[By Special Wire to The Courier] TORONTO, March 18 .- Deadlock eigned for 14 hours all yesterday af ernoon and evening until 4.45 thi norning, the opposition minority in the legislature, fought the most bitter battle which they have put up for years in the House of Parliament beause they found the Government atempting to force through remedial egislation for the benefit of G. Howrd Ferguson, M.P.P., for Grenville. The trouble with Mr. Ferguson was hat he had accepted a commission rom the Dominion Government to nvestigate conditions of employ on he Trent Valley canal, received ar nonorium for the same and by so dong, made himself liable to forfeit hi seat in the legislature and at the same ime pay a penalty of \$2,000 per day for each day he sat in the House since taking the official work.

In the end the political head of M Ferguson was saved along with the heads of many others who remained unnamed. The bill, carried its three stages in one day, by a vote of 61 to 17, thus providing a blanket indemnaty for members holding such positions for the future. 



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

A family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six mouths in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Mist reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
