

POLISH-RUSSIAN PACT

Continuance of Public Duties Might Mean a Complete Breakdown—Had Been Absent From Commons For a Week-Was Reported That His Health Was Improving -Announcement Comes As Great Surprise.

London, March 17.—Andrew Bonar Law, lord of the privy seal, today resigned from the cabinet. Ill-health was given as the reason for his resignation. Mr. Law also retired from the Government leadership in the House of Commons.

The announcement of Mr. Bonar Law's retirement was made in the House of Commons by Mr. Lloyd George, who was so deeply affected that he could hardly finish his statement. The prime minister said he had received a letter from Mr. Bonar Law this morning, stating he had been warned by his physicians that if he continued he would run the danger of a complete

Mr. Bonar Law had been absent from the House of Commons the whole of this week, but he was reported to be improving in health, and his resignation of the leadership of the House came as a complete surprise

came as a complete surprise.

The letter of Mr. Bonar Law ex-opressed regret that he was unable to continue his political work.

"The strain of the last fev years has been most heavy on me, and as you know well, for more than three years I have had the greatest difficulty in doing my work," Mr. Bonar Law declared. "Now I am worn out, and my medical advisers have warned me that my physical condition is such that, unless I have an immediate and long rest, an early and complete breakdown is inevitable."

The Right Hon, Andrew Bonar Law has long been prominent in British politics, and since 1916 has been the Government leader in the House of Commons. He became lord of the privy seal in in January, 1919.

Mr. Bonar Law was first elected to the Commons in 1900. He was a member of Mr. Lloyd George's war cabinet as chancellor of the exchequer from December, 1916, to December, 1918, and was one of the British delegates to the peace conference in Paris in 1919.

Born in New Brunswick in 1858, the son of the Rev. James Law and Eliza A. K. Law, Mr. Bonar Law received his education in Canada, and in the Glasgow High School. He married Annie Pitcairn Robley of Glasgow in 1891. She died in 1909.

KRONSTADT CAPTURED.
Riga, March 17.—The Russian mission here asserted today that the Boisheviki captured Kronstadt from the revolutionists Wednesday night.

Copenhagen, March 17.—The Bolshevik batteries on the Karelin headland opened a strong fire against Kronstadt yesterday, says the Helsingfors correspendent of the Berlingske Tidende today. The bombardment from Kronstadt caused four extensive fires along the coast towards Petrograd, the warships at Kronstadt participating in the bombardment, the correspondent adds. Finnish refugees from Systerbak report the Bolsheviki are making extensive preparations for a new attack on Kronstadt, four artillery divisions, with forty-eight 4-inch and 6-inch guns being concentrated between Systerbak and Petrograd.

EASY FOR CRIMINALS TO SECURE EXPLOSIVES

Washington, March 17 .- Withdrawal of supervision over the manufacture and sale of explosives in the United States with the repeal by Congress of war legislation, has made it easy for anarchists, safe blowers, and others, to obtain explosives for illegal purposes, said a statement issued today by the bureau of mines.

In urging legislation to control the handling as well as the manufacture and sale of explosives, the bureau asserted that the United States is practically the only civilized government in the world that fails to exercise a national supervision over explosives, and declared it is easier to obtain closives in this country than in any other.

Large stores of explosives, the statement said, have been thin the limits of cities and towns where an explocause loss of life and property.



Extraordinary precautions were observed to prevent betrayal of de Valera, the correspondent being guided to him by a member of the "Irish Volunteers" and kept under surveillance for an hour after leaving the Sinn Fein leader.

Among other things, de Valera ac-

Among other things, de Valera accused the British Government of lacking principle and statesmanship.
"England," he said, "is trying to win by playing on human weakness. As a matter of fact, she is playing on the strongest quality of the Irish people—their spiritual quality. The young men of Ireland are saying to themselves:

men of Ireland are saying to themselves:

"At best the span of life is only 70 years. We must all die. So why not now in circumstances like these?"

