THE TENDER SYSTEM AND ITS ABUSES

Or How The Graphic Lost The Printing of the Town Report

The tender system in buying or contracting has been proven to be a good one when carried on in the right way, but when not properly safeguarded it is anything but fair to the tenderers.

A case in point was the awarding to the Campbellton Tribune the printing of the Town Blue Book.

When the manuscript for the printing of the report was about ready the town clerk phoned the Graphic Office and asked if we could as usual undertake the printing of same. We replied that we were ready, and if copy was forthcoming promptly would have it out on time. He asked us our price and we immediately said "the same as last year," and were asked to put this writing, which we did.

In the meantime Mr. C. S. O. Crockett of the Tribune called upon the Town Clerk and asked him what the Graphic's price was for doing the work last year and was told \$1.25 per page. He immediately wrote out a tender for the work at \$1.24 and was awarded the contract.

While the work was awaiting the Tribune in an irregular way the Graphic did not intend to refer to the matter if the printing was done in Campbellton. But what do we find? The Tribune farmed the work out to the Fredericton Gleaner and the town of Campbellton has contributed \$4.00 to help keep the Gleaner presses running, while the Tribune gets \$19.50. If the work had been done in Campbellton, the whole amount with the exception of a small sum for white paper would have remained at home to pay wages, electric light and power, etc., and eventually indirectly benefit every citizen. Now it has gone to Fredericton to help citizens of that city.

We surely need a Buy At Home Advertising campaign in Campbellton.

DISGRACEFUL WAY PASSENGERS SERVED

Suburban Passengers Kept For Hours At Depot Here.

The train service in and out of Campbellton has been anything but good during the past three months, but travellers home put up with existing conditions because they understand the main business of the railway in war time was to get troops and munitions to embarking ports.

But all the trouble that arises is not from this cause, and the passengers who were held at the depot last Friday night from nine until 1:30 a. m., certainly think that patience has ceased to be a virtue.

At Suburban time Friday night there were by actual count sixty-seven people to take the train. At that time the train, which is made up and starts from here was reported thirty minutes late, but the minutes dragged along until twelve midnight when the passengers who had waited were told the train was ready. They moved out of the depot and on the track saw a freight van. Into this car, which has no seats and very little space, an endeavor was made to crowd sixty-seven men and women and a few children, but it was impossible and some of the men laid the matter before the management who after another hour and a half waiting or at 1:30 supplied a cold dirty car and the train started for its destination.

Passengers are loud in their condemnation of the treatment they received on that occasion.

Besides her husband and one child the deceased is survived by her parents Mr. and Mrs. John Harquail, Dalhousie, three brothers, Joseph, tailor of St. John, N. Colombe and Miss Alb-in all of Dalhousie.

MADE BIG HAUL OF GOODS IN TRANSIT

Mont Joli Citizen Had Over \$2,000. Dollars Worth in House and Barn.

PROHIBITION ACT INSPECTOR NAMED

Rev. W. D. Wilson Will Be The Man—Government Getting Down to Work.

Fredericton, N. B., April 6.—The legislature has been called to meet Thursday, April 10, and between then there will be the by-elections on April 30. The government after it was sworn in Wednesday, sat in council that afternoon and evening and the next day, and transacted much important business. There was much to consider, including many items that had been left over by their predecessors. The Valley Railway Company appeared before the council Thursday and gave some information regarding the construction of the road, its present condition and also some idea of the requirements to complete. The situation from a financial standpoint is very serious and will demand the earnest attention of the premier and the provincial secretary. Calley railway finances will always be a dark spot upon New Brunswick's record and the debt because of the railway a burden upon the people.

Prohibition Inspector
The Dominion Alliance sent a delegation to the appointment of a provincial inspector under the prohibitory law, and as a result the government accepted the recommendation of the alliance and appointed their organizer Rev. W. D. Wilson, as chief inspector. There were but few applicants for the position. The alliance has assumed the serious burden of enforcing the act through the appointment of the inspector they recommended.

The question of refunding the public debt which is under consideration in other provinces was taken up, and Premier Foster, Hon. C. W. Robinson and the provincial secretary were delegated to take up the matter.

It was decided to employ an expert accountant of dominion-wide reputation to examine into the financial affairs of the province and report upon the same.

The Gleaner contract for printing the Royal Gazette was ordered cancelled, and another contract was entered into for the work with the Mail Printing Company.

Hon. C. J. Osman was appointed a commissioner of the Jordan Sanitarium, in place of ex-Governor McClellan, deceased.

The grant for the Maritime Home for Girls was increased to \$200.

Messrs. Foster, Roberts, Robinson, Dugal and Byrne were appointed the Provincial Hospital Commission.

The board of works consists of the minister, Hon. Mr. Veniot, and Messrs. Murray and Smith.

