TWO FRENCHMEN TO CROSS ATLANTIC IN AN AIRSHIP

Will Start at Canary Isles and Land in Brazil.

BIGGEST BALLOON EVER MADE

Will Have Hinge Basket and a Non-Sinkable Boat With Motor Attached.

Paris, Sept. 21. — An attempt to cross the Atlantic Ocean in an airship is about to be made by Elisee Reclus, a noted French geographer, and Louis Capazza, the inventor of the parachute balloon and an aeronaut who distin-guished himself a few years ago by making a daring trip over the Mediterranean Sea from France to Corsica.

Pecatte, the secretary of the Aero Club of France, gives the following facts about the projected balloon voyage, which will be made for the purpose An English Captain to Make the of meteorological investigations.

The start will be made from the Canary Islands about the middle of next May. An enormous balloon is being built for the trip, four times larger than the largest ever made. It will have a capacity of about 46,000 cubic feet and will be spherical in shape, and will be inflated with hydrogen gas.

Dressmakers Use Novel Method to Secure Money.

London, Sept. 21.-Owing to an anomaly in the English law, married women having separate estates can not be readily made amenable for debt and many have taken advantage of this state of things to run up heavy bills with the costumers. The aggrieved firms have now combined and discovered a method of procedure under which they can get judgment against these women. Hereafter the feminine debtors' names are to be put in the official gazette, which will render them ineligible to attend court. 
