NEXT CENTRAL EXHIBITION.—As will be seen by advertisement in another column, the Directors of the Guelph Central Exhibition have decided to hold the Exhibition for 1873, on the week before the Provincial Exhibition at London. Societies arranging for the holding of County Shows please govern themselves accordingly.

REFORM DEMONSTRATION IN SEAFORTH.—It has been finally determined to have the grand Reform demonstration in Seaforth, on Wednesday week, October 16th. There will be a special train on the Grand Trunk, at half fare, reaching Seaforth, at 11 a. m., where and when a procession will be formed, headed by bands of music, and proceed to the driving park.

Mr. Banantyne, President of the South Perth Reform Association, is announced as chairman, and in addition to the local speakers, addresses will be delivered by Hon. George Brown, Hon. A. Mackenzie, Hon. A. McKellar, Hon. E. B. Wood, Mr. Young, M. P., Mr. Hymal, M. P., Mr. Bowman, P. P., and Mr. J. O'Donohue, of Toronto. There will no doubt be an immense gathering, and we hope Perth will be well represented on so interesting an occasion.

ACCIDENT BY A RUNAWAY.—The Fergus Express says that on Thursday Mr. Edward Boggs, Marsville, Garafaxa, in company with Mr. Spies, were looking at a colt hitched to a wagon, on the off side. A piece of paper frightened the young animal, and it jumped back breaking the halter. Mr. Boggs attempted to catch the lines, when the horses started forward and he was thrown on his back, the front wheel running over his head, and the hind wheel passing over his body. The poor man was carried into the hotel and medical aid was called. His injuries are not of so serious a character as the nature of the accident would lead one to infer, and he will be around in a short time. The horses continued up the street and off towards Elora, when they fell down in turning a corner. The animals were considerably injured and the wagon much shaken.

The Reform Demonstration at Mount Forest.

The Examiner says:—"We are now in a position to announce definitely that the Reform demonstration referred to in our issue of the 12th ult., will be held in Mount Forest on Thursday, 24th October. The Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, Hon. Archd. McKellar, and other prominent Reformers have promised to attend, and there is excellent ground for believing that the Hon. Edward Blake, who is expected home on the 15th of this month, and the Hon. George Brown will also be present. As previously stated the demonstration is intended to celebrate the recent Reform successes in Wellington and Grey, and the names of the Reform members elect in these counties will be coupled with the event. The members of the local Reform association are determined to do all within their power to make it fittingly commemorate the victories so gloriously won, and ask the earnest co-operation of all friends of Reform in the neighboring townships to aid them in the effort.

The Spanish Government are sending more reinforcements to Cuba. British officials are commencing to take evidence as to the amount of claims for damages suffered by British citizens during the war.

Fighting duels is at a discount now in France. A man was lately sentenced to 15 days imprisonment for indulging in such pastime.

The finding of an abandoned vessel, with nine dead bodies on board, in more or less advanced stages of decomposition, is reported from New York. The name of the vessel was the Glenaton, and the official papers have been handed to the authorities.

Mr. W. E. Saunders, London, exhibits a large and valuable collection of native insects, and Mr. H. Duffield and Edward Barge, Guelph, also exhibit some very fine specimens. The latter exhibitor also sends a collection of insects injurious to field crops and roots, also a collection of fish, crabs &c.

Mr. Lewis of London exhibits some really beautiful specimens of stained window glass and which commanded much admiration, and took first prize.

Mr. Shaler, Guelph, exhibits a convenient portable upright box bath, which by a simple inside pumping contrivance, forces the water to the top of the bath, which can then descend on the bather either in the form of a stream or shower.



Local and Other Items.

The Ontario Government has offered a reward of \$20 for the apprehension of Fitzsimmons and Lipsey, the alleged murderers of Dr Neenham.

A gang of men in the employ of the Montreal Telegraph Company, are now erecting poles and wires for a telegraph line from Elmira to Drayton, via Hawksville, Linwood, Glenalla and Hollin. In a few days it is expected all these places will be in telegraphic communication with the outside world.

