NO MORE INCOME TAX.

A Five Million Surplus.

London, Jan. 24 .- Parliament is dis solved by Royal decree. Premier Glad-stone has issued an address to his con. stituents at Greenwich, asking for reelection, and announcing that the Queen en pleased to accept the advice of her Ministers to dissolve the present par ment immediately, and to sur new one to meet on the 5th of March, 1874. In his address, Gladstone gives a a reason for this measure that, since the defeat of the Government upon the Irish Higher Education question, by the con-current efforts of the leader of the Oppo position and the Catholic prelacy of Ire and, the Government has not been posessed of sufficient authority to carry out great legislative messures. Its experience during the recess of Parliament has not indicated that any improvement in its position was probable. The chief of the Opposition having refused to accept office on defeat of the Government, and the Cabinet feeling they have not the support which every ministry ought to enjoy, an appeal to the people is the proper remedy for such a state of things. 

That all persons in the said Pro-vioce of Oatario, owning or running any itrashing machine, wood sawing or other machine, which is connected to a horse power by means of a tumbling rod or line, of shafting, shall cause cuch and every length or section of such tumbling rod (except the onenext ich horse power) together with the knuckles or joints and jacks thereof, to be safely boxed, or secured while running, with wood or restal covering, in such manner as to prevent injury to persons passing over or near such tumbling rod, and the knuckles or joints and jucks thereof. The penalty for a breach of the

near such tamblug rod, and the kanckles or joints and jacks thereof. The penalty for a breach of the foregoing is a fine of not less than §1 nor more than \$20, or in default imprisonment for not less than two nor more than twenty days, on con-viction before a Magistrate. No action shall be maintained, nor shall any legal liability exist for services ren-dered by any machine mentioned above if the first section of the Act has not been complied with. All fines collected under this Act are to be paid one half to the complain-ant or prosecutor, and the other half to the trensurer of the school sec-tion in which the offence was com-mitted, for the use of the public school, and proceedings are to be commenced within thirty days of the commission of the offence. This is a piece of practical legisla-tion which was much required, and which was arestre our farming friends will apprecipte and thank Mr. Clarke for bringing under the stiention of the Legislature.


