OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The annual report of the Chief Superintendent of Education, submitted to the Legislature, a few days ago, contains, as Mr. Montgomery's reports always do, most interesting and valuable information. It is the most important and most expensive Department of the Public Service. The report shows that the number of School Districts, in the year 1888, was 433, being an increase of 7, over the number in existence during the year 1887. Of these Districts, 171 are in Queen's County, 141 in Prince, and 121 in King's. The number of Schools in operation was 439, an increase of 2, over the previous year. The Teachers numbered 609; 64 were of the First Class; 146 of the Second, and 400 of the Third. There were 286 females. The number of pupils enrolled was 22,478; boys 12,488; girls 10,040.

THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

The Report of the Provincial Auditor on the Public Accounts, for the year ended 31st December, 1888, has been submitted to the Legislature. It bears evidence of the taste and care which characterized the reports of the present Auditor. The total receipts for the year amounted to \$254,208.63. These receipts were derived principally from the following sources: Subsidy from the Dominion Government, \$195,629.77; returns from the Dominion Government, \$9,471.15; Public Lands, \$20,000.00; Public Works, \$4,498.25; Fines, \$5,529.33; Prothonotary's Office, \$2,129.13; County Courts, \$1,942.24; Hospital for the Insane, \$1,134.44; Fees from Provincial Secretary's Office, \$925.20. The balance made up from the year received for fines and penalties, prothonotary salaries, etc. Of the \$21,841.89 spent on Public Works, \$19,179.95 were spent on bridges; \$19,983.68 on ferries, and \$18,473.62 on roads. \$3,828.78 were expended on public buildings, and the balance was spent on presents, ferry wharves, Superintend salaries, etc.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN MACCAECHAN.

It was our painful duty to announce the death of a highly respected citizen, Mr. John MacCaechan, Merchant, who took place suddenly on Sunday last. For some time past Mr. MacCaechan had been somewhat unwell, but he was always able to attend to his business. He was born at Black Bay, 65 years of age. In 1861 he married Miss Gillis of this city. Of this union six children were born, of whom three—two sons and one daughter—survive him. One of his sons is a practicing Barrister in New York; the other is in business in this city. Mr. MacCaechan had been in business here for upwards of thirty years, and during all that time he had been, in every sense, a model citizen, and had made many friends. In manner he was quiet and unassuming, while his business relations were always characterized by strict integrity and honor.

THE FATE OF UNRESTRICTED RECIPROcity.

Unrestricted Reciprocity with the United States, the latest development in the policy of the Dominion Government, has received its final verdict. The House of Commons, on Wednesday morning, passed a resolution in favor of Commercial Union, which arrangement the fiscal affairs of the Dominion will be controlled by the Dominion Government. The debate on this subject was one of the most interesting of the session, and the result was a clear and decisive one.
