Ouebec Explosion

NOW THAT THEY ARE APPROACHING THE WOODSHED

Germans Counter-Attacked Near "Coal City" and in Belgium, But Were Thrown Back at Both Points-Further Progress Made by F rench.

British Front in France and Belgium, Aug. 18 .- By the Associated Press .- German troops delivered another sharp but futile counter-attack against a section of the new Canadian positions northwest and west of Lens early this morning. The Germans succeeded in penetrating the British trenches, but were driven out immediately as the result of strenuous hand-to-hand fighting, which cost the attackers a considerable number of dead and a few prisoners.

London, Aug. 18.—The German troops in Flanders were again completely repulsed by the British after sharp fighting, according to the British official statement issued early this morning.

The enemy early today delivered another counterattack against our recently-captured position immediately northwest of Lens. His troops were again completely repulsed after sharp fighting, in which we secured a few prisoners. There was considerable hostile artillery activity during the night in the neighborhood and also northeast of Ypres.

FRENCH MAKE PROGRESS.

Paris, Aug. 18.—The French last night made further progress in Belgium, north of the road between Bixschoote and Langemarck, it is announced officially. They captured a strong point of support east of the Steenbeke River. German attacks on the Aisne front were repulsed.

DESPERATE FIGHTING AROUND POLYGON.

British Front in France and Belgiu Aug. 18 (by the Associated Press).—The fighting on Thursday at Polygon was musually desperate. Wave after w of the enemy came surging up again the London troops, who held on de minedly with rifle and bayonet until ferent directions forced them to retreat.
Gradually they withdrew, fighting all the fine work of the French artillery, were surrounded and fought until forced to surrender. One young officer, in command of ten men, found himself encircled by the enemy and his men being swept by machine gun fire. The last heard of him was contained in a message he signaled back to his division saying that his men were facing certain death, and that he saw no way but to surrender and save their lives.

Along most of the French front it was comparatively quiet, although a hard local battle was continuing about a strong German redoult known as "Les Lilas," which lies about a thousand yards southwest of the St. Jansbek River.

U. S. Commandeers All Inland Vessels That Can Pass Welland.

Oleveland, Aug. 18.—A representative of the United States shipping board was in Cleveland today definitely initiating Government plans to commandeer lake freighters for coastwise and trans-oceanic war trade. Figures tabulated by the Government agent, in conference with local shippers owners, conference with local shippers, owners conference with local shippers, owners, builders and tugmen, show that upwards of eight lake boats can be taken to salt water. The shipping board's decision will rest upon the report to be made by its representative. The plan is to take every boat possible of passing through the Welland Canal, and thence through the St. Lawrence River to the Atlantic, before lake traffic is icebound. The shipping board is now making a list of boats under 260 feet length and 43 feet beam, which can pass through the Welland Canal without alteration. Boats up to 520 feet in length and not more than 43 feet beam will be cut in two, buikheaded and towed by tugs through the canal and river.

Forty Houses at Dragon, Nearby Community, Blown Down By Concussion or Destroyed By the Flames-Special Trains Are Rushing From Montreal With Doctors and

Ottawa, Aug. 18 .- First reports received here from stations surrounding the scene of the Rigaud disaster state that in the neighborhood of 250 persons. are believed to have been killed.

Rigaud, Que., Aug. 18.—The great plant of Curtis & Harvey, Limited, explosives manufacturers, in which a number of explosions occurred this morning, is a total wreck, and buried beneath the ruins of the dozen or so small structures that comprised the factory are an unknown number of dead. Estimates made this afternoon seem to point to the number being miraculously light considering the fact that several thousand munitioneers, male and female, employed in the plant, were in the danger zone for hours.

The greatest loss will be in the value of the buildings and stock, placed well up in the millions.

CAUSED BY OVERHEATING.

The first explosion was caused by the overheating of the machinery in the nitric acid building. The flames leaped along through the building and another explosion occurred. The workers had ample time to get from the first building affected, and the alarm was sounded, which enabled munitioneers in other buildings to make their

MANY EXPLOSIONS.

For the next hour, explosions occurred every five minutes or so, altogether fifteen detonations being counted. One of the explosions blew down a number of houses in Dragon, where most of the munitioneers lived, and farm houses in the vicinity also caught fire.

RESCUERS FROM MONTREAL.

