NEW SEASON TEA.

The "Annandale" Completes a Fair Voyage Under Charter to the Northern Pacific.

After an uneventful voyage across the Pacific, the steamer Annandale, under charter to the N. P. S.S. Co., arrived from Yokohama yesterday afternoon. She brought as cargo 1,800 tons of tea for Tacoma and Portland, not much of her freight being for this port.
