



In this contennial year of Robert Fulton's steamboat invention several gigantic ocean steamships, marking vast advances upon all predecessors, have been completed. The latest is the greatest. It is the Lusitania of the Cunard line. Mere figures tell little of the marine marvel which soon begins her voyages between England and the United States. The Lusitania is 790 feet long, 88 feet wide and has a plated depth of 60 feet. She made a speed of 25 knots on her trial trip. She has nine decks. The hull is divided into 175 water tight compartments, rendering the vessel practically unsinkable. Placed end to end the main frames and beams in the skeleton of the craft would extend thirty miles. To rivet the steel plates to the beams 4,000,000 rivets, aggregating 500 tons in weight, were required. The Lusitania has four great funnels, each twenty-four feet in diameter. She will carry more than 2,000 passengers and a crew of 400 men.

SOME RESULTS OF THE CONFERENCE

Lord Elgin Announces the Reorganization of Colonial Offices

unction Will be to Deal With Self-Governing Dominions-Crown Colonies Another Dept.

An announcement was made by Lord Elgin recently in the House of Lords which is of considerable importance as a sequel to the Imperial Conference, reports the London Times. It relates to the promised reorganization of the Colonial Office and the establishment of a Secretariat to the Conference. With regard to the former point it will With regard to the former point it will be remembered that in the course of the debates Lord Elgin pledged himself to try to separate the departments of the Colonial Office so that there should be in his own words, "a distinct division dealing with the affairs of the division dealing with the affairs of the responsibly governed colories." This undertaking he appears to have fulfilled. The Colonial Office at present divided into four departments each under an Assistant Secretary of State, is henceforth to be divided into three; and the first of these is to be, a "Dominion Department," dealing with the minion Department," dealing with the affairs of the self-governing dominions oversea. That will be its exclusive work, though its scope is very rightly stretched to include the protectorates or possessions which are geographically dependent on the great self-governing colonies. Next is to come the Colonial Department, dealing with the Crown Colonies only; and the Secretary of State can easily be believed when he tate can easily be believed when he says that its work will be heavy, for the Crown Colonies naturally provide the great bulk of the business that the great bulk of the business that now passes through the office. In the titles of these two departments we may see the direct fruit of the Conference and of the new Imperialism. It is, surely, of great significance that the term "colonial" should be now officially confined to the Crown Colonies. This is unquestionably due to the assertion in the Conference of a parity of status between the self-governing dominions and the Mother Country; and the new departmental change is as full of meaning, in its way, as that which in the ing, in its way, as that which in the middle of last century severed the col-onies from their incongruous associa-tion with the War Department. The rest of the new arrangements, which are certainly not less important, Lord Elgin has not succeeded in making entirely clear. There is to be a third or "general" department, dealing with a legal, financial, and other bus-

with a legal, financial, and other business and every one will be satisfied with the announcement that it is to be placed in the entirely competent hands of Mr. Lucas. In this department, we are told, there are to be standing committees to take a collective view of such matters as contracts and concessions, and also of the question of patronage. It is no doubt yery desirable that all the multifarious business of this kind should be brought into focus and dealt with on a common principle, though some further explanation is necessary as to what the precise principle, though some further explanation is necessary as to what the precise duties of this department will be. Still more is explanation needed on the most important point of all, the position of the new Secretariat and its relation to the other departments. 




