The Carlists were completely defeated by the Republi-c in troops. They asked for a trice to remove the dead and wounded, which was granted. The remains of the Carlist army retired towards the French frontier. Don Alfonso, brother of Don Carlos, and General Tristany are among the

wounded.

The Times says the British Government, at the request of Germany, has sent or
at the request of Germany, has sent orders to the commander of the British squadron in the Mediterranean to deliver to the Republican authorities the Spanish scamers Almanza and Vittoria, but that the inferior force under the command of Admiral Labos renders the recapture of the vessels by the Insurgents highly probable if they are surrendered. The vessels are without crews, and cannot in

their present condition be used against the Insurgents. Chevalier Hugh Murray, formerly employed at the Education Office, Montreal, has just sailed for Europe to take up has just sailed for Europe to take up arms for Don Carlos, in the army of his brother, Don Alphonse. Mr. Murray served with distinction in the Papal army attaining the rank of Lieutenant and the grade of Caveliere Di Pio Nono. He fought under Kanzler at Montana after the fate of Rome, during the siege of which he aided in the defence of Porta Pia. He joined the French Pontifical Zouaves and shared the brilliant career of that corps under De Charethe.

he Calm after the Storm - Movements of Politicians-George Washingon McMullen - What he Looks Like, and Where he Goes. [FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

OTTAWA, Aug. 26. The rapidity with which the tide of oppular opinion and excitement ebbs and flows, in these restless, eventful times, is something remarkable. To-day it rises with startling rapidity, threatening to carry everything before it, and to burst every barrier of law and order; to-morrow you find the turbulent tide has as rapidly ebbed, leaving only a sluggish, and

almost stagnant stream. It is not very many days since the ever be-remembered scenes of the "18th" were enacted. Excited groups at every street corner; crowds trying to get excited at every bar; politicians pron nading in pairs, gesticulating wildly and talking in no whispered tones, or caucu ing in the committee-rooms; and in the Council Chamber, the members of the Cabinet holding their final consultation before attending the House. Then the storm—the worst exhibition of rowdyism that ever disgraced this or any other legislature since the days of Noah; and after that the tumuituous night meetings, when men thought treason, and spoke as nuch of their thoughts as they dared.

To-day, except for an occasional article in the papers, one would never know that there had been a "Pacific Scandal," that a prorogation had ever taken place or that a revolution had almost been ushered in, and rebellion proclaimed under the very dome of the Parliament buildings in the capital of "this Canada of
