Charles Hilliker of Burgessville Expires in Woodstock.

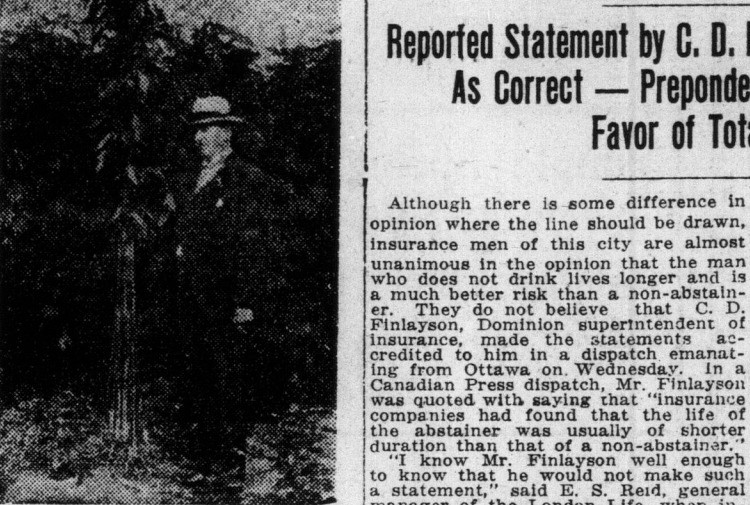

EASY FOR CRIMINALS TO SECURE EXPLOSIVES

Washington, March 17.—Withdrawal of supervision over the manufacture and sale of explosives in the United States with the repeal by Congress of war legislation, has made it easy for anarchists, safe blowers, and others, to obtain explosives for illegal purposes, said a statement issued today by the bureau of mines.

In urging legislation to control the handling as well as the manufacture and sale of explosives, the bureau asserted that the United States is practically the only civilized government in the world that fails to exercise a national supervision over explosives, and declared it is easier to obtain explosives in this country than in any other.

AUSTRIA WILL BE PERMITTED TIME TO PAY

Four Allied Nations Agree to Postponement of a Settlement.

London, March 17.—The reply of Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan to the appeal of Austria for assistance has been prepared. The four countries agree to postpone payment of the sums to which they are entitled, under the treaty of Saint Germain, and also payment of the capital and interest on advances made to Austria since the armistice, in order to avert starvation in that country.

DRINKING MAN IS NOT A GOOD RISK IN OPINION OF LOCAL INSURANCE MEN

Although there is some difference in opinion where the line should be drawn between the drinking man and the insurance man of this city is almost unanimous in the opinion that the man who does not drink lives longer and is a much better risk than a non-abstainer. They do not believe that G. D. Finlayson, Dominion superintendent of insurance, made the statements accredited to him in a dispatch emanating from Ottawa, Wednesday, in a Canadian Press dispatch, Mr. Finlayson was quoted as saying that "insurance companies had found that the life of the abstainer was longer than that of a non-abstainer."

POLISH-RUSSIAN PACT TO BE SIGNED FRIDAY

Warsaw, March 17.—Polish, Ukrainian and Russian delegates will sign the treaty between Soviet Russia and Poland at 7 o'clock Friday evening. It is officially announced here. Negotiations on the treaty which will establish peace between Russia and this country have been completed at Riga, where the ceremony of signing will take place.

Andrew Bonar Law Is Compelled To Resign Owing to Ill Health; Lloyd George Deeply Affected

British Government Leader Warned by His Physician That Continuance of Public Duties Might Mean a Complete Breakdown—Had Been Absent From Commons For a Week—Was Reported That His Health Was Improving—Announcement Comes As Great Surprise.

London, March 17.—Andrew Bonar Law, lord of the privy seal, today resigned from the cabinet. Ill-health was given as the reason for his resignation. Mr. Law also retired from the Government leadership in the House of Commons.

The announcement of Mr. Bonar Law's retirement was made in the House of Commons by Mr. Lloyd George, who was so deeply affected that he could hardly finish his statement. The prime minister said he had received a letter from Mr. Bonar Law this morning, stating he had been warned by his physicians that if he continued he would run the danger of a complete breakdown.

