LOOK FOR DROP IN PRICE OF COAL

DOMINION AND U. S. GOVERN-MENTS CONFER WITH MINE OWNERS.

With the event of Spring the chances are that the price of an-thracite coal will take a drop. Con-ferences are in process between representatives of the Dominion and United States Government officials of the mines respecting a proposition to reduce the price of anthracite fifty cents a ton to dealers at the mines. At present the joint conferences are confining their efforts solely to dealfield and extension work were ap- ing with the price of anthracite coal. It was stated that the proposition under consideration stipulates that

commencing May 1, the price of anthracite be reduced fifty cents and that the rate be increased ten cents per ton per month for the following five months, at the termination of which the price would be equal to the present price when the Fall season sets in. This proposition has been favorably received by many of the mine owners; in fact there is a chance that the new rate may become effective owing to the contin-ued mild spell of weather There is a

Diameter of Pine Tree.

Mr. Hill, lockmaster at Buckhorn, Ont., experimented with a pine tree to determine improved growth which may be secured by proper care. Fifteen years ago, he pruned all the lower branches off a 4-inch white pine sapling, removing other saplings from its vicinity, dug up the earth around it and applied manure to its base. It is now 19 inches in diameter at its base and has a long, clean pole. Thus, during the fifteen years, the growth in diameter has averaged one inch annually. — Conservation.







HOW FOREST FIRES START.

The record of forest fires in the United States shows that 25,000 timber conflagrations are started each year by human carelessness. Can-ada's record is estimated at about five to eight-thousand annual forest fires and nine-tenths are due to the following human causes:

Throwing away lighted tobacco and matches while in the woods.

Leaving camp fires unextinguished.
(Every such fire should bave at least two galions of water with every ember throughly stamped out.
Clearing land in newly-settled dis-

tricts by uncontrolled burning.

Carelessness by locomotive drivers. From what appeared like innosent causes many of Canada's worst for-est conflagrations have taken their start. Last summer several thriv-ing communities of New Brunswick were destroyed (with no insurance) because a few settlers took no pre-cautions while burning off their lands. When prosecuted in court. the settlers confessed that they "did not know a little fire could get out of hand so quickly."

FERTILIZING ORCHARDS. VINEYARDS, AND SMALL FRUITS

In fertilizing vineyards, orchards or small fruits, best results are obtained by applying the fertilizer away from it may be immediately helpful to the feeding roots. In trees these active roots are found at a distance from the tree about as far as the trees's branches stretch.

Fertilizers should be applied to vines and cane fruits about a foot from the vines and canes. The best time to apply the fertilizer is early in spring when growth and cultivation start. For grapes, use fertilizers analyzing about 3 to 5 per cent, ammonia, 6 to 8 per cent, phosphorie acid, and 1 to 4 per cent. potash. Good results have been obtained by applying 400 to 800 pounds per acre of such fertil izer.

For orchards, fertilizer analyzing 3 to 6 per cent. ammonta, 8 to 10 per cent, phosphoric acid and 3 to 5 per cent, potash applied at the rate of about 10 to 15 pounds per tree have given profitable results.

Cane fruits and strawberries as well as orchards benefit greatly from an application early in the season of bonemeal or fertilizer analyzing 3 to cent. phosphoric acid.—Henry G. Bell, B. S. A.

Chief Apostle Wants Co-operation of

John Barrett, the unique, the irrepressible, the lovable, finally has retired from the directorship of the Pan-American Union after 25 years devoted to the public service, 14 of them spent in the upbuilding of the Pan-American Union. He is succeeded by the capable Dr. L. S. Rowe, a former assistant secretary of the Treasury, later in charge of Latin American affairs for many years. Mr. Barrett resigned for the reason, which he frankly states, that if he remained much longer at his present post he would find himself "in danger of going eventually from the beautiful Pan-American Union, which he loves with the affection of a parent for its favorite child, to the lowly poorhouse," Mr. Barrett says that after spending a month with his aged mother at the family homestead in Grafton, Vt., and a brief trip to Panama to assist in the inauguration there of the new Pan-American College of Commerce, he will establish connections in large American and possibly some Latin American cities as a general counsellor and adviser in Pan-American, and other international affairs, based on his long official experience.

An entirely separate and civié project of international character, however, to which, he will contribute his spare time and which will most appeal to public interest, will be the carrying to early completion of the organization, already initiated by him, of a great popular and practical "League of American Nations and Peoples," which will probably be known either as the "League of the Americas," or the "Pan-American League." Its purpose will be to organize effectively for Pan-American progress, prosperity and peace that large and rapidly growing number of men and women in North, Central and South America who realize the immense possibilities for the good of the Americas which will result from their economic, social and intellectual co-operation, free from political, governmental or official control. This league will in no sense be a special agency of the United States for advantage over the other American funion, as a
