

OVER-EXERTION IN CYCLING. Dr. Albu recently made an interest-



ing communication to the Berlin Medi-cal Society on certain effects produced on the heart and other internal organs by over-exertion in cycle races. His conclusions were based on the condi-tion of twelve professional cyclists whom he had examined both before and after races lasting from five to thirty minutes. The strain thrown on the heart was shown by well-marked dyspnoea, and by the strong pulsation of the heart and arteries, but the most remarkable fact was an acute dilation of the heart, especially of the left ventriels. dyspnoea, and by the strong pulsation of the heart and arteries, but the most remarkable fact was an acute dilation of the heart, especially of the left ventricle. This dilation is, of course, temporary, disappearing when rest has been taken and returning on the occasion of the next race. When overexertion is frequent this dilation may become permanent, and in a heart that was previously weak an irreparable injury may occur. Another symptom was the presence of albumen and casts in the urine, caused by the kidneys being irritated by the effort of cycling. QUEEN VICTORIA'S THREE CROWNS

Has Only Worn the State Crown of Great Britain Once in Her Life.

The only crown that is likely to be used during the stately functions of the commemoration is the tiara which is familiar to this generation in sketches of the Queen when holding a drawing-room. This was manufactured by the state jewelers in 1862 at the personal cost of her Majesty, and, in gen-eral terms, may be said to weigh eight troy ounces. It is a light shell of gold, entirely incrusted with diamonds, and comprises 2,673 brilliants, besides 523 rose diamonds, making an aggregate of 3,196 stones. It is retained in the charge of the sovereign, of whom it is a personal possession, and to all intents and purposes never requires any attention. It was specifically devised for use in conjunction with a veil, and, apart from the drawing rooms, has scarcely been used at all.

This crown was preceded in point of

This crown was preceded in point of time by a diadem or circlet of gold, choicely bejeweled, which was made for the Queen in 1858. The stones used on this occasion, which are wholly diamonds, were in the main crown jewels, and the diadem will therefore remain the property of the crown, although the cost of mounting them for the use of her Majesty was borne out of the privy purse. This diadem is technically known as a circlet, surmounted by the cross patee (whereof mounted by the cross patee (whereof the Maltese cross is a decoration variant) and the fleur-de-lis. The general effect of this crown, is excellently shown in the current coinage, in which it is half concealed by a veil, which it is half concealed by a veil, which was not worn in the earlier years of the reign, when this form of circlet was in ordinary use; and, indeed, there would seem to be some doubt as to whether the particular form of coronet depicted on the present coin issues has ever been adopted by the Queen in actual use at all. It was this diadem, and another of a like shape that preceded it, which were used when her Majesty opened or prorogued Parliament, and also on such occasions Parliament, and also on such occasions as the marriage of the Princess Royal. On every occasion on which the Queen visited the House of Lords, the state crown was taken out of the re-galia room in the Tower of London, and was borne before her on a cushion. Except for this purpose the crown has only left the tower on two occasions during the reign—once for repair (some part of the setting having become loosened), and once in order to modify the ermine. The crown has never been actually worn by the Queen at any functually worn by the Queen at any function whatever since the act of coronation 60 years ago, and there is nothing in the episodes of the forthcoming commemoration that will require its removal from the tower. The state crown was made for the Queen by Messrs. Rundell & Bridge (the predecessors of Garrards, the present holders of the appointment), and its construction is familiar history. It may, however, be interesting at this juncture to say that the estimated value at that to say that the estimated value at that time of its stones—comprising 2,783 diamonds, 277 pearls, 16 sapphires, 11 emeralds, and 4 rubies—was £112,760, apart from the priceless ruby which belonged to Edward the Black Prince, and the large sapphire purchased by George IV. In the opinion of competent experts, the stones still have an intrinsic worth of a like sum, even if no account be taken of the value that rould attach to their illustrious esso-







WOMAN'S SOPRANO VOICE

Philadelphia Times. The scientist who discovered in the uman larynx the anatomical reason why women had a soprano voice and man a bass one was a woman—Mrs Emma Seiler. She was a German born in Wurtzburg. Left a widow with two children to support, she re solved to become a teacher of singing but suddenly lost her voice. Then sh determined to find out why; also to dis cover, if possible, the correct method of singing, so that others might not lose their voices. For this purpose she studied anatomy. She dissected larynt why women's head tones could reachigh C, while men had no sopran At length her search was red. She discovered under the microscope one day two small, wedge-shaped cartilages whose action produces he highest tones of the human voic made her discovery public. 


