At the present time there are in the home twenty-four women and thirty-six babies. According to the matron's statement all these women and chil-dren are kept in the home on an aver-age of twelve months. Among the children in the home at present are six who have been descried by their parents. COMODORE THOMSON

six who have been deserted by their parents. The charitable work of the Evange-line Home is not confined to looking after unfortunate girls and illegiti-mate children. Women whose hus-bands have died or deserted them fre-quently leave their children there to be cared for on the understanding that thy will pay a fee of \$5 a month, and after paying for a few weeks disap-pear. Men who have lost their wives take their children there to be cared for, and some time disappear too. In such cases the officers of the home are left in an awkward position, for un-
