one of the rims towards the centre.

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
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
