Denies the Statement.

When questioned regarding the matter this morning Colonel Gartshore stated that the article was a fabrication, and that the McClary Company had not the slightest intention of adopting Niagara power and displace ing its producer gas plant.

"The producer gas plant is proving too satisfactory for any such move to be contemplated," said Col. Gartshore, to The Advertiser. "We know pretty nearly what it costs us to get our power from it. We know nothing as yet regarding Niagara power, but, of course, if it can be delivered to us for less than our power from the producer gas engine costs us, we should be foolish not to adopt it. But so far there is no reason to believe that Niagara power can be delivered in London at a rate that will compete with the cost of our power for pro-

Mikado's Minister of Foreign

Tokio, Nov. 7 .- The official silence cheese, £784,102, and 26,146 great Japan on the subject of the relations of the United States and Japan in connection with the persistent reports of friction was broken today by an Associated Press interview with Minister of Foreign Affairs Hayashi.

He prefaced his statements by expressing the hope that a sincere pronouncement by the foreign minister of Japan and its publication through the Associated Press would prevent further misrepresentation and finally result in discrediting those who are constantly circulating false and harmful reports. He spoke not only as foreign minister, but as representing the sentiment of the entire cabinet and the public. Minister Hayashi then said that the relations between Japan and America were as smooth and cordial as ever, and the cause of the civilization as well as community of and friendship.

Minister Hayashi admitted that the mmigration question, the most serious, was uppermost in the public mind, but feels positive it will be settled without friction. Already it has probably been decided. 



GOV'T MAY EXTEND THE POWER ZONE

Mayors Talk Over Details With the Commission.

THE GOVERNMENT TO TRANSMIT

The Western Power Union Urges That Bylaws Be Submted in January.

Toronto, Nov. 7 .- The Toronto Telegram of this evening says:

That the Government will undoubtedly build the transmission lines, and that practically all the municipalities in the Western Power Union will vote on a cheap power bylaw in January next, were two of the important points made clear at this morning's conference between members of the Western Power Union and the hydro-electric power commission

The hydro-electric power commission told the mayors and municipal officials who assembled from all parts of Western Ontario that the Government would build the transmission The meeting was practically unanimous in voting for a resolution urging all the municipalities to submit a bylaw to be voted on in January next. A model bylaw for this purpose is being prepared, and will be distributed to the different municipali-

May Enlarge Zone.

Another very important point which developed explains the delay in the signing of the contract between the Ontario Power Company and the Ontario Government at the ten-dollar rate. An effort is being made to persuade the Ontario Power Company to double its voltage from 60,000 to 120,-000. This would not only mean that power could be distributed cheaper, but that it could be distributed further, and the Niagara power zone would be enlarged to include Sarnia, Windsor, and various other western towns. There seems little doubt but that this important concession will be agreed upon finally, but in view of the fact that increased voltage means increased danger in transmission, great precautions have to be exer-

The Delegates.

The meeting was a most representative one, among those present being J. F. Fryer, Galt; president of the Western Power Union; W. J. Lyon, Guelph, secretary; Mayor Stewart, Ald. Lewis Ald. McLaren, Ald. Sweeney, Ald. Jutton, City Solicitor Waddell and Wm. C. Crennen, secretary of the board of works, all of Hamilton; Ald. W. J. Elliott, Ingersoll; Mayor Butler, Woodstock; Ald. Matthews, London; Mayor Gordon an man, Stratford; Ald. Weaver, Hespeler; Mayor Lawrence, St. Thomas Controller Hocken, Toronto; Mayor Bowlby, Brantford; Solicitor McBride, of Waterloo; Hon. Adam Bec, Hon. J. S. Hendrie, and W. K. McNaught, members of the commission.

The conference was a private one, and two hours were devoted to discussing the contracts and various details in connection therewith. The visiting representatives asked many questions, all of which were answered by Hon. Adam Beck, Hon. J. S. Hendrie, or W. E. McNaught, the members of the commission. Mayor Bowlby, of Brantford, was the only member present who did not vote for the resolution urging all the municipalities to submit the bylaw in the form of a money bylaw in January next. 