REDS PLAN A NEW ATTACK ON KRONSTADT

Bolsheviki Reported To Be Making Extensive Preparations.

Copenhagen, March 17.—The Bolshevik batteries on the Karelin headland opened a strong fire against Kronstadt yesterday, says the Reuters correspondent of the Berlingske Tidende today. The bombardment from Kronstadt caused four extensive fires along the coast towards Petrograd, the warships at Kronstadt participating in the bombardment, the correspondent adds. Finnish refugees from Systerak report the Bolsheviks are making extensive preparations for a new attack on Kronstadt, four artillery batteries, with forty-eight 4-inch and 6-inch guns being concentrated between Systerak and Petrograd.

WHY NOT CUT DOWN SOME CITY SALARIES?

Trustee Wright Refers to the Stipends of City Officials.

During the discussion yesterday at the board of education meeting held to deal with the estimates, the suggestion of Trustee Rowe that the reduction desired by the council might in part at least be secured by cutting off the increases granted to the teaching staff was vigorously opposed by Trustee Wright.

LESS RESTRICTIONS ON ALLIED VISITORS TO FRENCH PLACES

Paris, March 17.—Fresh regulations to facilitate visits of foreigners to France have been issued by the government. A distinction has been drawn between citizens of allied countries and former enemy nations in these regulations. In the past, allied visitors remaining in France for two weeks have been compelled to take out identification cards at the prefecture of police. Under the new plan such card will be required only if the visitor intends to stay two months.

Londoner Elected At 51st Biennial Convention of the A. O. U. W.

TORONTO, March 16.—It was unanimously decided at the 51st biennial convention of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen here today to adopt the 20-pay-life certificate as soon as the necessary legislation was passed by the Ontario Legislature, which was said to be expected at the present session. 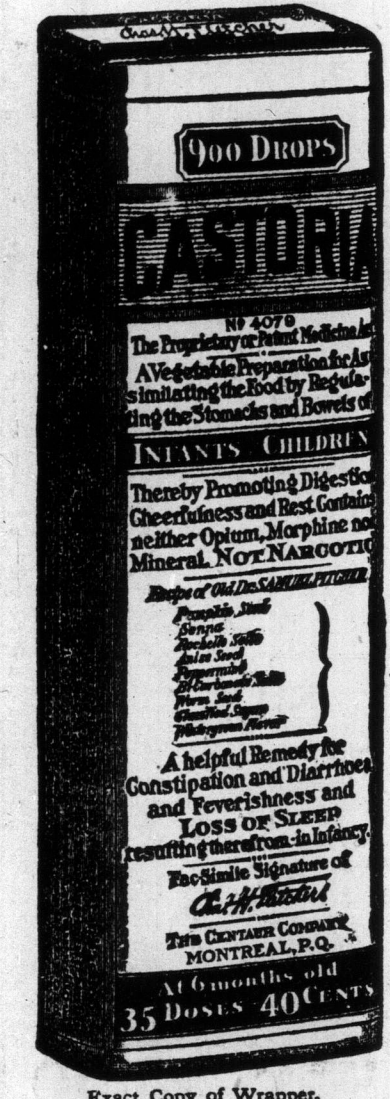
AYLMER TO HAVE NEW HOSPITAL

ACCUSES GOV. OF LACK OF PRINCIPLE
Eamonn de Valera Denies Rumors of Overtures For Peace.

DUBLIN, March 16.—Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish Republic," gave an Associated Press correspondent today the first newspaper interview since his return to Ireland from the United States. Extraordinary precautions were observed to prevent betrayal of de Valera to him by a member of the "Irish Volunteers" and kept under surveillance for an hour after leaving the Sinn Fein headquarters.
Among other things, de Valera accused the British Government of lacking principle in its treatment of Ireland. "England," he said, "is trying to win by playing on human weakness. As a matter of fact, she is playing on the strongest quality of the Irish people—their spiritual quality. The young men of Ireland are saying to themselves: 'The best span of life is only 70 years. We must all die. So why not now in circumstances placed in the side-car of a motorcycle and made to ride to heaven?'"
De Valera declared that there was no truth in the rumors of overtures for a peace settlement. "Ireland has had laid down new conditions. I am not in a position to discuss the offer of full fiscal autonomy would induce acceptance of the partition act, the Sinn Fein leader said in a speech given by a 'foreign hostile assembly, and that therefore the Irish people as a whole would never accept it."

