



SOILED CARPETS.

Sow They May Be Cleaned and Their Colors Brightened. Carpets which have grown dirty, have lost their color and have become dull and old looking can be nicely renovated in the following manner: Cut up into very small pieces about an ounce of soap and make it into a lather with a pint of beiling water; then add another quart of water and an ounce of

borax.

CANADIAN READING CAMPS. An Association Which Endeavors to Edu

cate Laborers in Camps. The fourth annual report of the Canadian Reading Camp Association has just been published and con-tains much interesting matter concerning the illiterate conditions of the laborers in the temporary lum-

labor is chiefly recruited from the wer settlements

The practicability of manual lab-orers in the older settlements and towns acquiring an education or im-proving what they have in spare moproving what they have in spare mo-ments has often been demonstrated.

It is only within the last decade that the feasability of educating the men in the frontier camps, before mentioned, has been proven. Cor-respondence schools have established the fact that the men who have al-ready an elementary education cam improve it by studying during spare

In the last four years the Canadian Reading Camp Association has shown it to be possible to acquire even the rudiments of an education in these camps, a field which correspondence schools have not entered.

The Ontario Department of Education has assisted the Association by starting a system of camp libraries, and giving a small grant for the maintenance of reading camp in-

structors. The Y. M. C. A. sends men and tents to the militia camps which only last a few weeks. The need at the camps is not so great as at the isolated mining, lumbering and rail-

isolated mining, lumbering and railway construction camps.

Last season 25 buildings were
operated by the Canadian Reading
Camp Association, most of which
were closed during the summer
months. The first club house built
was at Copper Cliff by the Canada
Cepper Co., and its employes. This
club house is fitted up with baths,
parior, reading rooms, etc.

The majority of mining men and quite a few lumbermen have already made provisions for these camps.

Last year ten fully qualified teachers were employed, of whom two were dectors. 



JUST BREATHE.

When Worn Out Don't Take a Stime

ulant; Just Breathe. Don't take a stimulant; just breathe This is the advice of a doctor who does not believe in the old medical policy of mystery, but who undertakes philosophically to explain to any patient why such and such a remedy should be beneficial, says the Phila-

delphia Telegraph. 'When you are 'let down,' " continued this physician, "don't take a cock-tail; just breathe. Put your finger on your pulse and get its rhythm. During eight beats draw in the breath, breathing deep and low and forcing the diaphragm down first, then filling the upper lungs. Then exhale this breath during four beats of the pulse.

"Now, if you are working with piece of machinery, say a typewriter, what do you do to make it run more smoothly? You don't put a lot more oil on it and gum and clog it all up. You clean it first. You can best clean the blood by breathing. The blood passes through the lungs, and it needs and expects to find plenty of fresh air with oxygen in it. If it can't find perfectly fresh air it needs more air which is not perfectly fresh. It needs to be

cleaned by contact with the air.
"Once in awhile hold the lungs full of breath as long as you can without expulsion. In doing this you are simply cleaning the machine. You are cleaning the blood. At the same time you are giving that little fillip to the action of the heart and the nervous system which you thought you were giving when you took the cocktail. In the latter case you didn't clean the machine. You simply ran it a little faster and gummed it up a little more. You can get the same results, the same feeling of exhibaration and of accomplishment, without taking the cock tail, and at the same time the machine will steadily improve in its running Breathe the best air you can get and plenty of it. 


