A communication from R. M. Armstrong chairman of the committee in charge of construction of New Highway recommending that Mr. C. E. Fish be paid \$150 on account was read.

Ald. Williston asked how much was due Mr. Fish on contract price.

Town clerk—\$475.00.

The amount asked for was ordered paid.

A petition of Fulton Gjerde, re assessment was referred to the committee on petitions.

Ald. Wyse of the Committee on Petitions submitted reports on various petitions as follows:

Re Royal Bank. Committee asked for an extension of time until the next meeting to look more fully into matter of petition.

Extension granted.

Re The Lounsbury Co., Ltd.

Report of the Petition Committee:

TO THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF NEWCASTLE:

GENTLEMEN:—Re the assessments of the Lounsbury Company, Ltd., and Mr. J. D. Creaghan, your committee would say, that the assessors have done their duty according to our humble estimation, acting within their rights, governed by the law respecting Incorporated Companies, but considering the fact that the head office or chief place of business may be removed to some other town or city, rendering the companies liable for assessment on real estate and income only, your committee would recommend that some concession be made in the matter of their respective assessments.

Report was received and after discussion it was resolved that the petition be referred back to committee and that the committee report at next meeting what they consider a fair valuation for assessment purposes.

Re The G. A. Lounsbury estate:—

Report of the Petition Committee.

TO THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF NEWCASTLE:

GENTLEMEN: With reference to the petition of Geo. A. Lounsbury Estate for reduction of Assessment your committee would say, that whereas the Assessment of this property is based upon the valuation of the assessment and not upon the appraised value as contended in said petition and whereas no sworn statement of valuation has been placed in the hands of the assessors for assessment purposes, we see no reason why the prayer of the petitioner should be granted.

After discussion Ald. Ritchie moved that this petition also be referred back to committee.

Ald. McMurdo said he did not think it was fair to the committee to refer this back. The committee had done their work and reported according to their humble opinions and it was now up for discussion of the board.

Ald. Williston thought there was no grounds for the petition. The estate had

paid taxes on \$11,000 for a number of years. He moved as an amendment that the report of the Committee be adopted.

Crops In The West.

The agricultural possibilities of our two new Provinces are indicated by a statement of the crop estimate for 1905, just issued by the Territorial Government which shows a very substantial increase in acreage of the three cereals—wheat, oats and barley. The estimated acreage under spring wheat is 1,108,282, an increase of 150,970 acres over 1904. Acreage under oats 595,971, an increase of 71,374 acres; under barley 93,555, an increase of 7,401 acres. There is also an estimated acreage of 13,832 under fall wheat against 8,286 acres in 1904. In Alberta 85,000 sheep have been herded for shearing.

CANADA CLAIMS THE HONOR

Demonstration of Application of Wireless Telegraphy to Fast Moving Trains, First Made on the Grand Trunk Between Toronto and Montreal.

In a report from Chicago announcing that the Chicago & Alton will establish a system of wireless telegraphs on all its lines running between Chicago and St. Louis, President Felton, of the C. & A. R. was quoted as having said, in regard to a demonstration made of the system on the company's line on Thursday: "This is the first time that the wireless system has ever been used to communicate with persons on a moving train." The Grand Trunk Railway System has the distinction of having been the first railroad to use the wireless system for the exchange of signals between a moving train and a station. The demonstration was made on the occasion of the 47th annual meeting of the American Association of General Passenger and Ticket Agents, held at Portland, Me., in October, 1902. The company ran a special train through from Chicago to Montreal and thence to Portland. One of the principal attractions offered to their guests by the Grand Trunk was a successful demonstration of wireless telegraphy to a moving train, made by Dr. E. Rutherford, D. Sc., F. R. C. S., (who has recently won great fame through his investigations of Radium) and Dr. Howard T. Barnes, D. Sc., F. R. C. S., both of McGill University, St. Dominique, a station in the province of Quebec, was selected as the transmitting station, and from this point continuous communication was kept up with the train (which was running at a speed of 60 miles an hour), for several miles.