The C. P. R. tracks run close to the plant, and as a precautionary measure the train service was suspended for a while. The relief train, made up in Montreal. bringing doctors and nurses, reached the scene soon after noon, but nobody could approach the ruins because of the tremendous heat for hours. Provision was made by the people of Rigaud for accommodating the homeless muni-

Stories of heroism displayed at the Curtis & Harvey powder plant at Rigaud, which blew up this morning, began to reach Montreal soon after noon, when rescue parties reached the town, but at 1:30 nothing definite had been obtained here regarding the number of casualties. PHONE GIRL SENDS NEWS.

The Curtis & Harvey Company received its first information about the disaster from a telephone girl at Rigaud. While in the midst of her announcement that the plant had blown up, she stopped, and another detonation was heard. The officials of the Curtis & Harvey Company this afternoon intimated that early advices they had received about the accident indicated that no information was obtainable as to whether anybody had been

LOSS IS GREAT.

The plant was comprised of a large number of small buildings, and the structures alone cost several million dollars. The stock of raw material for making explosives was also particularly expensive.

Montreal, Aug. 18 .- The powder plant at Rigaud, Quebec, blew up this morning. It is feared the loss of life will be heavy. The plant belonged to Curtis & Harvey, Limited.

FIVE THOUSAND WORKERS.

The plant covers five miles square. Reports received here soon after the explosion said that the plant was nearly all in flames. Five thousand men and women are employed in the factory.

The explosion blew up the telephone and telegraph systems, and rendered it most difficult to get information out of Rigaud.

The C. P. R. Ottawa-Montreal line is close to the plant. Traffic was suspended temporarily this morning on this section.

THREE EXPLOSIONS.

From points near Rigaud it was learned that three explosions took place. The first, at 9 o'clock, was heard in Vaudreuil, twenty miles away. It was followed by two others in quick succession.



7.500 TONS OF

Enormous Movement of Coal For Railway Now Under Way.

DEALERS' SUPPLY MOVING

More Than Double Amount Moved Last Year Now Stored by Line.

Evidence of the enormous amount of coal being shipped into the city is indicated by the records at the G. T. R. depot, which show that 150 carloads, representing 7,500 tons have reached here in the last 24 hours. This represents the coal consigned only to the Grand Trunk for the company's reserve stock, and does not take into consideration the quantities sent to coal dealers.

This is the greatest supply of coal ever received in the city in the same

riod of time. Conservatively estimated it is claim-Conservatively estimated it is claimed there is more than double the amount of coal stored in the city now than at the same period a year ago. Starting today the Grand Trunk will transport 650 carloads of iron ore awalting removal from Point Edward to the Hamilton steel plant. It will represent about a dozen trainloads. The movement of theatrical troupes and baggage by special trains is again under way, following the vacation season of theatrical companies.



PTE. KILBOURNE AGAIN RUSSIA SOUND, WILL WEATHER STORM AFTER OVERCOMIMG INEXPERIENCE, SAYS OIL MAGNATE JUST RETURNED

Albert MacGarvey Explains That Extremists Who Knew LOCAL MINISTERS Nothing of Government Secured Control, But Have Now Lost It-Women's Shoes Are Now Selling at \$75 Per Pair, But Country Is Coming Back.

"Russia is sound. She will weather the storm, and will start on a new day. The coming winter will be a hard one, undoubtedly, but Russia will survive, and will come into her own.' Those were the cheering words given to The Advertiser today by Albert McGarvey, just returned from Russia, who is spending his holidays with Mrs. McGarvey and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Scandrett at Port Stanley. Mr. McGarvey arrived this week from Russia, and will be here for some weeks. He is feeling most optimistic over conditions.

Mr. McGarvey has large oil interests in the Caucasus mountains. His fields have not been threatened, as they are at least 500 miles from any battlefield. Drilling is proceeding very rapidly, as there is an enormous demand for oils.

EXTREMISTS SECURED CONTROL.
"One must consider the great upheaval that has taken place," continued Mr. McGarvey. "In a moment, you might say, with practically no preparation, Russia changes from one form of government to another, of an exactly opposite type. The upheaval of a nation under such conditions is tremendous in its in-fluence, and it takes a long time for adjustment usually. I think Russia is making more rapid strides towards adjustment than would have been believed in normal times. She is sound at the heart, and that is now manifesting itself.

It was natural in such an upheaval, that the extremists should get control of the Government. That is exactly what happened. The Pan-Socialists succeeded in running the Government, with the result that the condition of the country



[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Aug. 17.-Supplementary Cheered by Unexpected News. estimates, totaling \$50,500,000, were brought down to Parliament today by Finance Minister White. There is a long list of votes for small public works, which makes the budget look like an election document.
