LONDON, FRIDAY, AUG. 25. London's Progress.

The remarks in The Advertiser a few days ago as to the exhibition of public spirit by the citizens of London during the Old Boys' reunion have served as a text for editorial comment in several of our contemporaries. As might be expected, all are agreed on the great benefits that result to a municipality pride and enthusiasm. But the Ottawa lack of this public spirit in the past, London has not made the progress it

"The progress of London has not been so rapid or so satisfactory during the past half-century as might have been expected. It possesses the natural advantage of being the trade center of Western Ontario, surrounded by one of the very finest agricultural areas in Canada, settled by an farmers; is served with excellent railway facilities, including the old London and Port Stanley road, giving lake connection with its competitive freight advantages; is the home some of the oldest and most popular manufacturing firms, which have become household terms, as the Mc-Clary. Labatt and the Carling comand with old-established wholesale houses to serve the drygoods and grocery and other trade of the district, and fine educational, press and other advantages. With such possibilities why has not the 50th anniversary of its life as a city revealed to the admiring gaze of the people of Canada a larger, wealthier and more progressive community? The answer, in part at least, the Cit. izen believes, is supplied by the absence heretofore of that public spirit which seems at last to have come as a baptism under the Forest City. If as a result of its public celebration the people of London have waked to find themselves, have come to have faith and pride in their city, and will in future co-operate to secure for it the full enjoyment of its inheritthen another generation will have vaster reasons than have been to celebrate its centenary.'

Now, there can be little doubt that with more pride in their city, more enthusiasm in its service, more readiness to push it ahead, our people could eertainly have made a better showing in 50 years than they have done. At the same time, we are not at all prepared to admit that we have not progressed. Under all the circumstances London has done very well. It is just 78 years old as a settlement, for the first house was built in 1826. During that time it has grown to be the leading city of Southwestern Ontario. From a village plot of 250 acres it has spread to 4,478 acres; from the first settler its population has increased to 42,000; from nothing its value has gone up to over \$20,000,000; on the unoccupied which existed here 78 years ago, has grown up a beautiful city. There is nothing in our growth of which to be ashamed.

It must be remembered, too, that we have had no special advantages outside of our own possessions and the enterprise of our own people. Toronto has been the capital of the Province for a century, and has had the advantage not only of its location on the lake, but of parliamentary influence. Ottawa has been the capital of the Dominion, and has not only the benefits derived therefrom, but has of late had yearly Government grants of money to improve and beautify it. Hamilton has been located at the head of Lake Ontario, which gave it a decided advantage before days of railways and canals: and it now has the boon of cheap natural power.

London has had none of these things to take a job at \$6 a week less pay.' to help it. And yet it has steadily progressed from its first settlement until today - slowly, it may be, but surely. 



TELEPHONE TALKS.

TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC.-

Speaking of the long distance telephone in England one witness said "The service is universally conceded to be the "worst in the world," and this statement was not questioned by a single person throughout the enquiry.

The Chairman of the Committee said 'I do not think there "is any worse place than England for a Telephone system.

"That is my experience." This is the undisputed comment on Government operation of the telephone in Great Britain.

The Chairman examining an expert witness from London as to the reason for England being so far behind the United States in telephone matters, obtained the following statement: "Broadly speaking the fundamental reason is Government " monopoly. No one can establish a telephone system without

"a license from the Postmaster-General, and the Postmaster-"General will only issue a license for a limited period. To "my mind the whole point is the limited license. No Com-"pany with a limited license can properly develop a business

"which requires a continuous expenditure of new capital "like the telephone business does. You cannot raise money " to carry on a business when the right to do business is going " to expire in seven or eight years and exists on totally uncer-

"tain conditions." The financial results of Government operation are startling. The financial statement of the Postal Department for 1904, covering telegraphs and telephones, shows a deficit on working expenses of £983,681. If interest on capital invested is included, the deficit for last year is raised to £1,282,560upwards of six and a quarter millions of dollars; or the deficit for the year amounted to one-third of the gross revenue from both telegraphs and telephones. The Government has not been able from earnings to pay interest on capital invested since 1872.

The Government returns show that the accumulated deficit from 1870 to 1904 of the Postal Department on the working of telegraphs and telephones, to meet interest and working expenses, amounts to £12,113,560—a total loss in thirty-four years of \$60,000,000.

The Government in their reports do not separate the telephone from the telegraph but it is noted that the annual deficits have largely increased since they took over the long distance telephone lines. The conditions of the telephone in Great Britain under

Government control are indisputable, -- the worst service in the world and a series of annual deficits that are astounding. Yet experts say that the same service under such administration as a company would give, would result in greatly improved service, tremendous development, and a business

profitable to the investors. Canadians can read the lesson for themselves.



The year book, just issued, shows that the Young Men's Christian Asso-ciations in North America have increased to 1,826, with a membership of 381,982, of whom more than three-fifths are not connected with churches. They own 517 buildings and other property worth \$32,004,886, an increase of \$2,400,000 in the year, besides \$2,733,000 pledged for 143 new buildings. The associations poid for aurent expenses associations paid for current expenses last year and for supervision, \$4,800,000. They increased their employed force to 2,013, and yet have 255 positions temporarily vacant. The railroad depart-ments number 203 and employ 356 secretaries; their baths were used 1,026,-314 times, their rest rooms 1,444,457 times, and 2,776,200 lunches were served. The 709 college associations have 50,-419 members and nearly doubled the attendance at the Bible classes. The army and navy department, located attendance at the Board army and navy department, located at many important posts and naval stations and in the field, had an attendance of nearly 500,000 men, received \$450,000 for safe keeping and kept in circulation 145 traveling libraries. The new county department has been extended to 32 counties in 19 states, with 10,340 members. BORING WORK BEGINS

Railroad Tunnel Between Windsor and Detroit Under Way at Last.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 25. - Work of the railroad tunnel, which is to be constructed under the Detroit River, between Windsor and Detroit, began toset to work sinking the initial shaft of the American side. A similar shaft will shertly be sunk on the tunnel line on the Canadian side. While there is still much preliminary surveying, and testing to be done, the location of the tunnel is practically decided upon.
