#### PADERWISKI WOUNDED. LONDON, Jan 12

Ignace Jan Paderwiski, the Polish eader, has been slightly wounded by an assassin who entered the rooms of his hotel at Warsaw and fired one shot at him, according to an Exchange Telegraph despátch from Copenhagen, reporting advices from Vienna. Several Bolsheviki implicated in the plot to kill him have been arrested.

#### DELEGATES LEAVE. LONDON, Jan. 11.

The British delegates to the Peace Conference left for Paris this morning. Premier Lloyd George, with the Premiers of the Dominions and the representatives of India travelled by the ordinary route. Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, made the trip by airplane, as he invariably does when he goes to France. Premier Lloyd George's party was accompanied by an army of officials and newspaper correspondents.
