HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

ALL DENOMINATIONS AT BISHOP'S FUNERAL

Order of Procession Announced—Slick Thieves Operating in Hamilton.

HAMILTON, March 31.—Canon Abbott, rector of Christ's Church cathedral, who is assisting in the preparation for the funeral of the late Bishop Du Moulin, made an announcement this morning of the formation of the procession and the station of the different parishes and organizations which will be represented. A cordial invitation is extended through the press to all the ministers of the Christian denominations in the city, and also representatives from outside parishes are expected.

It is probable the order of the procession will be as follows: The choir. Honorary and active pall-bearers. Members of standing committee and lay delegates of the diocese of Niagara.

The bishops and archbishops. The members of the standing committee and the lay delegates will proceed into the church at 1.45. The procession proper will enter in the following order: Christ's Church Cathedral choir. Active and honorary pall-bearers. Clergy. Deacons. Priests in order of seniority. Rural deans. Canons. Sub-dean. Archdeacons. Dean.

The bishops in order of consecration with their chaplains. The metropolitan with his chaplains. The choir will proceed immediately into their stalls.

READY FOR VIOLENCE BUT NOT MUCH SAVAGERY

Striking Defence of Erricone, the Noted Head of the Neapolitan Camorra.

VITERBO, March 31.—Dressed in deep mourning for his brother, who died in prison, Enrico Alfano, alias Erricone, head of the Neapolitan Camorra, the greatest criminal organization in the world, took the witness stand in the Camorrist trials to-day for identification at the hands of President Bianchi of the assize court.

He stoutly maintained his innocence of the murder of Gennaro Cuoco and his wife. Erricone said that Abbate's tale of secrets confided to him by other camorristas was absurd. "Abbate," he said, "was a constant spy of the police. He went into the game having nothing to fear. When I was arrested he took possession of all the camorra's money and sold the harnesses in my stables."

In emphasizing what he called the absurdities of Abbate's accusations, Erricone instanced the gay return from Torre del Greco of the alleged assassins, after the murder of Cuoco, in the company of the gathering of friends at the railway station to say farewell to the man and of their drinking together. "Even," said he, "if we were wild animals, was it possible for us to act like this after murdering a man and while preparing to murder his wife? This is madness which only a criminal mind like that of Abbate's could conceive."

CITIES BOUND TOGETHER BY NATIONAL SENTIMENT

Mrs. Sanford Evans Brings Message From Winnipeg—Care of Public Health.

A demonstration of the spirit of Canadian women was given with striking effect at the dinner of the Canadian and Women's Canadian Clubs last night, so large an audience turning out to hear the noted feminine orators on the program that an overflow for the hungry had to be held downstairs.

All were concentrated in the upper room who were speaking against J. C. Mackay, the president, was in the chair, and he announced the glad coincidence that the Boston Canadian Club were celebrating ladies' night at the same hour. A telegram signed by him was despatched to the American city, bearing the goodwill of the meeting.

Mrs. Sanford Evans, who has worked long with her husband, Mayor Evans of Winnipeg, in the promoting of the club movement, was the first speaker and was eloquent with western Canadian enthusiasm. "Winnipeg is the geographical center," she declared. "It is only 500 miles from there to St. Paul, but our triumph of national sentiment overcomes our sense of neighborhood."

"The great problem of the west is the assimilation of immigration," she said, "laughing in at the various charitable and employment agencies which handle the daily crowd of 1000 newcomers. Our responsibility for the strangers within our gates is steadily increasing," she concluded.

Miss Murrill, principal of the Royal Victoria College, Montreal, spoke on the "Conservation of Public Health," explaining that this was only possible through the conservation of our natural resources for the aesthetic and physical needs of the youth of the country. "No one can look into Canada's future and not wonder at her destiny," she declared. "And no one knowing present conditions in England to-day can help but think of the Titanic forces that Canada must put forward in the future unless great reforms are made. No country has a better chance of learning by experience, especially from the neighbor to the west, with its great industrial entanglements, and her efforts to free herself from them."

"Canada must remove her high rate of infant mortality, for nothing so lowers the quality and quantity of a nation. I will not speak of our other cities, but Montreal at any rate is far below England in advancements along sanitary lines. We must think more of the future, and every thought should be directed there."

Miss Hurlbutt showed that the nation's health must be conserved thru the individual, and the boundless national resources which Canada possesses. Mrs. Evans of Winnipeg made a few general remarks at the close of the meeting. P. Redfern Hollingshead's aria from Piovola's "Martha" and Donizetti's "Lucrezia E Mobile" were much appreciated.

WESTON, March 31.—(Special.)—The Weston Cricket Club at its annual meeting decided not to amalgamate with any other league this season, and will play exhibition games only.

