





# Look After Your Books.

HOW TO KEEP THEM IN GOOD CONDITION

Most of us have at least a few books which we treasure-favourite authors. prize volumes and the like-and we are dismayed when, despite our care of them, the gay, gilt binding becomes dim, the covers warp, and brown and yellow spots appear upon the leaves Our books become musty and mildewed because we don't look after them in the proper way.

It may be that our bookcase is tight against the wall. This causes dampness, and breeds bookworms. Bookworms are tiny, wingless

creatures, black and white. Actually they're not worms at all-they're beetles. They worm their way through the pages of a book much as their cousins, the "death watch" beetles bore through wood.

Books, however, are destroyed by other things besides bookworms. Books left on the sitting-room table are thumbed and soiled, and they are spoilt by dust. Rats and mice gnaw books.

The best wood for bookshelves is oak. Oak doesn't warp nor does it absorb damp. The reason why many books are so susceptible to damp is that they themselves are not dry when you buy them new from the bookstall. Printer's ink takes at least two years to dry thoroughly.

If you value your books it is wis to keep them in a glass-fronted case, the shelves of which are lined with chamois leather to save the edge of the books. Also, be careful not to pack good books too tightly on the shelves

Working for Nothing. If you use the push of descending water, and the pull of expanding air, you get the new invention called the "Hydrautomat."

It is a series of closed tanks alternating with a series of open tanks, in all a sort of stairway of tanks, up which a stream of water will climb, step by step, of its own accord. The height to which it will climb depends on the headrace of the sea-tide

of water available. The water staircase, then, is a very simple set of tanks and pipes. 

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
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
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
