



General Luard Again in Hot Water. General Luard is to inspect the militing at Camp Sussex on 4th October. This is the Toronto Globe's description of his visit

to the camp at Coburg, Ont.: On Thursday the brigade was inspected by Major General Luard, commanding the litia forces in Canada. On riding to the saluting base preparatory to the march vered several staff officers, including the camp quartermaster, the paymaster, and the surgeon, beside regimental surgeons, who were not mounted. He demanded who they were, and on receiving the required information peremp torily ordered these gentlemen off the field. During the field evolutions which took place, if the slightest irregularity occurred, the General seemed to becom beside himself. In the inspection not only did he scrutinize with eagle eye the brigade by battalions, but he ordered the battalions to be broken up into respective companies, and inspected each one separately. There is no doubt he made many criticisms which were deserved, and offered innumerable suggestions which were nvaluable, but the effect of these was almost entirely destroyed by the manner in which they were made. The slightest eviation of uniformity was everywhere nade the subject of a military philippic. A folded overcoat strapped on upside down was in several cases a sufficient pretext for an onslaught on both officers and privates. Riding up to one company he singled out an unfortunate young soldier whose countenance was bronzed by con stant exposure, and denounced him as dirty and disgraceful. Turning to the officer in command, one of the most espected in the regiment, he politely in rined him that he (the officer) did not look any too clean himself, and could not expect his men to be tidy with such an xemplar. When the review was over the General was gracious enough to accept ar rvitation to luncheon with the brigade and regimental staff. During a conversa-tion which took place thereat—in which Colonel Williams, of the 46th, and the General were the chief participants—the former was given the lie direct by the latter. derer of Carey, was taken from Newgate prison this morning and brought before Magistrate Flowers, at Bow street Court, when his examination was resumed. The son of Carey was also cross-examined. He stated that O'Donnell was sitting when he fired the first shot at his father, and that his father did not grapple with O'Donnell. He admitted that he might have testified, when under examination at Cape Down, that O'Donnell said to Mrs. Carey, "I had to do it, or I did do it." When closely pressed, he said that he was not quite clear what the words used by O'Donnell really were. Mrs. Carey excited the special interest of the spectators, and several marmurs of spmpathy were heard. She recounted the incidents of the voyage, corroborating the other witnesses in regard to the circumstances of the mur der, except that she swore that after he husband was shot she said to O'Donnell "You shot my husband." O'Donnell replied, she said, "Don't blame me, I was

sent to do it"; whereupon, the woman who was with him said. " Don't mind O'Donnell, you are no informer. The cross-examination of Mrs. Carey failed to shake her testimony. She denied that she had talked to her son about his evidence. Magistrate Flowers asked O'Donnell if he had anything to say in answer to the charge of murdering Carey. O'Donnell replied, "not at present." The prisoner was then ordered to stand com mitted for trial at the next session of the Central Criminal Court."

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
