Mr. Powell, Conservative M. P. for Westmoreland, says the subject of preferential trade between Great Britain and the colonies is a subject to be dealt with by our grandchildren. Mr. Powell may be right. But one thing is certain: increased trade can certainly be done between Great Britain and Canada to the benefit of Canadians as well as the people of the motherland, if we reduce the taxation on British imports sent to Canada. Great Britain imposes no tax upon what we send her. The obstruction is all on the part of Canada, as arranged by the present Ottawa Government. And what seems preposterous is the fact that while our rulers keep up obstructions to prevent trade with Britain with one hand, with the other they dive into the pockets of the Canadian taxpayers for money to pay subsidies to aid in increasing trade with Britain. It is a very foolish and a very expensive policy.

F. Wolfenstam Thomas, the well-known banker, formerly of this city, heads the requisition addressed to A. C. Penny to present himself as a candidate for the next Dominion general election in St. Lawrence Division, Montreal. Ald. Penny is a man of great influence, and, it is said, he stands an excellent chance of winning.

The Raines liquor license law, which Governor Morton of New York has just signed, effects great changes in the management of the traffic. By this measure, local boards having jurisdiction to issue licenses for the sale of liquor are abolished, and the whole subject is placed under the supervision of the State. Part of the license fees will go to the State and part to the municipality. In New York city a license will cost \$300, in Brooklyn \$350, in Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse and cities of that size \$500; in other cities the license fees range from \$30 to \$500, and in rural regions from \$30 to \$500. The principle of local option in towns is retained, with the additional provision that if a town determines either for or against the sale of liquor by popular vote, that result cannot be changed within two years.

The Hamilton Spectator (Conservative) says: "The determination of Sir Charles Tupper to keep the House in continuous session from today until Saturday is nothing short of an outrage. There is entirely too much coercion going on at Ottawa."

Yes, the country needs a change. Fresh strawberries are selling in New York at 50 cents a box, and peaches at \$12 a dozen. They come high, but the luxury-loving Yankees must have them.

New Zealand will pass a law to prevent the landing of consumptives at its ports, and to heavily fine ship captains for attempting to land a consumptive, or one who exhibits any tendencies to be so afflicted. It is apparent that the New Zealanders do not wish their island to be regarded as a health resort. A law on these lines will be very hard to carry out.

Cromwell and Kruger. Judge Steyn, the new president of the Orange Free State, seems to be a sort of second Kruger. He recently paraphrased one of Oliver Cromwell's maxims by expressing the pious hope that the Afrikaner would "never forget his Bible and his gun." In South Africa there seems to be too much gun and too little Bible. If the golden rule, inculcated in Scripture, had prevailed in South Africa in recent years, the Uitlanders would have been given their political rights, and no excuse would have been given for Jameson's raid on Johannesburg. The Boers were sympathized with when an attempt was made to annex them to Cape Colony against their will, but they have not many friends in lands where English-speaking freemen dwell, because they refuse to give voting power to every man who is a patriotic supporter of the commonwealth and a taxpayer. The Transvaal republic cannot stand, no matter how warlike its managers are, if the majority of its inhabitants are submitted to taxation and yet refused the common rights of citizenship. If President Kruger's present warlike operations mean resistance to this common-sense view, he is sooner or later doomed to downfall.

Memory Gone, or What? Mr. McNeill, Conservative M. P. for North Bruce, as a consequence of the introduction of his preferential trade resolution, was unwittingly the means of exposing Sir Charles Tupper to another humiliation. Sir Charles listened to Mr. McNeill's speech, and then gravely rebuked Mr. McNeill for having dared to introduce the resolution without having first consulted him. Mr. McNeill expressed the greatest surprise at the remarks made by the Nova Scotia knight. The member for North Bruce said that he had taken the first opportunity that had presented itself of conferring with Sir Charles Tupper. He had even gone to his house, where he had a long conversation with him on this very subject, and had a few days afterwards received a letter from Sir Charles, saying that he was greatly obliged to Mr. McNeill for a copy of his resolution, and that he would have pleasure in supporting it. Mr. McNeill read the written pledge of the Minister, and scornfully tore the letter up, and cast the fragments on the floor. Sir Charles Tupper sullenly listened, but made no rejoinder to this explicit condemnation of his attack on a fellow member.

The incident emphasizes the statement made by another Conservative M. P. to an Ottawa correspondent the other day to the effect that Sir Charles can now hardly be held responsible for his words and deeds. He either is entirely broken down in mental grasp, or he deliberately misrepresents. It is a pitiable situation, in any case.