The correspondent was placed in the side-car of a motorcycle and made to don goggles, which effectively blinded him. He was not allowed to note the intricate route taken by the motorcycle through Dublin. On leaving the private house in which he talked to De Valera the correspondent was twice held up and examined, once by members of the Irish Republican Army and once by crown forces.

De Valera declared that there was no truth in the rumors of overtures for a truce or peace, or that the Dail Eireann had laid down new conditions.

Questioned as to whether the offer of full fiscal autonomy would induce acceptance of the patition act, the Sinn Fein leader said that the act was made by a "foreign hostile assembly, and that therefore "the Irish people as a whole would never accept it."

THE PROBLEM

The problem is to draw a chain of circles once across the chart, from the first column on the left to the last column on the right, selecting the figures to encircle from which you can obtain the greatest difference between the sum total of the even and the sum total of the odd figures. The odd figures are 3, 5, 7 and 9, and the even, 2, 4, 6, 8. By "sum total" is meant the figures added together. That is, you are to take the odd figures you put circles around, and add them up; then the even figures, and the difference between the two totals is your solution. The chain must be drawn in continuous sections of either three, four or five circles to a section. By "section" is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line. You may use either number of circles you wish in each section. The sections of the chain may go either up or down, or to the right, but not to the left. That is, start in the first column by drawing either three, four or five circles up or down, as you wish; then proceed to the right, then up or down again; then to the right, and so on until you reach the last column. The chain must end with either three, four or five circles in this column. QUEBEC, March 16.—The new license bill sponsored by Provincial Treasurer Mitchell provides for a tax of \$200 on film exchanges; \$10 a day for each race meeting within a radius of 30 miles of Montreal and \$8 a day in Quebec, but if there is any betting the license fee shall be \$1.200 a day on one-mile tracks, \$600 a day on half-mile tracks and \$300 a day for other tracks, with double these fees if the pari-mutuel system of betting is not used.

Every person betting at a pari-mutuel meeting must pay a duty equal to 10 per cent of the amount deposited.

No betting may be carried on outside the pari-mutuel method unless a special license is issued on payment of a duty of \$1,000 a day.

In determining the number of circles in each section count the last circle in one section as the first in the next. The figures in the corner circles, however, are to be counted but once when adding them up to get the totals of the odd and even figures. You may start at any figure you wish in the extreme left-hand column. There must be one section running up or down in this column as well as in the last column.

The sum total of the even numbers, 46, 58, 92, etc., is 750, and the sum total of the odd numbers, viz., 69, 75, 83, etc., 892. The difference between these totals is 142.





R. L. Important Amendment.

Important amendments to the workmen's compensation act were contained in a bill which Hon. Walter Rollo introduced in the Legislature this afternoon. It mostly affected schedule 2 industries, which include railway, steamship, express, telegraph and telephone companies under other classes.

It is set forth under the proposed amendments that employers in this schedule are required to re-employ injured workmen at suitable remuneration and work. Any man not so re-employed shall be considered to be permanently totally disabled or disabled to the extent of the difference in his earnings before and after the accident, and the employer shall be llable to pay compensation in accordance therewith. It is left to the discretion of the board to modify this section is retroactive.

Provides For Pension.

Another amendment regarding schedule 2 industries provides for the creation of a pension fund to safeguard dependents of injured workmen, similar to that created under schedule 1, and to amalgammate the two funds. All pensions now being paid under schedule 2 are to be revalued and the employers will be required to pay into the fund a sum equal to the capitalized value of each award. Deposits now standing to the credit of any award will be deducted from the capitalized value. The pension fund thus created will hereafter be liable for the payment of all awards, whether for accidents happening before or after the amendment is enacted, and employers shall be released from all individual liability. In order to meet any default of schedule, employers who may have heretofore or hereafter occurred, the board may at any time assess the employers accident cost for the year. The section including government employees has been added at the request of certain departments, as, for instance, the northern development branch of the Ontario Government.
