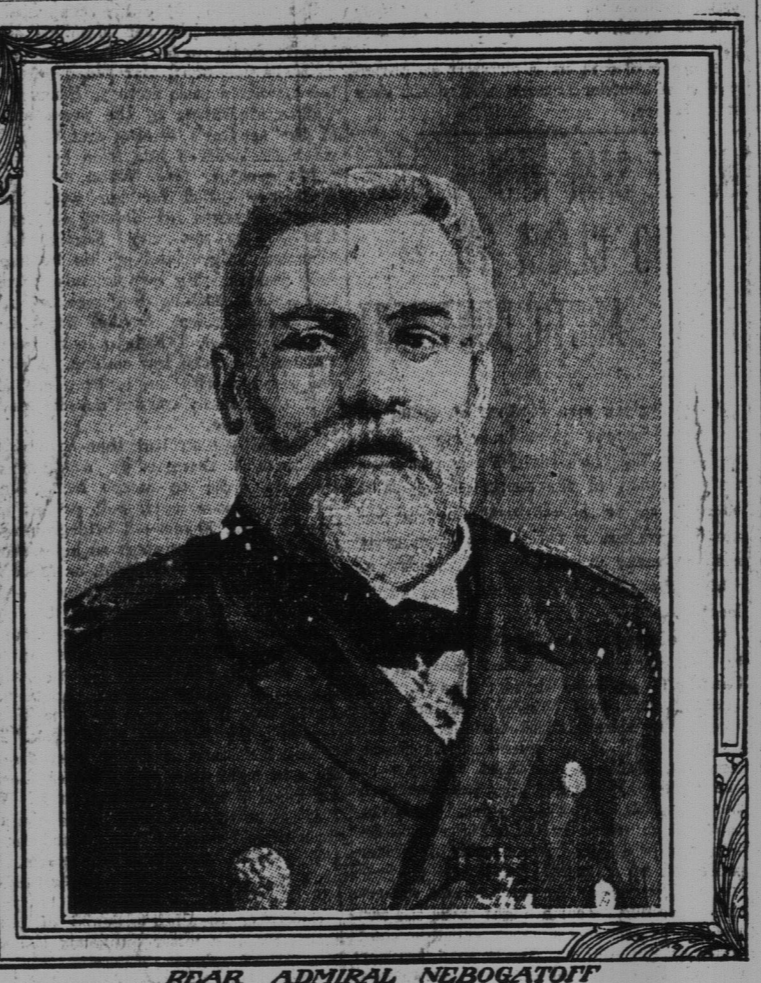

FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, May 16.—All of the lumber drives on the Tobique River, totalling about eighteen million feet, are now in safe water. The Messrs. Fraser have about eight million feet on the Tobique, the bulk of which will be manufactured at their Plaster Rock mill.

The adjourned meeting of the Fredericton Trotting Park Association was held last evening. The following were elected directors: J. Hugh Calder, T. H. Colter, H. B. Kitchin, L. B. C. Phair, D. Mc-Cathwin, D. E. Hamon and John S. Scott. The directors held a subsequent meeting, and the officers elected were: President, J. Hugh Calder; secretary-treasurer, T. H. Colter.

It has been decided to hold a meeting on July 12, and the circuit dates here are during exhibition week, from Sept. 21 to 27. The track has been open for some days now, and Harvey McCoy has a string of horses in training there, including Frank Peck, 2:19; Dewey Dumas, 2:26; Bourbon T, 2:31; Wise Mike and Anonak. Fine work on the track has already been commenced.

G. T. Whelpley left last evening for Montreal. He was accompanied by his daughter, Miss May Whelpley, and will go to Montreal to consult with Dr. Shepard. It is feared that Mr. Whelpley is suffering from cancer of the face.

Miss Ethel M. Gamble, of Marysville, has been appointed matron of the Capital County Hospital at Woodstock. Miss Gamble graduated in November, 1903, from Victoria Hospital.

The provincial director of manual training says that a fair number of applications for admission to the proposed vacation course have come in, but will not be made public until after May 23, the last day for applying. Nearly half of the candidates are teachers desirous of having a course given in St. John, but owing to lack of accommodation it will not be possible to go there this year, and Fredericton will probably be selected. Mr. Kidner leaves tomorrow morning for Sussex, where he is to speak at an educational meeting. From Sussex he goes to the McDonald Consolidated School at Kingsport, Kings county.

The water in the river at this point is about at a standstill today. George F. Burden, M. P. P., arrived in the city today. This offer by Lord Meath is to be held by the school, and a personal prize of \$5 is offered by the League of the Empire. This competition is open to all secondary schools throughout the empire for an Empire Day week of not less than 2,000 words. The subject, which shall deal with some matter of imperial interest, history, geography, agricultural or industrial condition, is to be announced not later than six months previous to May 24th. The competition will be open to primary schools with the same conditions, except that the number of words is cut to 1,000 and the personal prize is cut to \$3.50.

Edmundston, N. B., May 16.—(Special)—Monday was the day named for the boards of liquor commissioners of Madawaska county and the town of Edmundston to consider applications for licenses to sell liquor. Forty-six licenses existed in Madawaska county last year and sixty-five applied this year.

The county board met yesterday afternoon. Hon. C. H. LaBillicie, chief commissioner, and Hon. Wendell F. Jones, solicitor-general, were present as a committee appointed at the last government meeting to look into the management of the liquor act in this county. They had a long conference with the county board which resulted in the number of licenses being reduced in the county from thirty-three to twelve.

In the evening the town board met and the licenses were reduced also, making a total reduction in the whole county of 50 per cent.

The steamer Mikado, owned by C. T. White, of Sussex, which is engaged in towing at Hopewell Cape, came up to Moncton this morning for a scow load of deals for W. R. Dickson. The scow had been looking at the Mikado with a view to purchasing her for service on the river.

Moncton, May 17.—(Special)—In a couple of beer Scott Act cases in the police court today, a novel form of defence was introduced. The proprietors of the restaurant charged with Scott act violation alleged that the hop beer they sell is not intoxicating and in support of this contention this afternoon introduced two subjects in the shape of witnesses who had been filled up with beer before coming to court to prove that the beverage produced no alcoholic effect.

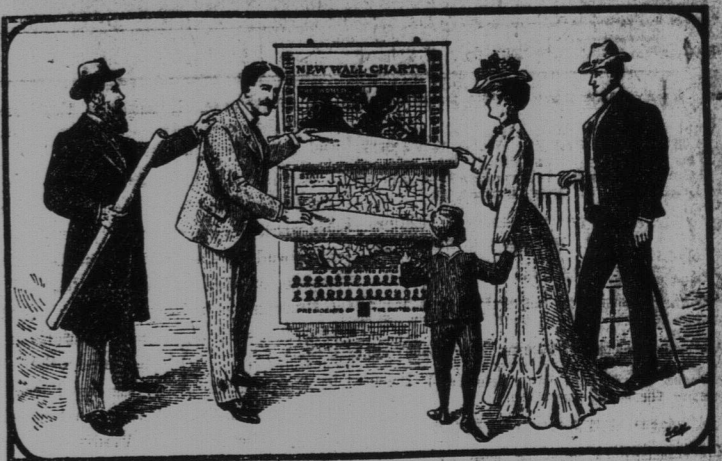
