



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IS DANIELS' PREDICTION REGULATIONS FOR

avy Secretary Declares Allies Will Hold Line Till Effective Help From States Arrives.

Boston, April 26—Speaking at a Liberty loan rally last night, Secretary of the Navy Daniels said the Allies would hold the line until the United States could send ten million men to France and that this country would build ships until we had the greatest navy in the world. There are now 40,000 naval men in foreign service, he said, and there are thousands more waiting at home for ships upon which to get into action. "The only embarrasment we are having with the navy," he said, "is that 90 per cent of the men are clamporing to go on destroyers so they can see quick action and, lots of it." He said that so long as the British, French and American fleets controlled the seas Germany could not win.

Referring to the German drive on the Western front, he said: "Now, thank God, the Allied armiss on the west front are under one command, that of the great Frenchman, Foch. The acid test for us at home is whether we shall subscribe or over-subscribe the Liberty loan."

Plans for increased production of food grains may be thwarted in part by the unwitting use of frozen eats for seed purposes. These are not suitable for milling and are plentiful in the market at from fifteen to twenty-five cents per bushel less than osts of the established seed grades which must be practically clean and germinate not less than eighty percent during the first four days undertest.

Farmers should be on their sard against buying cats that are foul with wild black oats and weed seeds and should carefully test their seed oats for germination. Plant 160 average grains of oats in a flower pot or box of soil which should be kept moist but not wet, in a sunny window at living-room temperature, or send sample addressed to Seed Commissioner, Ottawa, enclosing name and address.

Seed Branch inspectors have taken numerous samples of oats which are being purchased by farmers for seed purposes but which will germinate only thirty to sixty per pent and are foul with noxious weed seeds.

No person shall be served at any No person shall be served at any meal more than two ounces of white bread or rolls, or other product made from standard flour, or four ounces of bread or other product made from bran, oats, barley or other flour.

Bread shall be twelve hours old before being served.

The serving of bread, except under poached egg. as a garnish in any

form is not allowed.

Butter: No more than one-half ounce of butter or eleomargarine shall be served to a person at a meal un-

ounce of butter or oleomargarine shall be served to a person at a meal unless upon special request, when a second serving of not more than this amount may be given.

Sugar: Sugar for any purpose shall only be served when called for by the person requiring it. Sugar receptacles shall not be left on the dining tables or counters.

Waste: Hoarding and cornering the market to enhance prices are punishable offences, no matter whether waster or hoarding is in connection with private house, eating place or merchant's and storage premises.

The municipal authorities are charged with responsibility of enforcing these regulations. It is the duty of the police to enforce these regulations.

Unless these regulations are faithfully enforced, grave injustice may be inflicted upon the patriotic and lawabiding proprietor. Customers may leave him to go to eating places where the law is not observed.

Commercial travellers are requested to cut out this article for their information and co-operate with the Food Board and civic authorities in

formation and co-operate with the Food Board and civic authorities in securing the enforcement of these regulations. At least they can call the attention of the proprietors to any violation of these provisions.


