HOME ECONOMICS

COMPLETE PROTEINS. Certain substances called amino-acids. which contain nitrogen, form in chem-ical combinations the various foods which are called proteins. Seventeen amino-acids are found in common proteins and the possible kinds of food made by the union of one or another of these seventeen with the various food ubstances run into amazing numbersthree hundred and fifty times a million according to one estimate. Complete ecessary for building up the body Milk, meet, fish, eggs and most whole cereal proteins are complete, but others uch as those of gelatine and certain vegetables are incomplete. Lacking certain amino-acids, they cannot give the body the right combinations to enable it to build tissue. They can help to maintain life, but do not promote growth. In an ordinary diet which includes vegetables, milk, eggs, fish and meat, on may be reasonably sure of being pro-vided with plenty of complete protein but vegetarians may find themselves short of it and should take care to have a good deal of milk, cheese and other complete proteins. In the deit of growing children, this matter of the right kind of proteins is important, and one of the reasons for the constant and general use of milk.

Protein in food is measured in three ways: according to its weight in grams; according to its fuel value, in calories or according to the amount of nitrogen which it contains. Thus a cup and an eighth of skim milk contains nine and three-tenths protein grams, thirty-seven protein calories, and one and forty-nine hundredths nitrogen grams.
