AMERICANS TO MAKE **WORLD'S SHIP RECORD**

Program For 1919 Calls For Ten Million Tons.

Washington, April 25.—For military reasons, the exact situation of the future building program has not been made public. From previous statements of Chairman Hurley, however, it has been estimated that the construction in been estimated that the construction in 1919 will be in excess of 10,000,000 tons, the largest amount ever built in any one year by any nation. By January 1, all the shipyards will be in full operation, and many old yards which have demonstrated their ability to build efficiently will be extended. Of the total tonnage next year, approximately eight million tons will be steel.

It is expected that 2,500,000 tons of wooden ships will be turned out next

PRICES ARE MADE FOR EXPORT CHEESE

Figures For Milk and Butter Will Soon Be Set.

Montreal, April 25.—The dairy produce commission which represents the British Ministry of Food and the Dominlon Department of Agriculture, has authorized the following prices for cheese for exportation to Great Britain: 23 cents per pound for No. 1 grade, f.o.b. steamer at Montreal: 22½ cents per pound for No. 2 grade, and 22 cents for No. 3 grade. A committee has been appointed by the commission to work out the question of a relative price for out the question of a relative price for ordensed milk.

The price of butter will be arranged as soon as there is a surplus available for export.

Davidson, Sask., April 25.—On Tuesday night a mob of 60 men went to the home of Henry Williner, a German, and made him kiss the Union Jack and give \$100 to the Millitary Y. M. C. A. Willner's son recently joined the army, and on returning home and telling his father he had enlisted, the father ordered him off the place. The men of the town, hearing of the affair, immediately organized and forced Willner to apologize to his son and give other proofs of his loyalty.

Due to Clash Between Wings of Church Here, Is Belief.

Ottawa, April 25.—The departure of Bishop Fallon of London for overseas is exciting a lot of interest in Ottawa, but the reasons given for his departure differ widely from those emanating from London London.

In this city it is rumored that he has been called to Rome to settle some differences that exist between the Irish and French wing of the Catholic Church in Canada. It is doubted here that he has gone to settle the Irish question. It is thought that he might possibly have something to do with the chaplain service, but his mission is to Rome direct, according to rumors here.

GOVT. SAVES BIG SUM IN NATIONAL PRINTING

Ottawa, April 25.—A saving in national printing of \$175,000 in the first five and a half months of its existence is the record of the editorial committee, whose first report was submitted to Parliament yesterday by Sir George Foster.

The economies effected include the absolute stoppage of the printing of some reports, sweening deletions to the some reports, sweeping deletions in some reports, sweeping deletions in the manuscript of others, and great reductions in the size of editions.

French SHELLING PARIS AGAIN. Paris, April 25.—The long-range bom-bardment of Paris was resumed again this morning. British Win Back Ground Around Villers, Which Fell To Foe On Thursday - French Prevent Enemy From Debouching At Hangard - Attacks Continue On Wide Front With Large Casualties For Enemy.

London, April 25 .- At 2 o'clock this morning the Germans put down an intense gas barrage on the Angio-French front in Flanders, and two hours later deep waves of infantry delivered an assault. Fighting still is in progress.

With the British Army in France, April 25.—By the Associated Press.—The German attack against the French and British lines on the northern front in the Dranoutre-Kemmel sector is continuing. The Touton assault was intended to pave the way for the capture of Kemmel Hill. Vigorous British counter-attacks toward Villers-Bretonneux apparently resulted in the reclaiming of a considerable part of the territory lost to the Germans yesterday. The battle still is raging, however, and it is too early to make claims.

London, April 25 .-- Three attacks made by the Germans on British positions east of Amiens have been repulsed, it is announced officially.

On the Flanders front late yesterday the Germans attacked French positions northeast of Bailleul and were repulsed. Early this morning, after an intense bombardment, they renewed their attacks in this sector and against British positions further east.

The British regained ground around Villers-Bretonneux by counter-attacks and took prisoners.

ALL-NIGHT FIGHTING.

London, April 25 .- The official statement follows: "Heavy fighting took place all night in and around Villers. tawa College, and has continued with renewed vigor since he became bishop of Bretonneux, and still continues. THREE ATTACKS REPULSED.

London, April 25 .- A raid attempted by the enemy during the night in the neighborhood of Bucquoy was repulsed. The hostile artillery has been active during the night in the

STRONG DRIVE ON FRENCH.

London, April 25-(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).-The enemy heavily attacked the French front in Flanders this morning.

GERMANS CHECKED AT HANGARD.

