So far, the Prison Commission appointed by the Ontario Government has met with success in its investigation of the causes of by the Ontario Government has met with success in its investigation of the causes of crime and the best means for dealing with criminals, with the object of decreasing the criminal population. The county authorities and the public generally have so far cooperated with the commission in obtaincriminal population. The county authori-ties and the public generally have so far co-operated with the commission in obtain-ing every possible bit of infor-mation necessary to form a judgment, and there is reason to believe that reforms of a there is reason to believe that reforms of a lasting and beneficial character will be instituted as a result of the investigations taken in exchange for the products of Canainstituted as a result of the investigations made by the commissioners.

But one solitary protest against the com-mission and its designs is forthcoming. It comes from the London Free Press, which, strangely enough, has reached the con-clusion that the jails and the treatment of criminals are highly satisfactory. Anyway, our contemporary deems it right to condemn the Ontario Government for apcondemn the Untario Government for ap-pointing what it is pleased to call a "gen-eral commission," sent on "a roaving ha-quiry." It pitches into the authorities for not letting the jailers and inspectors in-vestigate and report on everything, and it even goes the length of asserting that "the Mowas Government must be at their wits" Mowat Government must be at their wits' end to find a pretext for giving employment to some time-serving dependents."

This indictment is easily disposed of. The
Free Press must be profoundly ignorant of

what has been occurring in the Province within the last twelve months, or it pur-posely conceals facts in order to get a "whack at the Government," for which, no matter what it may do, our contemporary seems to have no word of commendation.

The Prison Commission was net devised by the Government for the purposes of giving employment to "time-serving dependents." On the contrary, it was appointed at the request of a conference of men and women interested in prison reform that in point of numbers and respectability could not fairly be ignored, even if the Government eemed such a course wise. The confer-nce was held in November of last year It was attended not only by those specially responsible for the management of the responsible for the management of the prisons of the Province, but by repreprisons of the Province, but by representatives from almost every Church in Ontario. The Anglican Church was represented by the Bishop of Niagara and others. The Presbyterian Church by Rev. A. Gilray; the Congregational Union by Rev. A. F. McGregor; the Methodist Conferences by Rev. 


