



A Tight Place.

Springhill Has Several Thousand Dollars to Pay and no Money in

Springhill, Aug. 10 .- To-day is the first anniversary of the longest strike not only in the history of Springhill, but probably in the industrial history of Canada. It is being duly celebrated by a nicnic at MacKeil's Farm. about two miles outside of the town near Rodney. This morning a procession marched through the principal streets of the town. There were about four hundred men in the line of march. It was headed by the Junior Band belonging to the town; behind the band marched two hundred representatives of the U. M. W.: then came the band of the 93rd regiment marching in plain clothes. The band was followed by a number of children bearing small red flags, the emblems socialism, under charge of Jules Lavenne; following the children came the socialists with their red banner unfurled. This portion of the proession numbered about one hundred persons. The procession marched to he picnic grounds. The wives and amilies of the men were transported the grounds in carriages.

There was not time to obtain the assistance of regular steeplejacks. but two men employed at the ironworks volunteered-David McWhirter and William McLelland. They both ascended the ladder, got on the narow scaffold, and succeeded in placing the unconscious man in the "boatswain's chair" used by the steepleacks, and in lowering him safely to the ground. Neither of them had previously had experience of climbing chimneys, and in addition to ascending a vertical ladder 180 feet high, they had to deal with an unconscious man on a narrow open scaffold, and they also ran the risk of being overcome by the gas fumes .- British



member that they were never intended to convey washing and scrubbing water and the various kinds of offa one sees thrown in them every day. On streets like Church Hill, Garrisor Hill, Military Road, etc., where all the houses had sewer connection, cobtle drains showed a respectable ap pearance, were sanitary, and in ever; way as good as concrete. He thought it a useless expenditure to replace them with concrete. He wondered if newspaper correspondents and editors who were advocating this change, had near his store on George Street, as any idea of the cost of carrying it out. Arnst Retains World's Sculling Championship.

Defeated Barry, the English Champion, by Two Lengths on the Zambesi River.

Livingstone, Africa, Aug. 18 .- The sculling match for the championship of the world between Richard Arnst, of New Zealand, and Eddie Barry, of London, was won to-day by Arnst, the champion, by two lengths.

The race was rowed upon the Zambesi river, a short distance from the famous Victoria Falls, over a course of three and a half miles. The stakes were \$2,500 a side.

The men met upon an ideal course,

a fine stretch of river, half a mile in width, within sight of the island from which Dr. Livingstone, 55 years ago, caught his first view of the Victoria Falls. Until a time within the memory of living men the scene of the race lay in an unexplored part of the dark continent, never looked upon by white men, but the river banks where not long ago the crocodile and hippopot- die Durnan, of Toronto, just before amus held unchallenged sway were his retirement in 1907. to-day thickly lined with holidaymakers, brought here by the railroad completed in 1904. Tugs with cinematographs darted about the river taking pictures of the race and other usual accompaniments of rowing contests in the older countries were

The Zambesi was selected as compromise location for the race, Arnst, who has held the championship for three years, objecting to the expense of the trip to England, while Barry, who is a Thames waterman and the holder of the English sculling championship, was opposed to the long journey to New Zealand.

"Potato Canker" Disease.

This is the same disease that was first detected at Red sland, in Placentia Bay, about a year ago, and is so fatal in its effects that if not immediately checked the absolute impossibility of growing potatoes in Newfoundland for years to come, is sure to result.

The Agricultural Board therefore requests that all potato growers who may observe indications of disease in their crop will at once notify the Secretary of the Agricultural Board at the office of the Department of Agriculture and Mines.

The Agricultural Board recognizing the incalculable injury that must accrue to the country if this disease be not immediately stamped out earnestly requests all persons to aid the efforts now about to be made to effect this

In February last the Agricultural Board issued an illustrated pamphlet from a special report by Professor Gussow on this disease. Some thousands of copies were sent to Outport Magistrates and Glergymen, and the Board now requests that potato growers in any affected Districts will procure a copy of this report and be guided by its