Paris, April 25.—The war office announcement today says The battle continued with violence around the village of Hangard, on which the Germans concentrated their efforts during the night. French troops resisted valiantly, and counter-attacked several times with success. The village was lost, then retaken by the French, and finally remained in the hands of the Germans at the cost of heavy losses. The French are holding the immediate outskirts of Hangard, and the Germans have not been able to de bouch from the town, in spite of repeated efforts.

HAIG'S POSITION IMPROVED.

London, April 25.—Heavy fighting continues on the sector east Amlens, Reuter's correspondent at British army headquarters' reported The Germans obtained a footing in D'Aquenne wood, west of Villers Bretonneux, but the British counter-attacks drove them back to the fringe of the wood. At several places the British have retaken ground and their position has improved considerably.

GOOD TANKING Both British and German tanks participated in the fightin at Villers-Bretonneux. Two British tanks, the correspondent says, got among a mass of Germans, and did great execution. The Germans made a determined attempt to rush towards Kemme Hill yesterday, but without appreciable effect. The French counterattacked and restored the position

London April 25.—Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.—The resumption of the German offensive seems on a much smaller scale than formerly. Its objectives in yesterday's attack were obviously limited. It is possible that this is due to the realization of the great slaughter which has been

Two Thrusts Made.

As in the case of the attack which captured Armentieres, the enemy made two thrusts against Villers-Bretonneux yesterday. One was

made against Mount Kemmel, and was repulsed. The other was launch-ed against Villers and Hangard, where the Germans were evidently where the Germans were evidently anxious to wipe out a salient and capture high ground on both sides of the road leading to Amiens before attempting another general advance. The other enemy attacks yesterday were clearly diversions. Correspondents at the front state that no British tanks have been in action for two or three weeks.

The contention of these objectors, it is said, is correct if this section of the act were in force, but it has been repealed. This section gave municipalities the right to regulate the use on highways of bicycles and all other vehicles not drawn by horses, but not including motors.

In 1914, however, Toronto was granted he power to tax all vehicles and in 1917 he Legislators extended the power to all cities of the province. This authorized them to require a license from all vehicles before using the same on any highway of a city, and determined that the fee shall be \$1. Further, it said that the measures when enacted should be approved by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board. de approved by the Ontario Rahway and Municipal Board.

The London Street Railway Company is equipping ten of its double-truck cars with air brakes, according to announcement made today by Manager C. B. King.

Five of the cars to have the new brake equipment are of the closed type now in service on city lines, while the others are the large open picnic cars used on the Springbank straffic on days of normal travel, that service will be practically completely air-brake equipped.

Five new cars arrived in the city on Wednesday from the makers, and are being unloaded at the London and Port Stanley shops at Philip and Maitland streets. Meanwhile a number of other cars are being rebuilt and repainted at the company's shops on Lyle street.

E. R. Q .- Can I be called to the

A .- Yes, unless you have been discharged after service in any theatre of actual war. Great Britain and Ireland are not considered a theatre of actual war. If on examination you are placed in category E, you will not be called upon to serve again.

A. M. Q.—I was put in category A last fall, but I am not fit for that appeal?

appeal?

A.—Only those exempted men who at the date of application for exemption had not attained the age of 23 years are being called out at present. If you are within that age, you will be called up, and you will be given another examination when you report for duty. If you are not included in that age limit, you are not included in that age

A. J. D. Q.—1. A man becomes past age limit in class one on June 12, 1918. Does that exempt him from class one and make him liable when class three is called?

2. A man is 33 years of age April
10, 1918. He has been exempted.
If class three is called in April, If class three is called in April, 1921, will he have to apply for exemption in that class? 3. A man holds a certificate of exemption in category B. Must he return it at once when he applies for exemption, or in 30 days from

NDON, April 24.—Air observation shows a clear break of twenty yards in width in the Zeebrugge Mole at the Inner end, and that a sunken object blocks the greater part of the channel in the harbor of Ostend, according to an official bulletin issued by the admir

IMMENSE DESTRUCTION. DOVER, April 24.—The crew of one of the British submarines which was used to destroy the German piers at Zeebrugge during yesterday morning's raid were rescued, according to a memher of the crew, by an escorting destroyer. The sailor said that after the destroyer slipped the submarine at the entrance to the harbor, the underwater boat made straight for the target. Crews of the ships which took part in the raid on Zeebrugge have many thrilling stories of their adventure. One of them has described how, despite the fact that the Germans discovered their presence while they were still outside presence while they were still outside the harbor, they made their way in through heavy gunfire, the Vindictive reaching the wharf, where she remained for an hour and a half.

MISSING KINCARDINE.

GERMANS USE TANKS IN DRIVE ON VILLERS.


