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REGULATIONS FOR FISHING IN N. B.

Restrictions Which Should Be Remembered—Rules Vary in Other Parts of Prov.

Official advice concerning fishery regulations for the province of New Brunswick have been received from Ottawa.

Salmon fishing is prohibited except by gill-nets, drift nets, trap nets, or by angling. The mesh shall not be less than five inches extension measure.

Salmon net fishing is prohibited except by license. The fee for a gill or drift net license is \$1 for the first ten fathoms and three cents for each additional fathom.

Salmon fishing by nets is prohibited from August 16 until the last day of February, both inclusive, except on the Petitcodiac below the Moncton highway bridge, where the season for catches. Flowers chiefly of the close period from Saturday until Monday.

Shad may be fished for only by license, costing \$1, from May 16 until June 20. From Saturday afternoon until Monday morning fishing of shad in the harbor is prohibited.

The closed season for trout is from October 1 to March 31. In Loch Lomond the catch per day is restricted to 12 fish, brown trout less than 12 inches in length must be thrown back into the lake.

Cod-fishing by seines is prohibited within half a mile of fishermen operating from anchored boats, with hooks and lines.

Use of explosives is prohibited in fishing of any kind.

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FOUND GRAVES IN BEAUTIFUL ORDER

High Commissioner Larkin Returns to London After Inspecting.

London, May 16.—Hon. P. C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner, returned yesterday from his visit to France and Flanders, whether in the name of Canadian representative of the War Graves Commission during the visit to the soldiers' graves by Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary.

He was greatly impressed by the reverence displayed by the King, Queen and Queen in all they saw during their tour. Commissioner Larkin visited the Canadian cemeteries at Etaples, Vlamertinghe and Merlincourt.

At Etaples the Canadian High Commissioner inspected 1,120 Canadian graves of a total of 12,000. Here and elsewhere he found the graves in beautiful order.

Permanent lodges already have been erected over the great majority of the graves. The stones are sunk in long concrete beds giving an assurance of endurance even for centuries.

Flowers, chiefly of the wall flower variety abound in all these resting places. The ground is sodded day dates from low water, except on the St. John river, where the closed period is from 6 p.m. Saturday until 6 a.m. Monday.

Salmon angling is permissible from May 24th to August 31, inclusive, except on the Restigouche, where the period is from April 1 to August 15.

The number of salmon taken in any one day by an angler shall not exceed five, and only artificial flies shall be used.

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SALMON ANGLING LEASES SOLD

The Two Run for Five Year—Bought by New Workers.

CAMPBELLTON, May 17.—Two year salmon angling leases were sold at noon today at public auction. The leases were for fishing privileges only and were the only two five-year leases which were not sold on March 22.

The Rafting Ground Reserve was sold at the upset price of \$100 to Sigmund M. Lehman, New York, while the Patapedia River, southwest bank from its mouth to the Quebec line was sold to Edward R. Hewitt, New York, for \$155, the upset price being \$50.

Mr. Hewitt also holds the Quebec rights on this stream. No bids were made for the twelve ten-year leases which remained unsold at the conclusion of the March sale.

The leases sold today will expire on March 1, 1927. The prices bid for these annual payments for the leases.

GO CAREFULLY.
A special meeting of the town council is called for this evening to consider the matter of the purchase of motor trucks.

So far as we are able to judge these trucks will be required only for permanent street work and their purchase should be carefully considered before being agreed to.

There is no doubt about the economy of motor trucks in road building, but does the town of Campbellton contemplate going into this business? Would it not be better for the town to let a contract for this work.

The whole matter needs considerable study and we trust our council will not rush into the purchase of an expensive road building plant at this stage of the game.

It is now over a year since Mr. Fred LeBlanc sustained a painful and serious injury to his right leg by accidentally stepping into one of the many holes which punctuated almost every yard of our old plank sidewalks.

So far as we can learn, nothing has been done on the part of town officials whereby a satisfactory settlement of the matter may be accomplished.

