BRITAIN AND SERBIA. LONDON Oct 15 Britain is giving Serbia all the help n its power, freely and uncondition ally. In view of the treaty between Freece and Serbia, said the Foreign Secretary, how can there be any other attitude on the part of Greece towards assistance offered through her to Serbia? In the steps taken, we have acted in closest co-operation. Russian troops are promised as soon as they can be made available. All ilitary measures adapted to meet the requirements of the new situation are the subject of continuous attenion by the military authorities of the Allies, and they will be taken in close consultation with each other. It is not my province to make public any disclosure of military plans, and can only say I believe they will be based on the principles of sound strategy. Serbia is fighting for her nanal existence. With her the struggle is just now intense and acute, but eritory should not suffer. This sit-In whatever theatre of war fighting is taking place all the Allies are fighting for national existence, for all are fighting the same issues. It is a fight or the right to live not under the hadow of Prussian militarism, which does not observe the ordinary rules of numanity in war, and to leave us free from the menace of oppression THE BALKAN PROBLEM.

LONDON, Oct. 15. The diplomatic rather than the milary side of the situation was the subject of Grey's eagerly awaited statement relative to the Balkan sitnation which he delivered to-day in the Commons. I propose to confine myself, Grey said, to a resume of our diplomatic objects since the war. At the outset we desired war should not spread. In common with our Allies, we assured Turkey that, if she remained/neutral, Turkey and Turkey's teritory should nat suffer. This situation was completely changed by the entrance of Turkey into the war. All obligations on the part of the Allies then ceased. We and our allies then oncentrated upon securing an agreement among the Balkan States. We used all our influence to secure an accord. Unfortunately feeling in the Balkans is not one of union, but of ivisions. It was clear that nothing out a decisive and preponderating advantage for the allies would have nabled us to secure a policy of unon. We were given to understand in the course of the negotiations that the Central Powers had offered Bulgaria ore to secure her neutrality than the Allies could in fairness offer. Promses which induced Bulgaria to delare war were given by the Central Powers at the expense of her neighoors without any corresponding atvantage to them. We have remained throughout in friendly relations with coumania, who favored the policy of the Balkan union. This policy has resulted in bringing about the Balkan


