A correspondent of the Montreal azette, writing under date of June 3 gives the following case to show ow the measure performs in actual ractice on a given article:

"The reparation tax on German goods coming into this country is 26 per cent, which we pay to our customs before goods are released from docks, at port of importa-tion. For this we get a reparation receipt for the amount paid. We then forward this reparation receipt to the German manufac turer, together with our check for the remaining 74 per cent, thus clearing the transaction so far as the German manufacturer is concerned. Over and above this tax, we have to pay ad valorem duty of 33 1-3 per cent of the whole invoice value, and also on the German shippers' charges and freight, for example:







German, Lib-beral, voted for the amendment. Two Conservatives, T. L. Church of North Toronto, and W. F. MacLean of South York, voted against it. Otherwise, Conservatives voted for the amendment; Liberals and Progressives voted against it.

Division on the amendment was preceded by an episode which convulsed the house with merriment. Hon. J. B. M. Baxter was speaking, when W. F. MacLean interruped him ask if he would move abrogation of the agreement. Mr. Baxter ac-cepted the challenge. He moved abrogation as a sub-amendment. The house was amused, but gave the sub-amendment no support. Mr. Baxter and Mr. MacLean were alone in vot ing for it.

Following the adoption of the re port, events moved rapidly. A bill based on the committee's recommendations was introduced on second reading. The prime minister and the leader of the opposition participated n a brief debate.
