THE SMALLPOX RECORD.

NEARLY THREE THOUSAND DEATHS SINCE THE OUTBREAK.

Only Ninety-seven of the Victims Protested against the Burial.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—The official returns of the health office this morning show 21 deaths from the smallpox epidemic yesterday, 7 at Mount Royal hospital, 3 in Cole St. Louis, 2 in St. Jean Baptiste, 2 in St. Onogene and 2 in St. Henri.

A statement published to-day shows that 2641 deaths from smallpox since the outbreak of the epidemic, 2404 which French Catholics, 140 other Catholics and 97 Protestants. About 1000 were under 5 years of age. A man named Martin was to-day fined \$20 for assaulting a medical health officer reported showed 32 new cases reported yesterday and 24 cases verified.

EIGHT YOUNG MEN TO END THEIR DAYS AT KINGSTON.

Attending Scene in Court at the Termination of the Trial—Secretary, Mr. Justice Ross.

OTTAWA, Nov. 11.—At 3 o'clock this morning the jury at the Assizes brought in a verdict of guilty against Ryan, Burns, Polph, Black and Nolan, the five men charged with violent outrage upon Miss Truman, a respectable young lady, under most atrocious circumstances.

Murtagh, McHugh, Henry Goodman and David Brock were then placed in the dock charged with a similar assault on Miss Bella Graham, who had been offered \$700 on behalf of the defendants not to prosecute. Hon. R. W. Scott in giving the verdict pronounced that the jury had nothing to do with the character of complainant. She was a woman and a respectable one, and the crime was a serious one.