## HOME ECONOMICS

Hot water radiators have small tanks from which air or gas which has accumulated in the coils and interferes with the passage of the water may be let out. Radiators have also a regulating handle on the pipe which admits hot water to the coils which may be turned off if the room is too hot. It is not possible, however, to shut off hot water radiators permanently, as in unused rooms, the risk of freezing the water left in the coils is very great, and there is no way of getting it all out, except by emptying the whole system.

In the hot water heating system a steady fire is important and the pipes to the radiators should be large enough to permit the water to travel freely. Sometimes the pipes are so small that the water is cooled before it reaches the radiators.

We all live in too dry air in our furnace-heated houses in winter. One of the easiest and most attractive ways of supplying the needed moisture is to keep ferns and plants growing in as many rooms as possible, especially in the living and dining-rooms.

Radiators can easily be kept free from dust by the regular use of a long slender brush, sold in most stores, made especially for the purpose. It is not expensive, and is essential for cleanliness. Dust radiators are a menace to the health. (Copyright, 1921, by Metropolitan Newspaper Service.)

**Nocturne in a Flat, or Why, Oh, Why Do You Snore?**

Will you kindly tell a perfect lady, asks one, how to cure herself of snoring, common or garden variety as well as grand opera selections? I've tried high pillows, low pillows, will power and won't power, and I guess about everything else but standing in the corner all night. My family threatens to relocate me to the tall timber if I don't cease. Of course, I am taking their word for my offences, never having heard myself perform. (M. C.)

**Snoring** is a doctor who examines the nasal cavity, and that is the cause of the soft palate in the wind. Like the song of a stren it will drive some folks to deeds of frenzy.

Most snorers get in their best work while breathing in part through the mouth and in part through the nose, the velum palati vibrating tunefully between the two air currents; but experts can snore very effectively with the mouth closed.

To give a perfectly gentlemanly reply to the lady's query, the most common cause of snoring is a swollen or enlarged soft palate. Some folks are too lazy to breathe properly when asleep. They choose the easier way, with the mouth open, because such a course is easier than it is a little difficult to breathe through the nose.

When we are asleep we are relaxed, just as we grow sleepy under the soothing, relaxing influence of a nice warm fire and a comfortable chair and a powerful dose of good food. And this relaxation particularly affects the erectile spongy bodies (turbinate bodies) of the nose chambers; they become engorged with blood and swell enough to impede free passage of air through the nose.

People who snore should, as a rule, at least, they are generally overweight, which proves beyond peradventure that they habitually eat too much. They should endeavor to fight that way streak, which certainly injures health, by indulging in daily active general exercise of the body, for the sake of better circulation of tone, among the other several blessings conferred by attention to physical exercises. They should visit a doctor who examines and treats nose and throat troubles, and, if he finds an undue turbinate thickening, undergo a course of treatment to better the conditions there. As a rule a few direct applications of the appropriate medicinal agents by the physician will bring about the necessary shrinkage or improvement of tone in the mucous membrane lining the nose chambers, and do away with the nocturnal snoring.

Snoring is sinful, inasmuch as it is a defiant declaration to all and sundry that there is something wrong with the health or your life, yet you are not doing anything about it. Perhaps some vague realization of that fact by the audience accounts for the commendable desire to throw things.

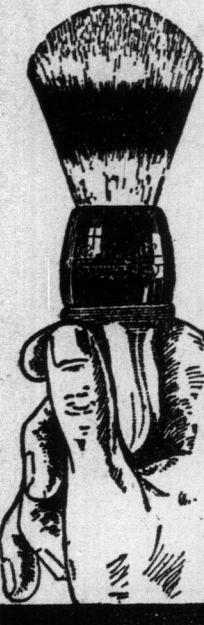

## TOO MUCH DEADWOOD IN TEMPERANCE ACT, DECLARES MR. RANEY

### Attorney-General Plans Amendments At the Next Session, He Tells Critics—Sidesteps Questions Regarding What Will Be Done With Provic Police.

