Uniformity of Elections.

One of the bills to be introduced in the Ontario Legislature this session will be an amendment to the Municipal Act, under which there will be uniformity regarding municipal elec-tions. Under the present conditions, in cities, towns and villages, nominees must file a declaration in respect to qualification before 9 o'clock on the evening following nomination or else have their names stricken from the list of candidates for the ballot. winter feeding is capricious, if not pre carious. It is too much like the wintering of cattle in the backwoods of Ontario, where the shiftless or un-sympathetic farmer kept his cattle alive till spring on maple twigs and buds, popularly known as "browse," and saw them rapidly recover cou-dition after the leeks and cow cabbage became abundant in spring. Alberta seems to be too far north for cattle to thrive their best without a reserve of food to fall back upon, to supplement the grass where it is obtained in in-sufficient quantities, and to replace it when it is not obtainable at all. The ranching industry may in the end

have to give way to the ordinary culti-vation of the land, but long hefore that time comes it will probably pay the ranchman to treat his cattle with enli hrened humanity.' The cattle in-terest in Alberta is enormously great, and is quite likely to become greater as years pass and as true ranching dis-appears before the advance of the the prairie plough and the practice of irrigation. But the experiences of the present season go to show that it is unsafe to leave too narrow a margin between the maximum amount of food that will sustain life and that amount

Our exmayor says he has been here thirty years and never saw its equal in that ime. Unless there are exceedingly good crops next year many will financially ruined as a considerable number of the cattle are frozen to death, and a number of people nearly as bad. Two cars of coal came in Sunday night and by 10 a.m. Monday morning there was not a shovelful lett, and not one person got more than a sack, one quarter ton. Men were there with pails shunting one another around like dogs contending for a oone. Two of our largest stores have ouly coal for another day. The mill is already closed and the schools will have to close unless coal arrives. There is not a gallon of gasoline or coaloil for sale in the town and sugar the same.
