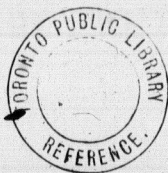

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REGULATIONS.

I. That this Society shall be denominated "THE UPPER CANADA RELIGIOUS TRACT AND BOOK SOCIETY."

II. That this Society approves of the principles on which the London Religious Tract Society is founded, as set forth in the official statement and declaration of that Society; and that it shall only circulate the publications of that Society, or other publications of a similar character.

III. That Annual Subscribers paying Five Shillings, Currency, or more, shall be members of the Society.

IV. That Subscribers of Five Pounds, Currency, and Ministers remitting congregational collections to the extent of Five Pounds, Currency, shall be members for life.

V. That a Committee of twelve Members, exclusive of the Officers of the Society, shall be annually chosen, to conduct the business of the Society; that eight who have most constantly attended the meetings of the Committee throughout the year, may be re-elected for the ensuing year; and that the Committee for the time being shall be empowered to fill up any vacancies that may occur.

VI. That the Officers of the Society shall be—a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and Depositary.

VII. That Ministers of the Gospel, being Members of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. That all Subscribers shall be entitled to have Tracts to the value of half their subscriptions; and that Ministers, or others, remitting a collection, shall be entitled to Tracts to the value of half the collection—on behalf of the congregation that may have made the collection—the same being called for any time within three months of payment of subscription.

IX. That the Committee shall meet for business at least once a quarter.

X. That this Society shall, to the utmost extent of its resources, encourage the formation of Auxiliary Societies throughout the Province.

XI. That the Annual General Meeting of this Society shall be held during the week appointed for the Meeting of the City of Toronto Bible Society.

XII. That all Meetings of this Society, and of the Committee, shall be opened and closed with prayer.

THE ANNUAL MEETING of the UPPER CANADA RELIGIOUS TRACT AND BOOK SOCIETY, was held in Saint Andrew's Church, Church Street, on the 6th of May, 1841.

REV. DR. McCAUL, IN THE CHAIR.

The Meeting was opened with Singing and Prayer; after which the following RESOLUTIONS were unanimously adopted;—

I. Moved by Mr. THOMAS, seconded by Mr. LAWSON,—

That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee.

II. Moved by the Rev. W. H. COOMBS, seconded by the Rev. W. CHRISTIAN,—

That we gratefully rejoice in the prosperity which during the past year has attended the labours of this Society, the Parent Society, and other kindred Institutions; recognizing all success as coming from the Author of all good, and trusting that He will still vouchsafe His blessing with increasing plenitude, till the whole world shall be full of the knowledge of His Holy Name.

III. Moved by Rev. J. ROAF, seconded by Mr. A. T. McCORD,—

That we congratulate the Tract Distributors on the encouragement which they have met with in their pious toil; present to them our thanks for their efficient services; and affectionately urge them still to prosecute their work of faith and labour of love, remembering that in due time they shall reap if they faint not.

IV. Moved by Rev. J. JENNINGS, seconded by Mr. WICKSON,—

That deeming this Society peculiarly adapted to the spiritual exigencies of this Province, and inspired with hope from its past successes, we resolve to afford it our utmost aid, and earnestly commend it to the favourable attention of the religious public generally, as meriting their confidence and help.

V. Moved by Rev. J. RICHARDSON, seconded by Rev. J. HARRIS,—

That the persons whose names have been read be the Officers and Committee for the ensuing year: [See List, page iii.]

VI. Moved by Rev. W. H. COOMBS, seconded by Mr. A. T. McCORD.

That the thanks of the Meeting be given to the Rev. Dr. McCAUL, for his services in the chair.

REPORT.

THE Committee of the UPPER CANADA RELIGIOUS TRACT AND BOOK SOCIETY have again the pleasing task of inviting the friends of that Institution gratefully to rejoice with them in the favour which the Author of all good has vouchsafed to the Society during another year. Nothing particularly adverse has marked its history since our last annual meeting; whilst many tokens of divine approval have attended its proceedings—more than sufficient to deserve our ardent thankfulness, to recompense abundantly our efforts, and to prompt us with renovated hope to persevering labour in the blessed cause.

THE FINANCES.

The Income for the past year has been £565 12s. 2d. from all sources; being £176 19s. 1d. more than the previous year. The expenditure has been £596 5s.

THE ISSUES

The year's distribution has exceeded that of the preceding year by 9,624 publications. And the total circulation of the Society since its commencement has been 305,988 publications.