TORONTO, March 16.—Opposition members of the Ontario Legislature spent several hours today opposing the bill sponsored by Hon. W. R. Raney, providing for the creation of the office of the commissioner of Ontario provincial police.

Hon. Howard Ferguson and H. H. Dewar, K.C. did their very best to draw from the attorney-general a statement as to who would be appointed to the position.

The general leader asked outright if it was the intention of the attorney-general to supersede or superannuate Joseph E. Rogers, who is now head of the provincial police.

"I am thinking about the matter," said the attorney-general. "The matter must be considered by the Government and action may come later."

"You have made up your mind and you do not propose to tell," said Mr. Dewar.

Not Yet Decided.

"I have not made up my mind," replied Mr. Raney. "I have had a number of half a dozen persons for the position."

"Will this bill do away with license inspectors in the several counties?" asked Major J. C. Tolmie.

"Oh, no," was the reply. "Every license inspector would be a representative of the Ontario provincial police."

G. Howard Ferguson was very anxious to know whether in drafting the bill, which provides for the enforcement of the general laws and the temperance act, the attorney-general had consulted the head of the provincial police force.

"No Use Consulting."

Hon. Mr. Raney said that Superintendent Rogers when testifying before the Ontario temperance act committee of the Legislature, had said that he was distinctly opposed to the two branches being under one head, in view of the fact that he thought it was useless for him to consult Mr. Burdett, who had, however, consulted with the attorney-general of Manitoba, and the attorney-general of Alberta.

Hon. Howard Ferguson ventured the opinion that it would be much better to have the opinion of a man who had spent thirty or forty years of his life in police work rather than have the opinion of an attorney-general who had only been eighteen months in office.

The attorney-general said that the Ontario temperance act at present was full of deadwood. At the next session of the Legislature a bill would be brought down to amend it. The bill would come up the question as to what was to be done with the license holders under the bill he is now trying to pass through the House, would have the duties of enforcing the Ontario temperance act taken away from them.

Will Drop Clause.

The attorney-general told the House that he had decided to drop two clauses in the bill, which provided for the appointment of a chief officer in every county.

R. L. Brackin, member for West Kent, said that the provincial police had a good record so far as the enforcement of the general laws of the province were concerned. Their work was good, however, he limited if they had to do the kind of work needed to enforce the O. T. A. The attorney-general said that the provincial police would not be called upon to do the work of the present O. T. A. members.

Premier Drury again put himself on record as being strongly opposed to the use of "spotters" so far as the enforcement of the law in Ontario.

Some Hot Shot.

Much of the time of the House was taken up by a controversy between Attorney-General Raney and Dr. Forbes Godfrey regarding Smith and the two provincial constables, who, according to the member for West York, were dismissed by Inspector W. J. Lawrence of Windsor, because they refused to spy on Inspector Mousens. The standing order by the Opposition members was that Lannin was appointed by the attorney-general, and that if this was a fair sample of appointments made by Hon. Mr. Raney, he could not be entrusted with the task of selecting a commissioner of police.

Dr. Godfrey, West York, reminded the attorney-general that he had informed the Ontario temperance act committee of the Legislature that it was not his intention to supersede Superintendent J. E. Rogers. This the attorney-general promptly denied. Capt. J. E. Thompson and H. H. Dewar, K. C., supported the contention of Dr. Godfrey. Major Tolmie thought the attorney-general had intended to convey the idea that he was not going to appoint Superintendent Rogers.

Wants Information.

"Why did he go to the reporter and ask him to keep it out of the paper?" asked Capt. Thompson.

"I had made some remarks about the gentleman in question which I thought should not be made public," replied Mr. Raney. "Nobody has been definitely excluded. My impression was that it would not be a good thing to appoint Mr. Rogers."

Mr. MacBride, South Brant, opposed "establishing a dictatorship in freedom-loving Ontario." He would have the bill held up at least for the present session.

Hon. A. E. Ross, Kingston, and Major A. C. Lewis opposed the bill, as also did G. G. Halcrow, who said: "We are putting men in the scrap heap who know more than we do."

The discussion continued until a late hour.

