PARISIAN SENSATION.

Trial of Five Youths for the Murder

an Eccentric Baronness. Paris, Nov. 24.—There was a large and aristocratic assemblage of persons, including Mme. Georges Hage, at the opening of the trial yesterday of five youths for the murder of Baroness de Valley, an aged and eccentric miser, last June. The Baroness was 82 years old. The murdered woman was said to have been a daughter of Count Monbel, who figured as Minister of War in Prince Polignac's last Administration. In her youth she was said to have been a great favorite of Prince Metternich, and at a later period of her life to have been intimately associated with George Sand. She played a brilliant role in society and diplomacy in Louis Phillipe's reign, and throughout the reign of Napoleon III. As age came on her she developed eccentricities and traits of the most sordid avarice. She would not allow her apartments to be cleaned, and she

set up a sort of unlicensed pawbroker with her feet tied together, her wrists covered with bruises, indicating a violent struggle; a handkerchief tied tightly around her throat and a cloth stuck into her mouth. Nearly every-thing of value had been carried





New York, Nov. 24.-A Jacksonville, la., special to this morning's World says: A cipher cablegram from Havana tonight to a Cuban leader says that Gen. Weyler has been forced to return to Havana, and that the city is in great confusion. Weyler gives no excuse, it is said, except that it is too hot and unhealthy to do any fighting. It is openly asserted in Havana It is openly asserted in Havana that Weyler became frightened because Maceo had set a price upon his head or his capture. Weyler's scouts also informed him that Maceo might make an attempt on Havana, and the Spanish general retreated in hot haste to the protection of his palace. It is also stated in the cablegram that Weyler's recall is assured now, as the Spanish Government is incensed against him for his dilatory tactics Cubans here are jubilant, for they think this will have a favorable effect upon the United States Congress.

THE NEWS CONFIRMED. A cablegram from Havana says: this evening from the Province of Pinar del Rio. His return has caused much comment, but as yet it is impossible to learn the true reason for his leaving his command and returning to the capital. The military authorities will vouchsafe no information on the subject.

Point Arena, Cal., Nov. 24.—After clinging to the rigging of the wrecked steamer San Benito 27 hours, 23 men were rescued by the steamer Wrott early yesterday morning and transferred to the steamer Point Arena, which took them to Moncocino. 