Two Lives Risked For Thirty Cents

SOLDIERS CLUNG TO SLIPPERY ROCKS ON BRINK OF NIAGARA AND RESCUED HAT FROM THE FALLS.

Thirty cents was the sum total of the reward of two Canadian militiamen for performing a feat at Niagara Falls, N. Y., yesterday afternoon, so daring that the hundreds who witnessed the deed were spellbound.

A straw hat, worth probably a dollar, a sportive southwest wind and a rock at the brink of Niagara's great falls were primarily responsible for the risking of two men's lives.

About three o'clock in the afternoon while the vantage point of Goat Island was crowded, the wind twined the straw hat from a young man's head and landed it in the water against a rock that clung to the brink of the Horse-shoe Falls. The rush of water pinned it to the rocks a half arm's length from where the water takes its great leap.

A red coated Canadian militiaman—there were several at the Falls yesterday—immediately volunteered to get it. He clambered from rock to rock until he was within eight feet of it and then tried to reach it with a stick. He took many chances, for the slightest slip meant a trip over the falls and instant death. Baffled, he was returning when a young recruit of twenty years from the Haldimand Rifles, named Hamilton, followed him over the path. He tried to reach the hat with his swagger stick, but the cane bent, and he was unable to reach the hat.

Then he lay down on the rock and leaning out, put his arms into the torrent upon a submerged rock. The swift rush of the waters shot a thin stream up to his armpit and his handkerchief was whisked from his sleeve and carried over. He waved it a gay goodbye and calmly proceeded to crawl out, inch by inch, to the hat. Finally he was resting with only his toes upon the rock and his arm in the current. The red coat who had failed, grasped Henderson by the ankle, but had Henderson slipped seriously his hold upon the slippery rock would not have served to enable him to drag Henderson back to safety. Once Henderson's arm faltered, and he all but lost his balance. But, undeterred, he made another effort and just managed to reach the hat.

They clambered back to the rock. A cheer was raised for the daredevil pair and the hat was passed to its owner.

SOILED CARPETS.

How They May Be Cleaned and Their Colors Brightened.

Carpets which have grown dirty, have lost their color and have become dull and old looking can be nicely renovated in the following manner: Cut up into very small pieces about an ounce of soap and make it into a lather with a quart of boiling water; then add another quart of water and an ounce of borax.

Put this mixture on the rug and bring it to a boil; then remove it and when it is quite cool add an ounce of alcohol, one of ammonia and half an ounce of glycerin. Do but a small portion of the carpet at a time; and renovate it by wetting a clean flannel cloth in the above mixture and rubbing in vigorously until the spots are removed and the color brought back. Another way to bring the colors out may be used, and it may be accomplished in the ordinary sweeping if salt or dried tea leaves or a mixture of both be thickly sprinkled on the carpet an hour before the sweeping is begun. Use a good, stiff broom when sweeping, and the whole appearance of the carpet will be marvellously improved.

TOILET TIPS.

Pure almond oil will not hurt the most delicate skin.

Salt water acts as a tonic on the skin.

Gently spatted on the face, it will help make the cuticle firm.

When massaging to plump the arms and throat, use cocoa butter. It is better and cheaper than cold cream.

Rose water, eight ounces, and tincture of benzoin, two drams, make one of the best skin tonics and whiteners.

Almond meal cleanses the face and leaves it in a smooth condition. Mix a small quantity with rose water and massage the whole face with this, afterward rinsing off with tepid water.

Hair can be curled constantly on the iron without injury, providing the iron is not too hot. If the hair is well curled immediately after shampooing the curl will remain in longer, the ordinary head of hair retaining it for a week.

BOOKKEEPER HAS GONE WRONG

Sensational Arrest at Dalhousie
Last Friday of Trusted
Employee.

EMBEZZLED FUNDS.