It would appear that those in local authority have not taken sufficient interest or trouble to fully acquaint themselves with the lamentable circumstances of the case. Surely, did they possess a complete knowledge of the matter, they would be not only willing but anxious to deal sympathetically with the victim of the affair and effect a liberal or, at least, a just settlement.

As already stated, more than a year has elapsed since the accident. To Mr. LeBlanc, this means one year of his life lost, for he has been incapacitated for that length of time. What opportunity to enjoy this splendid financial way we cannot ascertain, but it can be easily imagined what a year of illness would mean to any young man endeavoring to build up a business. "Hard Luck" is what we would all call it; but it is infinitely worse luck to receive such inconsiderate treatment from the town council as Mr. LeBlanc has received.

While it is true that the party mentioned was able to be about for a time last fall, it is also true that he has been confined to his home nearly all winter and that he has been bed-fast for about three months of that time.

It is safe to say that, were the victim of this misfortune a man of wealth and influence, the case would have been disposed of long ago and, most likely, at a much greater cost than the small amount of damages which Mr. LeBlanc has requested.

This delay is manifestly unjust. Some definite steps should be taken at once.

ILLEGAL SALE OF LIQUOR DECREASING

Washington, May 16—According to Prohibition Commissioner Haynes and other dry enforcement officials, the inflow of illegal liquor from Canada is rapidly decreasing. Prohibition directors in border states and in the states some distance south of the border, into which rum runners have carried large amounts of liquor in swift automobiles, report to Washington a steady falling off in illicit operations.

OBITUARY.
Edward L. O'Brien, M. A., Bathurst, Gloucester county, was found dead in his bed on last Sunday morning. He had not been in good health for some time, but his condition was not supposed to be serious. Deceased was a son of the late John E. O'Brien, in his day a shipbuilder and leading citizen of Bathurst. He studied in St. Joseph's College and the U. N. B., making an excellent record, and became a school teacher. He taught school in St. John, among other places, and finally for some years filled the position of school inspector in the northern part of the province.

Retiring from school work, he became police magistrate at Bathurst and registrar of probates, and filled these positions to the great satisfaction of the community. His death at the age of 62 will be heard with deep regret throughout the North Shore, and also in other sections of New Brunswick, where he had many friends. Mr. O'Brien is survived by two brothers, J. M. O'Brien, Bathurst, and Frank O'Brien, Toronto, and by two sisters, Misses Minnie and Elizabeth. The funeral on Sunday was very largely attended. The procession was headed by the band of the C. M. B. A., representatives of the Assumption Society, the C. M. B. A. and almost the entire membership of the Knights of Columbus. High Mass of Requiem at the Sacred Heart church was celebrated by Rev. John Whalen, assisted by Rev. A. A. Boucher, of West Bathurst, as deacon, and Rev. Father George of the Eudist Seminary as sub-deacon. J. P. Leger, H. A. Malanson, R. A. Sturton, E. J. White, B. C. Mullins and C. T. Richard were pall-bearers.

CAR SAVES FOUR WORKMEN'S TIME

Contractor Uses Dodge Brothers Car to Saw Lumber for Houses.

Making a Dodge Brothers business car into the place of four carpenters is a job that would puzzle many an engineer or efficiency expert. It has been accomplished, however, by G. G. Martin, Los Angeles building contractor, who simply hooked up the rear wheel of his car to a lumber sawing attachment. And unlike the four men replaced, the contrivance is totally indifferent to the little problems sometimes involved in union cards and the 8-hour day.

Mr. Martin took out the right rear axle of his car, pulled the left rear axle out about four inches, ran a short shaft entirely through the differential, and attached a split pulley to the shaft. He then jacked up one wheel and his sawing machine was ready for operation. The car is run at a speed equivalent to 17 miles an hour, and averages about thirty miles of sawing, so to speak, to the gallon of gasoline.

Recently when the Dodge Brothers car was put to the test it saved all the lumber required in the erection of a seven room bungalow in one hour and forty minutes, using less than a gallon of gasoline. Besides the saving in labor, a great deal of time was gained in construction.

According to Mr. Martin who has driven Dodge Brothers cars for seven years and is thoroughly familiar with them, his attachment does not impair the car's efficiency in the slightest degree.