On Tuesday afternoon, the Very Reverend the Dean of Huron, Rev. Dr. Boomer, during his farewell visit to Galt Collegiate Institute, was presented with an address in presence of the pupils. On Sunday last he preached his farewell sermon in Galt, to a large and deeply interested congregation.

DISEASE AMONGST HORSES.—An epidemic, or if not an epidemic, some thing very like one, appears to be spreading amongst the horses in Toronto just now. At present several very valuable horses belonging to different gentlemen in different parts of the city are affected. In its incipient state it presents the appearance of a cold. Fortunately it has not for the present developed itself in such a way as to cause any alarm.

SAN JUAN ISLAND, the disputed territory, is said to be the best sheep-raising country on the Pacific coast. A correspondent of the Puget Sound Dispatch says that many residents of that island have made fortunes by wool and sheep raising alone. There are at present about 100 families on the island, and as a class they are happy and prosperous. They pay no taxes, nor any duty on goods for their own use, and sell what they have for the highest market price.

THE GALT AND DEON RAILWAY.—The Galt Reporter says that "it is useless to disguise the fact that there is a very considerable amount of dissatisfaction existing at present in the town regarding the Galt and Deon Railway. If there are difficulties in the way of the early completion of the Road, let them be known; and whatever those difficulties are, let the people of the town be made aware of them. In fact, a complete report of the whole operations connected with the Railway should, at the earliest possible moment, be laid before the ratepayers of the town."

PARDONED.—The Milton Champion is surprised to learn that Kenny, who was sentenced to be hanged for Rape at the Fall Assizes last year, and whose sentence was subsequently commuted to imprisonment for life, has been pardoned by the Governor General. We never heard of any petition being circulated in this neighborhood, although there were some blank ones sent for circulation, but we understand that the petition was signed by citizens in Toronto, who knew nothing of the circumstances, and was presented by Mr James Beatty, M. P. It is generally considered here that the fellow has escaped well-merited punishment.

The Cologne Gazette lately published some curious statistics relative to the "difficulties" between married couples, and the attempts to conciliate the same made by the "Councils of Arbitration," composed of Protestant clergymen, in the eight oldest of those provinces which form the Kingdom of Prussia. The number of married who found themselves requiring an arbitrator to settle their differences for them was, in 1871, 5,567, being 235 more than in 1870. Of these no fewer than 2,044 were in the Province of Brandenburg, in which Berlin is situated. The mediators were successful with 1,527 couples. At Berlin 240 households were set to rights; 250 of the couples who came before this curious tribunal in 1870 re-appeared in 1871. Let the unmarried consider these things.

MOVEMENTS OF THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—His Excellency starts from the Falls early this morning in order to reach Toronto in time for the yacht-

ing match, though the latter has been postponed from eleven o'clock to noon to suit the time of His Excellency. On Tuesday evening a full drawing-room and reception is to be held by Lord and Lady Dufferin at the Parliament buildings, Toronto. On Thursday morning His Excellency will proceed by special train to London, where great preparations are being made to give him a fitting reception. Hon. In accordance with this request the special train will stop at Woodstock on its way to London, to enable the inhabitants of the former town to present the address. Lieut-General Sir Hastings Doyle leaves tomorrow for Chicago, St. Louis and the west.

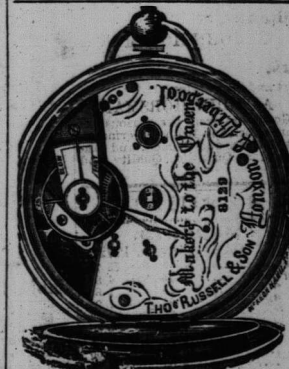

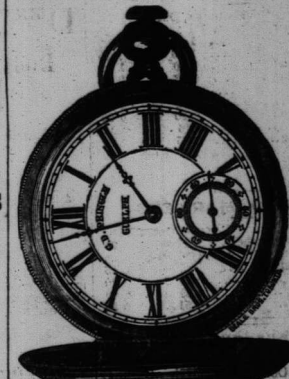
