THE CHILDREN'S AID.

The Children's Aid Society of Ottawa propose to adopt the system of supervision which has been tried with such good effect in Philadelphia. Mr. W. L. Scott, who has personally investigated the working of the system and thinks very highly of it, addressed the members on the subject. The plan, in brief, is that instead of sending children who are brought before the magistrate as incorrigible to the industrial school or reformatory, they will be paroled, and an officer of the society will be appointed to enquire into the case thoroughly and endeavor to have the influences removed which tend to inculcate bad habits. In many cases the home influences or lack of home training or proper supervision are responsible for the youngster's precocious badness, and an effort will be made by tactful suggestion and, if necessary, the exercise of authority to remove hurtful influences and substitute salutary restraint. Of course the success of such supervision will depend to a large extent upon the tactful manner in which it is exercised, and the society will no doubt make a very careful selection of an agent for such a delicate duty. The success of the new system will mean a great deal both in reforming children without resorting to the stigma of sentencing them to confinement in a reformatory, and also in a financial sense to the municipalities which under the existing methods have to pay for the maintenance of incorrigibles in the industrial schools.—Ottawa Citizen.

In Chatham, the Children's Aid Society is doing exceptionally good work, for which they deserve words of the highest praise. That their work is effective was shown at their last meeting, when it was found that complaints were very few and there are now practically no cases of very great importance requiring the investigation of the executive officer. There is no system, however, that is perfect in every detail, and the adoption of some such scheme as is proposed in Ottawa might prove a source of help to the members in this philanthropic work. There is no other society in the city engaged in a more important or painstaking work than the caring for homeless and destitute children and any factor which would assist in this work should receive consideration and encouragement.

Once more the Board of Health is called upon to direct the attention of Mayor Marshall to the fact that the Grand Trunk has been in a shoddy state, from the fact that they are still in use, and the work done in that respect is forced to be done with the same old and worn-out cars, which have been in use for years. The Council, some time ago, expressed the Mayor to remove the Grand Trunk to remove them from some place outside the city limits, but the cars still move as a dumping place for shippers. It is surely time that some remedy should be effectively applied.

BARGAIN BAITED DUPES

Alluring Offers Attracted a Flow of Cash.

Woodstock Man Arrested and Charged With Fraud—Non-Existent "Co-operative Society" Was Successful Through Extensive Advertising—E. Hull & Sons, Nurserymen, St. Catharines, Caused the Arrest.

Woodstock, June 4.—"For sale—sugar 12 lbs. best granulated sugar for one dollar; also everything you eat, wear or use at wholesale, no matter where you live. Co-operation pays the freight and saves you one-third. Send for list First National Co-operative Society, Woodstock, Ont."

The foregoing advertisement, inserted in various Canadian papers, attracted attention, it would seem from results, all over Canada.

High Constable Boyle, St. Catharines, and Constable Hill of this city went to Beachville and took Arthur Smith of Hicrest Farm into custody. Saturday morning the prisoner was taken to St. Catharines to answer to a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, with intent to defraud.

The arrest led to the uncovering of some strange doings. Circular letters, it is said, have been sent broadcast over the country by means of the mails, advertising "seed potatoes," which sold in the old country in 1903 for \$7,000 per stone (14 pounds), colts dogs, imported hogs, strawberry plants, and other things almost as varied and numerous as it is possible to imagine. This circular was directly responsible for the arrest of Arthur Smith.

In addition to the circular, a publication known as The Canadian Co-operative Operator, was published monthly and sent out, advertising everything "from a needle to an anchor," the choice of goods being as great as is found in the biggest department store in the land. Groceries are given particular attention, and prices are quoted away below those which the manufacturers quote to the wholesalers. Granulated sugar cannot be bought at 33 lbs. for a dollar in Canada, but the unsuspecting were duped right and left, and money orders, postal notes, registered letters, bank drafts, etc., have been coming to the Woodstock postoffice for months, only to be sent to the dead letter office and returned to the senders.

The First National Co-operative Society could not be located by the authorities here, and an inspector of the Postoffice Department came here to investigate the society. It was decided, for some reason not known to the local police, not to prosecute the concern.

The "First National" has no office in this city, but mail addressed to the concern found its way into Smith's hands, and he is held responsible.

Chief Zeas has received many communications from people who have been duped, and in some cases the dupes have even come to this city to try to recover their money. The mails were extensively used, and farmers seemed to be the special mark.

Trial on Tuesday.

St. Catharines, June 4.—A. W. Smith of Beachville, charged with fraud, who was arrested at his home by High Constable Boyle at 1 o'clock Saturday morning, appeared before the magistrate and was remanded until Tuesday.