Export Meat Trade. The Trade Bulletin claims to have additional proof in its possession that the export dead meat trade, which the men in power at Ottawa say they will go into, if Parliament grants them the money, is doomed to failure. Our contemporary says it has received evidence from England in support of its view. Large American provision firms, with millions at their back, tried the very scheme of opening up retail stores in England and selling "American Chilled Beef," guaranteed to be of the finest quality; and yet with all the facilities of cheap freights and manufacturing at the very lowest cost, the shrewd multi-millionaires have not been able to make the export dead meat trade pay. In fact they have reduced their shipments of chilled beef, and come more into the exportation of live cattle, and why? Because the latter pays the best. Nothing can be more convincing than the following facts which the Bull. reproduces from an article of Feb. 28: "On Feb. 20, refrigerator beef sold in the English market at 6 1-4c to 7 1-4c per lb, while American steers sold at 9c to 9 3-4c dressed weight. Here, then, we have the incontrovertible fact that dead meat from live steers landed in England, and slaughtered at point of debarkation, will bring 2 1-2c to 2 3-4c per lb, more than refrigerator beef." But if such shrewd and extensive exporters as Armour, Swift and Morris, of Chicago, cannot make the dressed meat trade pay, how is it possible that the Canadian Government can do any better?

Will Be Short Again. The Present Water Supply is Only Equal to the Demand. Commissioners Discuss Methods of Harnessing New Springs—Electricity, Steam or Compressed Air?

The water commissioners held their usual weekly meeting yesterday afternoon. The practice of meeting weekly instead of fortnightly keeps the work so well up that yesterday there was hardly anything to do but pass accounts and file the quarterly statement of the auditors. The latter document placed the receipts of the last quarter at \$26,948 24. Twelve thousand of this was paid over to the city on revenue account; there is a balance at the Bank of Toronto of \$5,889 27, and the following are the other principal items of expenditure, which are generally interesting in that they give a general idea of how the money is used: Workshop account, \$587 32; pumphouse maintenance, \$199 46; grounds and dam maintenance, \$337 69; electric supply account, \$328 10; house servitude, \$121 50; meter and hydrant, \$105 30; main extension, \$185 97; steam pumping machinery, \$5,552. Salaries, general, \$1,081; office, \$240.

The balance of the time was spent in discussing the estimate for the year. The question of scarcity of water is early occupying the attention of commissioners. "We have only 2,800,000 gallons a day now," said Mr. Cowan, "and it is all being used up. The water supply of 410,000 gallons a day to the supply, and these springs will be purchased this year, in all probability. Then the methods of harnessing the new springs were talked of. Engineer Moore estimated that it would cost \$3,000 for a storage pond and machinery. According to figures secured recently, electricity was looked upon as the cheapest power, but the electric company has signified its intention of amending the offer, which will make electricity no cheaper than steam. Compressed air is spoken of also. The first cost of this will be greater than that of either of the other methods, but the subsequent cost of operation is cheaper, as it can be worked from the present pumphouse. The commissioners will further consider the matter at their next meeting.

Ontario Legislature.

The Bill Reducing County Councilors Finally Passed.

Toronto, March 25.—Mr. Hardy's bill for the reduction of the number of county councilors passed through committee. It was discussed in a non-partisan spirit by members of the House, and, though it met with some opposition on both sides of the House, it was generally indorsed. Mr. Haycock, the Patron leader, wanted the measure given a trial. If it did not work, the law could be amended at any future session.

The following judges were appointed a commission for the division of counties into districts: Messrs. Benson, of Northumberland; Dean, of Victoria; Wilkinson, of Lennox; Senkler, of Lanark; Creason, of Grey; Jones, of Brant; Horne, of Essex; Bell, of Kent; O'Brien, of Prescott; Allan, of Nipissing; Mackenzie, of Lambton; and Senkler, of Lambton.

The City of London Bill will not come up till Mr. Hardy's municipal bill is disposed of by the municipal committee.

Among the bills introduced yesterday were the following: By Mr. O'Keefe—To extend the act licensing hawkers and peddlars to persons peddling furniture, carpets, etc.

By Mr. St. John—To compel persons liable to personal assessment to make oath to the amount.

By Mr. Harcourt—To provide for the establishment of cities and towns of public slaughter, and to amend the act respecting the regulation of the sale of deer, moose, elk and other game, and make those hunting them take out licenses, although residents of Ontario.

By Mr. Ross—To provide that persons having a certificate that they have passed the matriculation examination of the education department, on payment of the usual fees, shall be entitled to be registered as medical students, within the meaning of the Medical Act.

The following bills got their third reading: Respecting the village of Tilbury Center; to further improve the Agricultural and Arts Act; respecting the railway debenture debt of the township of Mornington; respecting the London Street Railway Company; to amend the act incorporating the Ontario, Belmont and Northern Railway Company, relating to the Sault Ste. Marie and Hudson's Bay Railway Company.

The House adjourned at 11:10 p.m.