Important Amendment.

Important amendments to the workmen's compensation act were contained in a bill which Hon. Walter Rollo introduced in the Legislature this afternoon. It mostly affected schedule 2 industries, which included railway, steamship, express, telegraph and telephone companies under other classes.

It is set forth under the proposed amendments that employers in this schedule are required to re-employ injured workmen at suitable remuneration and work. Any man not so re-employed shall be considered to be permanently totally disabled or disabled to the extent of the difference in his earnings before and after the accident, and the employer shall be liable to pay compensation in accordance therewith. It is left to the discretion of the board to modify this section in respect to any industry. The section is retroactive.

Provides For Pension.

Another amendment regarding schedule 2 industries provides for the creation of a pension fund to safeguard dependents of injured workmen, similar to that created under schedule 1, and to amalgamate the two funds. All pensions now being paid under schedule 2 are to be revealed and the employers will be required to pay into the fund a sum equal to the capitalized value of each award. Legislative notice of the credit of any award will be deducted from the capitalized value.

The pension fund thus created will hereafter be liable for the payment of all awards, whether accidents happening before or after the amendment is enacted, and employers shall be released from all individual liability in order to meet any default of schedule, employers who may have heretofore or hereafter occurred, the board may at any time assess the employers to an amount not exceeding fifty per cent of the employer's accident cost for the year. The section including government employees has been added at the request of certain departments, and for instance, the northern development branch of the Ontario Government.

For Farm Laborers.

Another amendment announced by the minister was to allow the workmen's compensation board to grant compensation to farm laborers and domestic servants under part of the act, on the request of the employers. These are the only two classes ex-

## McFADDEN AND HOTRUM FACE SERIOUS CHARGE

### One of the Two Killed Drug-gist Sabine, Says Jury.

TORONTO, March 16.—Responsibility for the murder of L. C. Sabine, druggist, this city, was placed by a coroner's jury tonight upon either William McFadden or Roy Hotrum. John Conley, third man in the party of bandits, who is also under arrest charged with the Sabine murder, testified at the inquest that he had not gone to the Sabine drug store, but had asked McFadden who he had got, and the latter replied: "Nothing, and I had to plug him in to get away."

Witness Hulse, driver of the motor car used by the bandits, who is held as a material witness, testified that when McFadden and Hotrum returned to the car after having been in the Sabine store, "Hotrum said he had to punch the man in the stomach." Hulse said he did not know at the time that this meant that Sabine had been shot. McFadden and Hotrum were at the inquest, masquerading as Conley's men in the car, a short distance from the drug store, while McFadden and Hotrum were at the store, Hulse said. He had received \$8 for his night's work, he admitted.

Hulse did not know at the time that Hotrum had his .38-calibre revolver prepared for the later starting on his fatal errand.

## SINN FEIN HECKLERS WERE THROWN OUT

CHICAGO, March 16.—Police reinforcements were called tonight to Orchestra Hall to quell a tumultuous audience gathered to hear Sir Philip Gibbs, the English author and war correspondent, who spoke on "The Irish Question." A dozen hecklers, said to be Sinn Fein sympathizers, were ejected from the hall early in the evening and allowed to go free.

## WINGHAM MEN WERE EACH FINED \$200

### Pleaded Guilty At Blyth To Infraction of the O. T. A.

[Special To The Advertiser.]

BLYTH, March 16.—William Patterson, Jeweler, and Albert Louttit, butcher, both of Wingham, were each fined \$200 and costs by Magistrate Robert Goderich here on a charge of a breach of the O. T. A. laid by Inspector Fellow of Goderich. The case was the outcome of the recent shooting affair at Wingham. Both Patterson and Louttit pleaded guilty.

A largely signed petition was presented bearing the names of twenty Wingham people asking the magistrate for leniency in the case.

Magistrate Goderich heard a charge laid by Inspector Fellow against Dr. W. J. Milne, who, in addition to being a general physician, has a drug store. The charge was laid under section 41 of the O. T. A. It was alleged that Dr. Milne obtained 36 bottles of liquor, and that in two weeks only three bottles were returned. It is claimed that in certain preparations which he sells he uses liquor as a part of the ingredients, and that the liquor he had obtained was required for this purpose.