LIFE'S MISERIES.

Death of Former Georgetown Man Due to Business Worry.

Cornwall, June 4.—O. W. Young returned home Saturday from attending the funeral of his brother, Joseph E. Young, Cumberland, B. C., whose remains were interred at the old family home, Georgetown, Ont.

The deceased took his own life at Duluth, Minn., on May 28 in a fit of despondency due to a prolonged case in court causing him to be away from home to the detriment of his affairs at a most critical season in the fruit business, in which he was interested.

The deceased was a son of the late James Young, formerly manager of the Toronto Paper Co. at Cornwall, and was born at Georgetown, Ont., 43 years ago. He was for many years treasurer of the Rat Portage Lumber Co. at Kenora, Ont. Since last March he had been treasurer of the Cumberland B. C. Development Co. and incidentally worked a fruit ranch which he owned in that district.

He is survived by his wife, one sister, Mrs. Chambers of Stroud, Eng., and three brothers, C. W. Young, Cornwall; Clarence Young, manager of the Merchants Bank, Brampton; and R. E. Young, superintendent of railway lands, Interior Department, Ottawa.

Advise Pope to Yield.

Paris, June 4.—All accounts agree that the result of the private convocation of Catholic bishops to advise the Pope in regard to accepting the new laws for the separation of church and state was a substantial majority favorable to the popular and Parliamentary decision. The most reliable version is that the bishops voted to accept the law authorizing public worship associations by a majority of twenty-two out of a total of seventy-four votes.

Arrested in Windsor.

Windsor, June 4.—J. Greenbaum was arrested here charged with stealing in London and in other places. Greenbaum went to the warehouse of R. C. Struthers & Co., London, last Thursday, accompanied by a woman, and after leaving there a piece of silk valued at \$45 was missing. When arrested Greenbaum had in his possession silk valued at \$700 and \$800. All the silk found was Canadian.

Honley Entries.

London, June 4.—The foreign entries for the Honley catagie closed Saturday. Besides W. B. West of Philadelphia, the only transatlantic competitor was the Argentine of Toronto.

MAKE WARLIKE PREPARATIONS.

Ute Indians in Colorado Will Fight Way to Canada.

Denver, Col., June 4.—Disheartened by the Government's management of the Ute reservation, about 500 Indians have assembled at Vernal, twenty-five miles north of the reservation, and are awaiting the opening of the mountain passes to the north, declaring that they will flee from Uncle Sam's control and take refuge in Canada, under the British flag, if they have to fight their way.

The Utes say: "We wish to go in peace, but if we cannot go in peace we will go anyhow, and the Great Spirit will guide us on our journey. We fear no one who gets in our path. It is for him to fear. Let all beware who oppose us."

Indian Woman 124 Years Old.

Montreal, June 4.—Married to her third husband in the year that Queen Victoria was crowned Queen of England, yet still living and enjoying good health, is the story of an old Indian woman at Seven Islands, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. She is 124 years of age. Her sight is excellent and she still sews, she still smokes, and the only ailment of old age which has overcome her is with regard to walking. Her feet will no longer carry her.

Leopold Boss of the Congo.

Antwerp, June 4.—According to The Metropolitan, King Leopold is about to reply energetically to British interference in the Congo independent state, and to the accusation that foreigners are shut out of the Congo. His Majesty intends as a preface to royal decrees instituting reforms in the Congo State to publish a declaration that he alone is sovereign of the Congo, in which he will not permit interference or coercion.

Marches With the Veterans.

Belleville, June 4.—Forty years ago yesterday the 50th Regiment and Belleville Rifles of this city, left for Prescott to meet the Penitents. Yesterday the Veterans' Association, the 50th Regiment and No. 1 Co. of the 49th Regiment, two veterans of the rebellion of 1837 were present. Messrs. A. T. Pettie and William Blaine, Sir Mackenzie Bowell also marched with the veterans.

Changes In the Cabinet.

Ottawa, June 4.—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick was appointed Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada Saturday.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth will be sworn in as Minister of Justice when Lord Grey returns from Toronto, and Rodolphe Lemieux, Solicitor-General.

Two Years for a Brute.

St. John, N. B., June 4.—George Heov, the negro who made a criminal assault on Mrs. Annie Bettie a few days ago, and narrowly escaped being lynched by the posse which captured him, pleaded guilty to the charge, and Saturday was sent to the penitentiary for two years.

Must Pay Full Fare.

Ottawa, June 4.—By an order-in-council any person other than an employee or holder of a duly authorized pass traveling on Government railways without payment of the established fare is liable to a penalty of fifty dollars.

