THE MUNDER OF CORLIS.—The excitement attendant upon this daring assissination was continued yesterday throughout our populace, and the street and place at which he was shot was visited by thousands, who gazed upon the bloody pavement with demonstrations of astonishment that such an act could be committed in the midst of our populous city, and the author escape detection. The most erroreous and biundering accounts were given in nearly all the daily papers, and nane but the Herald contained a full, correct, and interesting report of the scene, the authonicity of which was fully confirmed by all the testimony presented before the Corner's investigation yesterday afternoon. A post mortem examination was held upon the body of Corlis, at his recent lodgings. No. 108 Leonard street, vectorized afternoon, attended by the Corner, Drs. Howsek, Pottam and others. Upon dissocing the head, the pisate ball, which appeared to have been a battered sing of small size, was found indiged in the anterior chee of the corebram.