Magistrate Goderich decided to adjourn the case for a week, and will hear further evidence at Goderich.

## CRAWFORD MUST SERVE SENTENCE

### License Commissioners Will Not Entertain Petition For Release.

ST. THOMAS, March 16.—Official intimation has come from the board of license commissioners that the sentence given Lawrence Crawford, Port Huron, for selling liquor, should be carried, and that he must remain in jail until the term of six months has expired, although through his intimacies he is unable to take care of himself. Application was made to the attorney-general's department for a change in the penalty, making the punishment a monetary one, and substituting a fine for the prison term. Crawford's stay in jail is an expense item in the management of that institution.

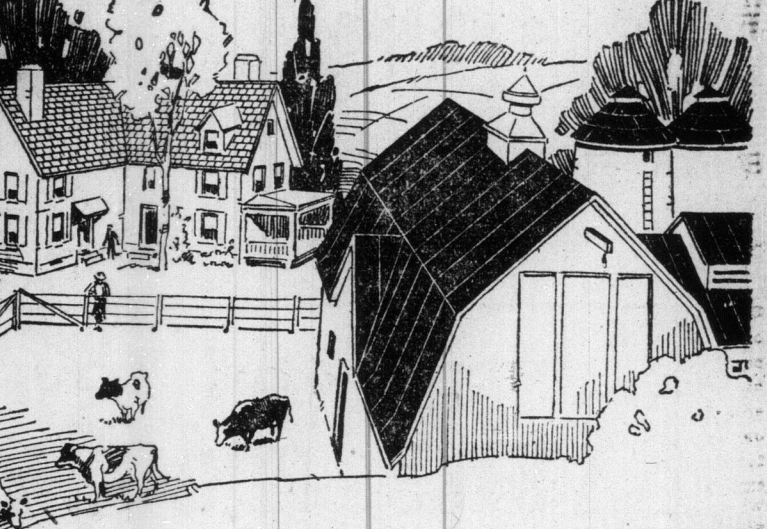

**NO SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS, SAYS EDUCATION DEPT.**  
Schools Are Well Supplied At Present Time.  
SALARIES RESPONSIBLE  
13,000 Certified Teachers in Elementary Schools Is Claim.

According to a report from Toronto officials of the department of education it is of the opinion that the shortage of teachers which has prevailed during the last few years has been to a large extent overcome as a result of the larger salaries which are being offered throughout the province, a condition which has resulted in a greater stability in the profession and a reduced tendency to moving about.

"We have not noticed much difference in the city," said Public School Inspector V. K. Greer today, when his attention was drawn to the above statement. "There is no doubt that higher salaries have had an effect in stabilizing the profession, and that fewer urban teachers are resigning their profession to enter other callings in life. With the advent of higher salaries and the re-announcing of law, teachers appear to be more inclined to make the profession their life work, and more likely to accept of more difficult conditions in the schools than was possible under hitherto existing conditions."

**PLENTY OF WORK FOR WILLING CITIZENS**  
No References Required, and Board Provided.

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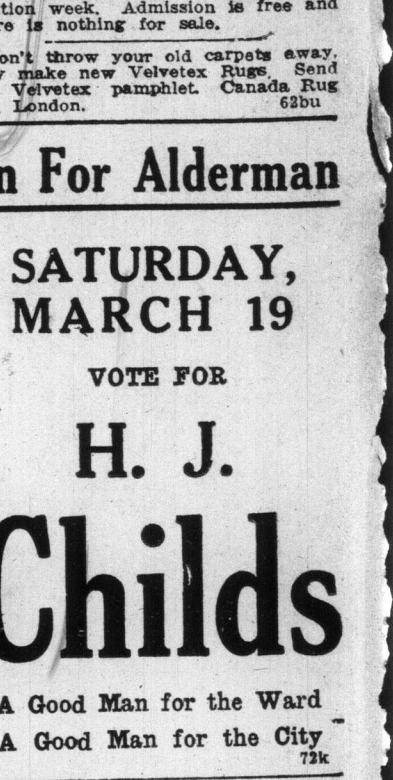
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