MILL WILL GO UP

LIKE CIRCUS TENTS

Will Take Less Than An Hour To Erect Mills of the Forestry ..

... Battalion Now Recruiting

The same rapidity which draws crowds of wondering young boys and girls to watch the erection of a circus tent will characterize the establishment of one of the mills of the second Forestry Battalion, now recruiting. The mills are compact, portable affairs, most of the parts of which are carried on wheels.

When the scene of operations is reached in the Old Country and subsequently on the Continent there will be a job for everyone. With the same system which characterizes the work of the Engineers and other units, the mill will be up and working in less than half an hour from its arrival.

While some of the lumbermen are placing the various parts in position, engineers will be getting up steam in the boiler and all parts of the structural work will be completed at about the same time.

The Battalion's work will be the destruction of some of the old oak forests and woods on the country estates in the Old Country. Oak is needed to supply the Allies heavy artillery in their advance over trenches, morasses, shell craters and streams. Administrative headquarters in England have been as reluctant as anyone to demolish the famous oak woods, but they have found that other softer material will not do.

The Unit's work of demolition will be thorough and wasteful. The trees will be cut to the ground and every portion of them utilized with the possible exception of the leaves for which no use has yet been discovered. Block and tackle will bring the old trees down and the wood will be shipped to France and Belgium in barks and these will not be cut except on the orders of Officers of the units which need the timber. Care will be taken to use as little as possible and none at all when other material will prove satisfactory.

But while the Forestry Battalion have the mills and the equipment for their men ready they will need the men. They want everyone who has ever worked in a lumber mill in any capacity and they want them badly. Included in the men they are after are blacksmiths, sawfilers, edgemen, stickmen, checkers and laborers.

They are particularly after men of will be able to go forward with a unshakable trade. The members of the unit innum of drill, their work being for the most part some distance behind the line and with a minimum of military discipline.

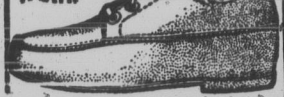

THE COST OF GROWING POTATOES

(Experimental Farms Note)

In potato growing provinces like
New Brunswick there is always more
or less discussion as to what it should
cost to grow a good crop of potatoes
and statements vary from as low as
\$40.00 per acre to as high as \$125.00.
Naturally there will be much varia-
tion in cost according to local condi-
tions and especially to the ability of
the land to produce without expensive
fertilizing. It should be borne in
mind that it will usually cost the po-
tato specialist more to grow his crop
than it will the farmer who follows
mixed farming and makes his potato
crop merely one of his many activities.

With a view to getting actual fig-
ures under average conditions in New
Brunswick, a careful record has been
made at the Dominion Experimental
Station, Fredericton, for the past two
seasons with an acre of land set apart
for this particular purpose.

Neither rent of land nor depre-
ciation of machinery was included in
the calculation, for these two are
items that are largely in the hands
of the individual grower. As a gen-
eral rule, however, it would be fair
to charge as rent, 10 per cent of the
value of the land, and special potato
machinery will depreciate from 25 per
cent per year if used steadily for ten
days each season. In 1915, the depre-
ciation of the potato digger alone, used
at the Experimental Station, was
\$6.00 per acre.

In 1915, the acre was planted with
Green Mountain, Irish Cobbler and
Empire State. Seed, cultural opera-
tions and harvesting cost in all \$67.93.
Eighty barrels of 165 pounds each
of marketable potatoes were obtained
and sold at \$1.75 per barrel making a
cents per barrel. Seven barrels of
culls were sold for \$3.50, so that the
profit over cost of production of 90

total profit for the acre amounted to
\$75.50.

This land was rather wet naturally
and during the very rainy weather of
June and July was several times flood-
ed causing missed hills and inferior
plants generally. This land was origi-
nally cleared many years ago and after
cutting hay for thirty years it was al-
lowed to grow up to spruce, birch and
alder. It was again cleared in 1913
and grew buckwheat in 1914.

In 1916, an acre was planted with
Green Mountain seed.

The total cost amounted to \$82.33,
the increase over 1915 being due to
high priced seed, higher priced fertil-
izer ingredients and very dear copper
sulphate.

One hundred and twenty barrels of
marketable potatoes were harvested
and could have been sold at \$2.25 per
barrel, making a profit per barrel over
cost of production of \$1.56%; plus
six barrels of culls at 50 cents, mak-
ing a total profit of \$190.20.

Market price when potatoes were
they could have been sold \$3.25, but
was held for seed.

This land grew hay for many years
and was broken up and grew potatoes
with 750 pounds fertilizer in 1915,
corn with 15 tons manure in 1915.
In 1914, oats without manure in 1915.
This land is on a slope, fairly well
drained and except for washing out