Amount not Known. Detectives
Working on Case. Examina-
tion on Friday.

Campbellton, July 3.—A sensational arrest was made in this county last Friday. Though the facts have been kept very quiet the story is now out. John Stothard, for 19 years bookkeeper for A. & R. Loggie, the big canning men, was arrested, charged with embezzlement of his employers' money at Dalhousie. Stothard is out on bail and the preliminary hearing is next Friday. As far back as seven months it is said there were suspicions that all was not right, but to confirm the fear was the difficulty. A watch was kept but it was not until the last few weeks or so that the company felt it had come time to act. A detective from Montreal has been employed ostensibly as clerk in the Loggie concern at Dalhousie. It is said that between certain recent dates something over \$2000 is known to have been taken, though the detective has not made known to every one what his time spent in the Loggie employ has resulted in his leaving. Stothard was arrested on the premises last Friday. Armed with a warrant another detective and a Campbellton constable called at the place where the accused was at work and told him he was under arrest. He did not make any comment, it is said, but went along with them to Campbellton, where he went before a justice. He was admitted to \$4,000 bail, his securities being W. S. Montgomery and Roy Moffatt. His preliminary examination is set for Friday next.

The detective who trapped the man was known as Aitken but, of course, his real name was not divulged. In addition to the charge of embezzlement there is also alleged falsifying of the books. Detectives are also said to have looked up the record of the accused in the west some 30 years ago and when the case comes up for examination there is predicted something of a sensation even more than has already been caused by his arrest. The accused is married and has several children. He has occupied a good place in the community.

WOOD MURDER STILL A MYSTERY

Verdict of Coroner's Jury Rendered at New Mills Friday.

EVIDENCE UNSATISFACTORY

Campbellton, N. B., June 30.—The coroner's jury in the Wood murder case concluded their work today, after six days sitting. The verdict of the jury is as follows:

"The jury find that the deceased, Alex Wood, came to his death on the night of June 15th, 1905, by blows inflicted with some dull weapon in the hands of some person or persons unknown."

Although the coroner, Detective Stelfington, and Prosecuting Attorney McLachy were trying to follow out some clues that developed in the early stages of the investigation, yet the evidence submitted was of a very unsatisfactory kind for forming any definite idea as to who committed the awful crime, for it was almost certain that Wood was killed in a row of some kind.

Wood was seen by a number of persons the evening before being found beside the track, and although he had been drinking, he appeared quite capable of taking care of himself. When found, the bottle contained nearly all the liquor left after treating his friends the evening before.

All of the witnesses who were in the house which Wood visited did not agree as to who were in the house, or as to what transpired, but this may not be very important.

It is quite probable that the mystery will remain unsolved unless a detective is put upon the case, and this will likely be done.

CANADIAN READING CAMPS.

An Association Which Endeavors to Educate Laborers in Camps.

The fourth annual report of the Canadian Reading Camp Association has just been published and contains much interesting matter concerning the illiterate conditions of the laborers in the temporary, lumbering, mining and railway construction camps.

The causes of this illiteracy are first, the foreign element, and secondly the fact that this class of labor is chiefly recruited from the poorer settlements.

The practicability of manual laborers in the older settlements and towns acquiring an education or improving what they have in spare moments has often been demonstrated.

It is only within the last decade that the feasibility of educating the men in the frontier camps, before mentioned, has been proven.

Correspondence schools have established the fact that the men who have already an elementary education can improve it by studying during spare moments.

In the last four years the Canadian Reading Camp Association has shown it to be possible to acquire even the rudiments of an education in these camps, a field which correspondence schools have not entered.

The Ontario Department of Education has assisted the Association by starting a system of camp libraries, and giving a small grant for the maintenance of reading camp instructors.

The Y. M. C. A. sends men and tents to the militia camps which only last a few weeks. The need at the camps is not so great as at the isolated mining, lumbering and railway construction camps.