In addition to these Issues there have been sold, during the year, 20 small Libraries and 6 large ones, including in all about 3,200 volumes. These were so readily disposed of, that your Committee were encouraged to order, for the ensuing year, 30 small and 6 large Libraries. This is an occasion of high gratulation, as these books are lent out extensively, and will long exist diffusing truth and cherishing the love of pious reading which is so important in the rural districts of the Province.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PUBLICATIONS,

Which the Society first ordered during the last year, with the hope of promoting the prevalence and efficiency of Sunday School instruction, have also met with an encouraging sale; which probably would greatly increase if the friends of Sabbath Schools were more generally acquainted with the excellence of these works, and knew that they could be purchased at the Depository. 3,719 Publications have been sold, and £62, 2s. 11d. received, on account of this part of the Society's proceedings.

BRANCH SOCIETIES

Have been established and supplied, since last we met, in the following places:—Cobourg, West Flamboro', and Bowmanville; which are carrying on their operations with promising success.

THE TRACT VISITATION

In this City has been continued with its previous regularity and considerable encouragement; as will be seen by the following brief extracts from the Quarterly Reports of the visitors:—

“People receive the Tracts gratefully. One female who formerly received them in the city, but now lives five miles in the country, sends in regularly for the Tracts. Some children have been induced

to attend Sabbath Schools by means of the Tract Visitation ; and one Temperance pledge has been given."

"Thirty-four children attend the Sabbath School originated by Tract Distribution last year."

"One woman professed to be much benefited by Tracts. She has given a quarter of a dollar ten several times to the Society."

"The people receive the Tracts very gratefully; read them, and seem interested in them. One who cannot read receives the Tracts, and gets her children to read them to her. A sick man, apparently in a decline, seems much interested in them. Three Temperance pledges have been obtained. A man, who was previously indifferent to religion, had his attention aroused by conversation when visited with a Tract, and has since been united to a Christian church."

"A friend has given me a dollar for the Society, from a persuasion, as he stated, of the great benefits arising from its operations."

"People receive the Tracts well. Children generally go to Sunday School from my District. There is a general improvement in the morals and habits of the people. I have distributed for three years, and find my interest in the work increases. One person, who formerly sold on the Lord's Day, has given up the practice."

"I distribute in a depraved part of the city, where the people are much addicted to drinking. I distribute Temperance Tracts with those of the Society. A good many hard drinkers have been induced to join the Temperance Reformation Society. A person who removed into the country calls at my house for Tracts. I know a good deal of good done by Tracts."

On reading these encouraging quotations the mind cannot but arrive at the delightful conclusion, that, whilst the toil of these devoted visiters is accomplishing much manifest good, it will be found to have conferred still greater benefit not to be perceived as resulting from this simple agency till the day when the hidden and private walks of usefulness shall be laid open to the view of an assembled world. May each visiter enjoy a rich reward in that great day!

SAILORS AND SOLDIERS, WITH THE HOSPITALS AND GAOL, Have been supplied with Tracts as formerly; and while the benevolence of the Society has been gratefully regarded, the apparent effects have been highly beneficial. In visiting the steamers and other vessels the Agent frequently finds Emigrants who greatly prize the Tracts. On recently presenting one to an elderly female Emigrant, she exclaimed, "Bless the Lord, Janet, here are Tracts again;" observing that when

in Glasgow they received them regularly from the loan distributors. As they were going farther towards the West, she requested one Tract for each of her family, five in number, which of course were granted. Some of the men on the same occasion earnestly inquired for Gaelic Tracts, stating they could read, but not easily understand English. When they received the Gaelic Tracts, they rejoiced very much, saying they were a feast, as they had not seen any before since leaving the Highlands. In the 34th Regiment, a worthy Sergeant carries out the loan system. A very great moral change has recently taken place among the prisoners in the Gaol, attributed, by the person most capable of judging, to the reading of Tracts and the Scriptures.

THE LUNATIC ASYLUM

Has, at the desire of the Superintendent, begun to be provided with Tracts, and is to be henceforth regularly supplied with 50 per month.

PEDLARS AND SHOPS

Are also supplied with publications for sale, and no trifling number have been disposed of by this means. One man who carries them through a large circuit has purchased upwards of £15 worth.

APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS

Have frequently been made, with which your Committee have not been able fully to comply for want of funds, which has occasioned much regret. That the importance of such application may be seen, the following extracts from letters written by Ministers of reputation are subjoined :

"I am employed by the London Colonial Missionary Society to teach my fellow-creatures the way of life. In my field of labour, (Nottawasaga and neighbouring townships) I often meet with persons who cannot understand much English. They are generally new beginners in the woods, in struggling circumstances, and not able to purchase books of any description. Could you furnish me with some Gaelic Tracts, and a few German and French ones, free of charge? I will do my endeavour to make them useful by loaning them among

the people. Could you grant this favour, I believe you would confer a lasting blessing on your perishing fellow-mortals. It grieves me when I meet with people who do not understand me, who are old, must soon die, and who are at the same time giving every evidence of being yet in their sins. I bought a few Tracts and circulated them.— They were read with great avidity; and when my little store was exhausted, they implored me to get more; and now I call on your assistance.”