G. T. R. and Its Employees.

Montreal, June 4.—Discussing labor matters, F. H. McGuigan, manager of the Grand Trunk Railway system, says: "The labor situation all around so far as the Grand Trunk is concerned, I think it is not unsatisfactory."

The average wage increase granted the engineers under the arbitration award is a little less than 6 per cent.

Canada's Aid to Japan.

Ottawa, June 4.—A cable having been received that no further relief will be required the Canadian fund for the Japanese sufferers will be closed. Including the Government grants of \$25,000 worth of flour, the Dominion has subscribed \$70,000 toward the famine fund.

"Toronto Life" Sold.

Toronto, June 4.—The National Agency Co. has purchased the controlling interest in the Toronto Life Insurance Co. for \$50,278.47.

The interest had been held by the National Trust Co. on behalf of York County Loan shareholders.

Struck by Lightning.

Kingston, June 4.—Frederick A. Perry, living about seven miles out, at Big Creek, lost his barn and the contents, consisting of about 3,000 bushels of oats, a threshing outfit and other articles. The barn was struck by lightning. Loss \$5,600, partly covered by insurance.

Chinese Fire on British Ship.

Hong Kong, June 4.—The British steamship Samul was fired on Saturday at Samshui, near Hong Kong within sight of the British gunboat Robin. The ship's supercargo was slightly wounded.

HE REFUTED THE CHARGES

Rev. T. F. George Explains Away Some Allegations at London Conference

HE IS CONGRATULATED

At the London conference held in Windsor, Rev. Mr. George, principal of the Mount Eglon Institute for Indians, near St. Thomas, and a former pastor of the Victoria Avenue Methodist Church, took occasion to lay before the conference some charges which had been made against him and which he wished to refute.

He said that after he had been principal for one year someone made secret charges against him before the board and that he was called in to explain. He was only given a few days' notice that any charges had been laid against him and had to reply, but the board had passed a complimentary report.

The charges were made in connection with the school and he was said to be increasing the expenditures more than was necessary. An auditor was sent to the institution of someone to make a report on the school and he was called in to explain. He was running the school into debt. The auditor showed to the satisfaction of all that everything he had done in connection with the school had been done under necessity. He also showed that the school did not lose \$3,000 as was said, but had gained almost \$500.

Some of the ministers were indignant that such charges should be brought against a member, but it was decided to say no more about the matter, as it had been threshed out fully by the board, and a complimentary report returned. A resolution was unanimously passed, however, congratulating the minister for his loyalty upon their selection of a principal.

DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

Breaks Nearly Every Window in the Town of Bracebridge.

Four Cases, Ignited by a Grass Fire, Cause a Terrific Explosion, which Was Heard For Many Miles Distant—Dynamite Was For Blasting Government Road—Fortunately There Was No Loss of Life.

Bracebridge, Muskoka, June 4.—A tremendous explosion occurred at 3 o'clock Saturday evening, when several buildings were shattered and many windows throughout the town, especially on the main business street, were broken.

Four cases of dynamite in a building at the wharf were ignited by a fire which burned in the grass on the hill leading to the lake all day. The explosion was terrific. It was heard many miles distant.

The dynamite was for blasting out the Government road leading to the wharf.

Fortunately no one was close enough to the explosion to be injured. The stable of Hugh Anderson was wrecked. Among the buildings which suffered considerably from broken windows were the house of Dr. Williams, the Court House and the Dominion Hotel. Nearly every place of business on Main street was similarly damaged.

At this moment it is impossible to compute the monetary loss, but the number of plate glass fronts that will have to be restored is large.

TERRIBLE FALL TO DEATH.

Labourer Pulled Over Cliff by Machinery and Crushed Beneath It.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., June 4.—Antonio Forgone, of No. 748 Nineteenth street, was fatally injured in a fall over the high bank into the gorge below the falls at midnight Saturday night.

Forgone was in the employ of the Niagara Falls Hydraulic Power and Manufacturing Co., where he was operating a steam drill on a ledge of rock at the edge of the bank, and in moving his machine it became overbalanced and toppled toward the edge.

Forgone, in trying to save it, lunged on to the ledge and pulled over the edge with it. The machine and man turned a complete somersault in the descent, and in landing the heavy drill fell upon the unfortunate man, crushing him.

He lived until his companions got him to the top of the gorge and to the hospital.

Six Men Drowned.

North Sydney, June 4.—One of the worst tragedies in the history of the mines occurred there early Sunday morning when six men lost their lives by drowning off Cranberry Head, where, after leaving a liquor saloon Sunday morning, they conspired to overhaul the latter traps.

