

ST. PATRICK'S DAY. Some of the Many Traditions About

Ireland's Patron Saint.

Whether such a person as St. Patrick ever existed or not is of little consequence, albeit he has been regarded for centuries as the Irish Moses; yet, like Homer, he is claimed by many countries.

It would seem, indeed, according to his faithful biographers, that his footsteps can be traced from the cradle to the grave by the places named after him. A better shrine to his memory is in the warm hearts of the Irish people who have perpetuated his name and kept his day as a national holiday ever since he was "discovered," for the place and time of both his birth and burial are as obscure as his origin.

It is said that he was born in 372 and carried into Ireland by pirates and sold as a swineherd. There he spent seven years, during which he learned the language and habits of the people.

His religious life and miracles are set forth in volumes, although we have no record of his existence until 200 years after his death. That he is a tradition to Ireland, as St. George and the Dragon are to England, is most probable, but very high authorities quote the absence of snakes in Ireland as proof positive of his miracle work. Why St. Patrick charmed 'the snakes away, or how he did it, is not known. But there are no snakes on the Benerald Isle.

It is also traditional that he charmed a monster snake in Lough Dilveen, a lake situated between Tipperary and Cork, and that it can be heard crying to the saint, "He's a long Monday, Patrick."

It is a fact that in the present century a Mr. James Cleland—himself an Irishman—purchased a hat full of snakes in London and turned them loose on his estate in Ireland. They were simple harmless things, put the whole population rose and hunted them out, and for years everybody saw snakes in that wichnity if but a wind rippled the grass.

There is another pretty tradition of the saint. Wishing to explain the miracle of the Trinity, he plucked a shamrock and bade the people see how there were three leaves on one stem. So it is the Irish national emblem to this day.