Last season 25 buildings were operated by the Canadian Reading Camp Association, most of which were closed during the summer months. The first club house built was at Copper Cliff by the Canada Copper Co., and its employees. This club house is fitted up with baths, parlor, reading rooms, etc.

The majority of mining men and quite a few lumbermen have already made provisions for these camps. Last year ten fully qualified teachers were employed, of whom two were doctors. The doctors practiced medicine in the camps and one of the teachers acted as clerk, while the others engaged in manual labor.

Each man earned over one-half of his salary, the association paying the rest.

Treasurer for Half a Century.

CREW RESCUED IN MID-OCEAN.

WRECKED AT SEA.

Picked Up June 4th by Barque Telefon and Landed at Chatham.

The barque Telefon which arrived at Chatham on Friday had the Captain, wife and little boy and seven sailors of the schooner Minto of Harbor Grace, Newfoundland on board, which were picked up in mid-ocean on June 4th. The weather for several days previous had been very rough and the schooner which had a cargo of coal and sundries labored heavily and finally lost her bowsprit in a gale split which the stern, starting the planks. She was put before the wind and a piece of canvas fastened over the hole, but leaked badly and had not the Telefon hove in sight another sea disaster would have been recorded.

Capt. Burke and his crew launched a boat in the rough sea and were taken on board, after considerable difficulty. The Captain's wife was put into a rope chair and hauled up and the little boy was securely fastened in a sailors' pit bag and also hauled on board. The little fellow was only three years old. The nearly exhausted crew were tenderly cared for and when they arrived at Chatham were none the worse for their rough experience.

No Light Yet on the Mysterious Death of Alex. Wood at New Mills; Inquest Will Probably Close To-morrow.

Campbellton, June 28.—Contrary to general expectations, nothing new was brought out at today's sitting of the coroner's inquest that would tend to clear up the mystery surrounding the death of Alex. Wood on the night of the 15th. The problem seems to be a difficult one, but the prosecution is leaving nothing un-done to get at the facts. It looks now as if the inquest would be concluded on Friday.

The murder resembles the McCarthy tragedy which occurred at

Shediac a great many years ago. Woods was no doubt killed in a house; his coat which shows no sign of a bullet hole, was put on after the fatal blow was struck, as the skirt and undershirt show the opening made by a sharp instrument, opposite the wound in the body, and the inside of the coat sleeve is saturated with blood. His face having been washed, shows a pre-meditated crime, and to conceal it the unfortunate fellow was carried near the railway track to leave impression that he was killed by a train.

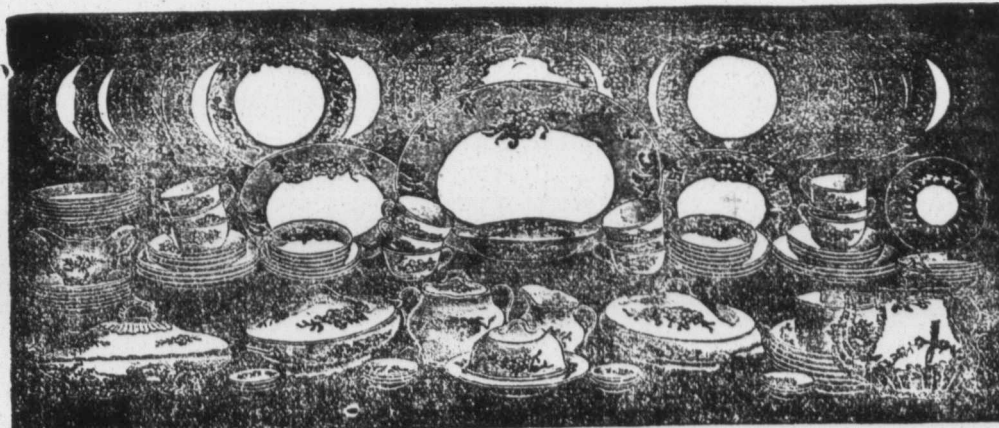