“In prosecuting my duties as a Missionary,” says another applicant, “I have opportunity to distribute Tracts in a large portion of the London and Western Districts. I am intimately acquainted with the whole Presbyterian population in these townships. I deeply feel the want of useful reading among them, especially reading of an evangelical kind.”

Says a third: “You are aware that the Highland portion of my countrymen are generally ignorant and unable to understand the English. They are also comparatively poor. I am anxious, not only by preaching, but by reading, to enlighten them. If your excellent Society would grant me for this purpose as many Tracts as you can, you would benefit me and many thousands of my fellow-religionists. I have expended so much out of my own finances, that I cannot this year, without your aid, give them any more Tracts. There are 1,400 of my Gaelic countrymen within eight miles of St. Thomas, and very ignorant of the first principles of Religion. Any grant from you will be gratefully received, and properly distributed.”

From these letters it is easy to perceive that your Society has the most extensive and advantageous openings for usefulness throughout this upper part of the Colony, and it only wants the necessary funds to diffuse the seed of the Kingdom through a vast extent of country where the means of knowledge are scarce and difficult of access.

AN INSTANCE OF THE USEFULNESS

Of your Society was incidentally mentioned to your Depository: very recently “a respectable Farmer of a neighbouring township whilst purchasing Tracts for distribution stated, that about two years since the Tract No. 115, presented to him, was the means of his conversion; since which period he has endeavoured to make himself useful by distributing these messengers of mercy in his neighbourhood. He is known by one of your Committee to be a man of decided piety and considerable devotedness to the welfare of his fellow-men.”

AN EXAMPLE WORTHY OF IMITATION

May also be inserted. The widow of the late Mr. L—— called at the Depository to purchase Tracts to the amount of £1 5s. stating that it was realized from the sale of the fruit of an apple tree, the proceeds from which Mr. L—— had for some years appropriated to the purchase of books to be distributed among the children composing a Sabbath School with which he was connected, and which at his decease he had left to be still applied to the same object.

THE PARENT SOCIETY.

From some unaccountable oversight, failed to transmit to us its last year's report. We therefore are unable to give more than the following brief outline of its proceedings: Its Issues, during the year ending last May, amounted to 19,425,002 publications, being an increase on its preceding issues of 1,392,463. It gratuitously distributed works to the amount of £9,004, exceeding the total benevolent income of the Society by £2,890. Thus does this noble Institution repay with interest the talent entrusted to its care; returning into the Treasury of the Church £9000 for the £6000 it received.

THE MONTREAL TRACT SOCIETY

Is also in a prosperous state. During its last year it issued 78,095 publications. Its income was £348, and its expenditure somewhat more. Several manifest and many hopeful cases of conversion to God have rewarded its labours during the year.

THE AMERICAN TRACT SOCIETY,

Likewise, has not grown weary in well-doing. During the year ending April, 1840, it issued 4,219,721 publications. Its income and expenditure were each about \$117,596.

YOUR LATE SECRETARY,

Mr. T. Champion, has been called from this City, and consequently your Society has lost his valuable services; but your Committee have been happy in supplying his place by the aid of the Rev. W. H. Coombs.

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THE REMISSION OF THE IMPORT DUTIES,

Which had previously been granted to the Society, could not be obtained during the past year, as it was said, in answer to repeated memorials to the Governor General, to be inconsistent with the law of the land.

Thus it appears that the general history of this Society and of sister Institutions, during the year now closing, has been encouraging. And shall God condescend to succeed and honour our unworthy efforts, and we not persevere with increasing devotedness in seeking to advance the interests of this important cause? That be far from us! Your Committee, then, in resigning the charge intrusted to them, affectionately invite the various friends of the Society now present to render it their utmost aid, according to their respective capabilities. Those who have it in their power to augment their contributions, are earnestly requested so to do, that the many advantageous opportunities for gratuitous distribution continually presented to the Society may be more adequately improved. Those who are able to devote a portion of their time weekly to exchange Tracts in some District of the City, are requested to become labourers in the visiting department. To that department, indeed, the particular attention of this Meeting, and especially of the Ministers of the City, is called; as the place is not universally supplied with Tracts, although that object might be easily accomplished, were each congregation to take its portion of the work. And finally, the earnest, constant, and believing prayers of all are importunately requested on behalf of the Society, as its history evinces that the blessing of Jehovah maketh rich. Let each one of us thus come up to the help of the Lord in connexion with this interesting and successful Institution, until its unobtrusive streams of blessing which now are silently diffusing moral verdure and beauty far and wide, shall have pervaded the entire Province, and conduced to change this region into a fruitful field which the Lord hath blessed.
