

British Government Leader Warned by His Physician That Continuance of Public Duties Might Mean a Complete Breakdown—Had Been Absent From Commons For a Week-Was Reported That His Health Was Improving -Announcement Comes As Great Surprise.

London, March 17 .- Andrew Bonar Law, lord of the privy seal, today resigned from the cabinet. Ill-health was given as the reason for his resignation. Mr. Law also retired from the Government leadership in the House of Commons.

The announcement of Mr. Bonar Law's retirement was made in the House of Commons by Mr. Lloyd George, who was so deeply affected that he could hardly finish his statement. The prime minister said he had received a letter from Mr. Bonar Law this morning, stating he had been warned by his physicians that if he continued he would run the danger of a complete

Mr. Bonar Law had been absent from the House of Commons the whole of this week, but he was reported to be improving in health, and his resignation of the leadership of the House came as a complete surprise

came as a complete surprise.

The letter of Mr. Bonar Law expressed regret that he was unable to continue his political work.

"The strain of the last fev years has been most heavy on me, and as you know well, for more than three years I have had the greatest difficulty in doing my work," Mr. Bonar Law declared. "Now I am worn out, and my medical advisers have warned me that my physical condition is such that, un less I have an immediate and long rest, an early and complete breakdown is inevitable."

The Right Hon, Andrew Bonar Law has long been prominent in British politics, and since 1916 has been the Government leader in the House of Commons. He became lord of the privy seal in in January, 1919.

Mr. Bonar Law was first elected to the Commons in 1900. He was a member of Mr. Lloyd George's war cabinet as chancellor of the exchequer from December, 1916, to December, 1918, and was one of the British delegates to the peace conference in Paris in 1919.

Born in New Brunswick in 1858, the son of the Rev. James Law and Eliza A. K. Law, Mr. Bonar Law received his education in Canada, and in the Glasgow High School. He married Annie Pitcairn Robley of Glasgow in 1891. She died in 1909.

Washington, March 17 .- Withdrawal of supervision over the manufacture and sale of explosives in the United States with the repeal by Congress of war legislation, has made it easy for anarchists, safe blowers, and others, to obtain explosives for illegal purposes, said a statement issued today by the bureau of mines.

Spontaneous Combustion Is Blamed For Blaze At Detroit Docks.

[Special to The Advertiser.] DETROIT. March 16 .- Flames which broke out in the engine room of the teamer City of Cleveland III. of the Detroit and Cleveland Navigation Company, moored at the foot of Wayne street today threatened for a time to destroy the vessel.

Quick action on the part of the fire department prevented serious damage. Tons of water and chemicals were poured into her hold, and the damage was confined to a few thousand dollars. THE JUNIOR GRADES

was confined to a few thousand dollars. Spontaneous combustion is said to have caused the fire which started under an ice machine amidships. Andrew McCarthy, chief engineer, and a crew of firemen were the only persons on duty in the lower part of the ship when the blaze started. The engine room crew formed a bucket brigade and endeavored to combat the fire. Smoke was pouring from air chambers on the main deck when a special officer on the ship on his rounds of the decks. 

Financial Conditions Do Not Warrant Going On For Awhile.

HAS COST \$23,000,000

Dr. Reid Says Western Lines Are More Urgently Required.

West was keeply interested in this project, and quoted Sir Robert Borden as saying in 1917 that the road would be finished without unnecessary delay. Now, after \$23,000,000 had been spent, it appeared as if the Government was abandoning the work.

Is Not Feasible.

E. W. Nesbitt (North Oxford) said that as far as he was concerned, the Government would not proceed with the construction of the Hudson Bay railway. It was not feasible for many reasons. The navigation was limited to three months in the year; it would require two dredges working the whole of the open season to keep Port Nelson free of silt; it would be necessary to construct elevators and a special class of ships that could not compete on other routes would have to be procured. Mr. Nesbitt did not believe the Hudson Bay Railway would reduce the cost of transportation. It would be suicide to add in any way to the railway problem at the present time.

The people of Canada did not comprehend what the country was up against in the present railway problem. The Government was not to blame. As a Liberal, in 1904, he had advocated building the Transcontinental Railway, and if his efforts gained him one vote, he felt he should be put in jail for it. If his support in the Commons helped to carry the Transcontinental Railway legislation, Mr. Nesbitt declared that he ought to be executed instead of being put in jail.

Extraordinary precautions were observed to prevent betrayal of de Valera, the correspondent being guided to him by a member of the "Irish Volunteers" and kept under surveillance for an hour after leaving the Sinn Fein leader.





Important Amendment.

Important amendments to the workmen's compensation act were contained in a bill which Hon. Walter Rollo introduced in the Legislature this afternoon. It mostly affected schedule 2 industries, which include railway, steamship, express, telegraph and telephone companies under other classes.

It is set forth under the proposed amendments that employers in this schedule are required to re-employ injured workmen at suitable renuneration and work. Any man not so re-employed shall be considered to be permanently totally disabled or disabled to the extent of the difference in his earnings before and after the accident, and the employer shall be liable to pay compensation in accordance therewith. It is left to the discretion of the board to modify this section in respect to any industry. The section is retroactive. Important Amendment.

Provides For Pension.

Another amendment regarding schedule 2 industries provides for the creation of a pension fund to safeguard dependents of injured workmen, similar to that created under schedule 1, and to amalgamate the two funds. All pensions now being paid under schedule 2 are to be revalued and the employers will be required to pay into the fund a sum equal to the capitalized value of each award. Deposits now standing to the credit of any award will be deducted from the capitalized value. The pension fund thus created will hereafter be liable for the payment of all awards, whether for accidents happening before or after the amendment is enacted, and employers shall be released from all individual liability. In order to meet any default of schedule, employers who may have heretofore or hereafter occurred, the board may at any time assess the employers to an amount not exceeding in any case I per cent of the employers' accident cost for the year. The section including government employees has been added at the request of certain departments, as, for instance, the northern development branch of the Ontario Government.

For Farm Laborers.

Another amendment announced by the minister was to allow the workmen's compensation board to grant compensation to farm laborers and domestic servants under part 1 of the act, on the request of the employers.

Thousands Devote Sunday to Visiting Tomb Under

Man in Charge At Present
Has To Do the Chores.

It is known as "The Cult of the Faithful," its ranks being filled by all classes from the highest social and diplomatic circles to the poorest working people, who devote Sunday mornings and afternoons to twisting the tomb of the unknown soldier beneath the Arch of Triumph instead of praying or singing hymns in the more ancient edifices.

Last Sunday it was estimated that more than 70,000 visited the tomb between sunrise and twilight, each remaining just long enough to walk around the flower-heaped dais as a homage to the memory of the unknown hero.

The foreign diplomatic staffs have taken up the idea since the Chinese minister, accompanied by naval and millitary attaches, dipped the flag of the eastern republic in respectful salute.

Troop after troop of French Boy Scouts laid floral tributes on the tomb, but the most devout rite of all invariably is when the black-gowned mother and sisters of some French war victims succeed in squeezing through the crowds and kneel beside the simple granite slab.

Social workers report that the farreaching influence of the unnamed hero's tomb is being felt in the rougher districts of Paris, where Sunday formerly was devoted to the wildest orgies. Now scores professing to be anarchists and atheists are giving up their old habits because "it interferes with the duty to some former comrade."

The movement is to-be spread through the schools next year, one idea prominently suggested being that daily the pupils of one Paris school should be selected to deposit a wreath on the grave of the unknown hero in behalf of a grateful younger generation. Advocates of the plan declare this will do more to inculcate real patriotism and eliminate the danger of future Bolshevism than any other phase of social effort.


