The Nichol Township Agricultural Fall Show was held at Fergus, on Eriday, for some years past this Society was united with that of Pilkington, and a union show held alternately in Fergus and Elora. This year each society held its own show. The exhibition in Fergus was a poor one for such a township as Nichol, which contains many enterprising farmers. HE IS RELEASED AND SENT TO CAPRERA!

Escapes from thence and returns to Italy!

ARRESTED A SECOND TIME AND SENT BACK TO CAPRERA!

THE KING OF ITALY APPEALS

London, Oct. 4—The following particulars of the recent movements of Garibaldi have been received. While at prison at Alexandria, Garibaldi persistently, refused to give his parole not to engage in any hostile enterprise against the Papal States. Meanwhile the Italian government, hoping to allay the popular excitement caused by his arrest, gave orders for the transfer of the prisoner to his home at Caprera, without insisting on a parole. The General was accordingly taken to the island, where he was apparently set at liberty. Soon after his arrival he suddenly disappeared, and succeeded in reaching the main land. But his movements had been carefully watched. He was again arrested and sent back to Caprera, where he now remains under guard a prisoner in his own house.

he Assassin Berezowski.

The assassin Berezowski, who attempted to kill the Czar, was taken to Toulon on the 11th instant, to serve out his sentence. A letter writer says:

As soon as he entered the precints of the bagne, the gray and yellow dress of a cellular prisoner was taken off, and the red jacket and green cap worn by those condemned for life was put on. The unfortunate young man was then taken to the prison forge—his feet were already swollen and painful from the long march he had just come off. A heavy chain was fastened on his left leg by a massive ring; he did not appear to suffer during the operation, and quickly rose from the recumbent position in which it is always performed, taking up the chain in his pround. The head was shaved, as is the custom, in squares—that is, one square perfectly bare and on the next the hair is left about half an inch long. In spite of this disfiguring process and the green cap it was remarked that young Berezowski had a certain look of distinction, and even a genile intelligent expression of countenance. One of the jallors who was not aware that his fingers had been injured, asked him what was the matter with his hand. "It was the pistol," he replied; "I was cured in three weeks by the application of cold water."

While his ten companions were having their irons riveted, Berezowski remained quietly in a corner of the forge, and spoke to no one. He will not be chained to another convict, as is usually the case, but will remain in one of the convict's rooms, chained to a triangle of iron, which is fastened to the camp of the prisoner, and through which a bar is slipped, thus preventing their moving beyond the length of their chain In a month, unless the wretched man first turns mad, he is to be sent to New Caledonia.