They which they obtained was a mere shell. On reaching the traps, it is supposed all men leaned over the same side of the boat to pull the tray in, with the result that the frail craft upset, throwing the six occupants into the water. Two of the bodies have been found.

Rev. Mr. Roger Drowned.

Peterboro, June 4.—A telephone message was received here yesterday from Bancroft, stating that Rev. W. M. Roger, who had charge of a mission of the Presbyterian Church at that place had been drowned. He had been fishing. Mr. Roger, who was a graduate of Toronto University and Knox College, was obtained in 1886.

Boy Fatally Hit.

Ingersoll, June 4.—Chas. Procnier, 13 years old, fell off a horse which he was riding, with another boy. In some way he was thrown to the ground. The horse stepped on his head, which was killed. There is practically no hope of recovery.

Killed by Trolley.

Montreal, June 4.—Mangled and torn beneath the wheels of an electric car, little 5-year-old Elizabeth McElwain, of No. 4 Oiler street, died in the General Hospital on Saturday night.

The little girl ran in front of the car. The motorman made strenuous efforts to stop the car.

Accidentally Shot.

St. Thomas, June 4.—F. J. Jennings had a miraculous escape from death Saturday afternoon. Jennings, who conducts a shooting gallery, was standing at the rear end of his gallery when a wealthy farmer came into chat with a friend. He took a gun, fired three shots and was laying the gun down when it accidentally went off, the bullet striking Jennings just above the eye, taking an upward course, coming out of the top of his head and making a serious flesh wound. Jennings is still in a critical condition.

Fatality at Acton.

Acton, June 4.—A fatal accident occurred at the Acton Tanning Co.'s works about noon Saturday. Abraham Stauffer, an employee, was pulling leather out of a drum, when in some way the machinery operating it was put in motion by another employee. Mr. Stauffer was partly in the drum at the time, and the motion hurled him against beams above, crushing him badly about the chest, from which he died about half an hour after. He leaves a widow and one married daughter.

Fatal Dose of Laudanum.

Toronto, June 4.—On Friday laudanum taken to relieve pain caused the death of Mrs. Thomas Burke, an old lady living at 18 Howie avenue. She took the drug while her husband was out and left a note to be awakened when he returned. Burke called on Dr. Cleland, but Mrs. Burke was dead when he arrived.

IN WATER 17 HOURS.

Boat Capsized and Occupant Covers 30 Miles By Swimming.

Honolulu, June 4.—Through the capsizing of a boat occupied by Edward Devauchelle, a half white, and three native companions off Maui Island last Tuesday, the three natives were drowned.

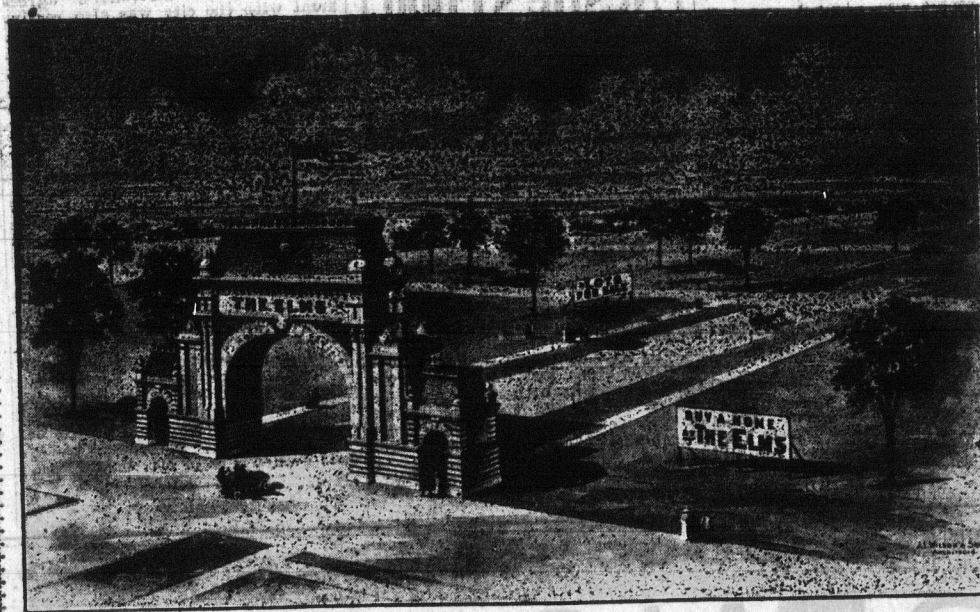