CHURCH FOR RUTHENIANS

Ten Thousand Dollar Site for Oosting-Avenue Brick Edifice.

A site has been purchased by the Catholic Extension Society on Oosting-avenue at a cost of \$10,000 for a Ruthenian Church. It is proposed to erect a brick edifice to seat 800 at a cost of about \$50,000.

G.T.P. PLANS TO SPEND \$17,000,000 THIS YEAR

Over Six Hundred Miles of Branch Line to Be Completed and 140 Stations Built.

Seventeen million dollars will be spent by the Grand Trunk Pacific during 1911 in constructing new lines and erecting station buildings throughout the west. There will be 618 miles of work undertaken on the branch lines and completed during the present season. This will include the Calgary branch, Battleford branch, Melville-Regina branch, Alberta Coal branch, Regina-Prince Albert branch, Moose Jaw branch, and Biggar to Calgary. There will also be 285 miles of main line track laid, as well as 200 miles further grading on the branch lines.

Arrangements are also being made for the erection of 140 station buildings. This is the largest and most expensive year's work that the Grand Trunk Pacific has undertaken. The majority of new branch lines to be constructed will be laid in districts hitherto totally untouched by railway development. Rapid strides have already been made towards completing the main line between Edmonton and the coast, and up to the present 365 miles of steel has been laid. From Edmonton, going west, the line is completed as far as Prairie Creek, which is the entrance to the foot hills of the Rockies, and from the coast working towards the Rockies 165 miles of track has already been laid.

This year the work will be pushed ahead as rapidly as possible, and from Prairie Creek fully another 165 miles will be completed, while from the west end 100 miles are to be constructed.

New Branches. The Alberta Coal branch will tap an entirely new country by running a line from Blockville on the main line thru the Pacific Pass coal fields, as well as those of the Yellowhead and Govin has been made for 63 miles of it to be constructed this year.

Another entirely new branch will be constructed between Regina and Moose Jaw, a distance of 49 miles. Besides all this construction work, a vast mileage of grading is to be accounted for, and this will be carried on to the extent of two hundred miles on the Regina boundary branch and those others which will not be completed. In addition to the above, the company is erecting some of the largest bridges in the west. Over the tied Deer River on the Toftford-Calgary branch, an enormous bridge, 200 feet high, is now under construction. Another huge bridge has just been completed at Prairie Creek on the main line. A third is to be constructed further west over the Athabaska River. Another over the Skeena River, which is to be the largest on the Transcontinental.

Stole From His Father. A very neat theft was exposed when Claude Thomas was convicted in police court yesterday morning of stealing a sum of money from his father while the parent was in jail. He had sent the son to the house for the money, but the young man did not return and when the father got out, the money was gone. The son denied taking it, but had been seen wearing his father's watch chain. Sentence was suspended.

Broke Bones in Foot. Wm. Green, Elm-street, fell 12 feet from a scaffold upon which he was working yesterday at 1037 Bathurst-st. Three small bones in his foot were broken.

OVER 200,000,000 POUNDS

First Time Britain's Revenue Has Exceeded This Sum.

LONDON, March 31.—The revenue returns for the year ending March 31, which were issued to-night, show an enormous total of \$1,019,252,940, or over \$25,000,000 more than David Lloyd-George, for chancellor of the exchequer, estimated in the past budget.

This is the first time that the nation's revenue has exceeded \$200,000,000. Owing to the delay in the collection of taxes thru the house of lords rejection of the first Lloyd-George budget, the two years will have to be reckoned together. The surplus revenue over expenditures amounts to \$28,086,830.

INTERIM SUPPLY BILL PASSES THE COMMONS

Will Refer Bank Revision Act to Committee—Increased Salaries for Employees.

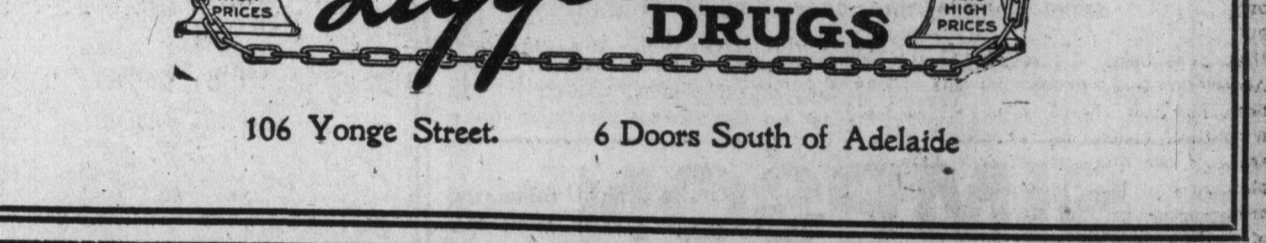

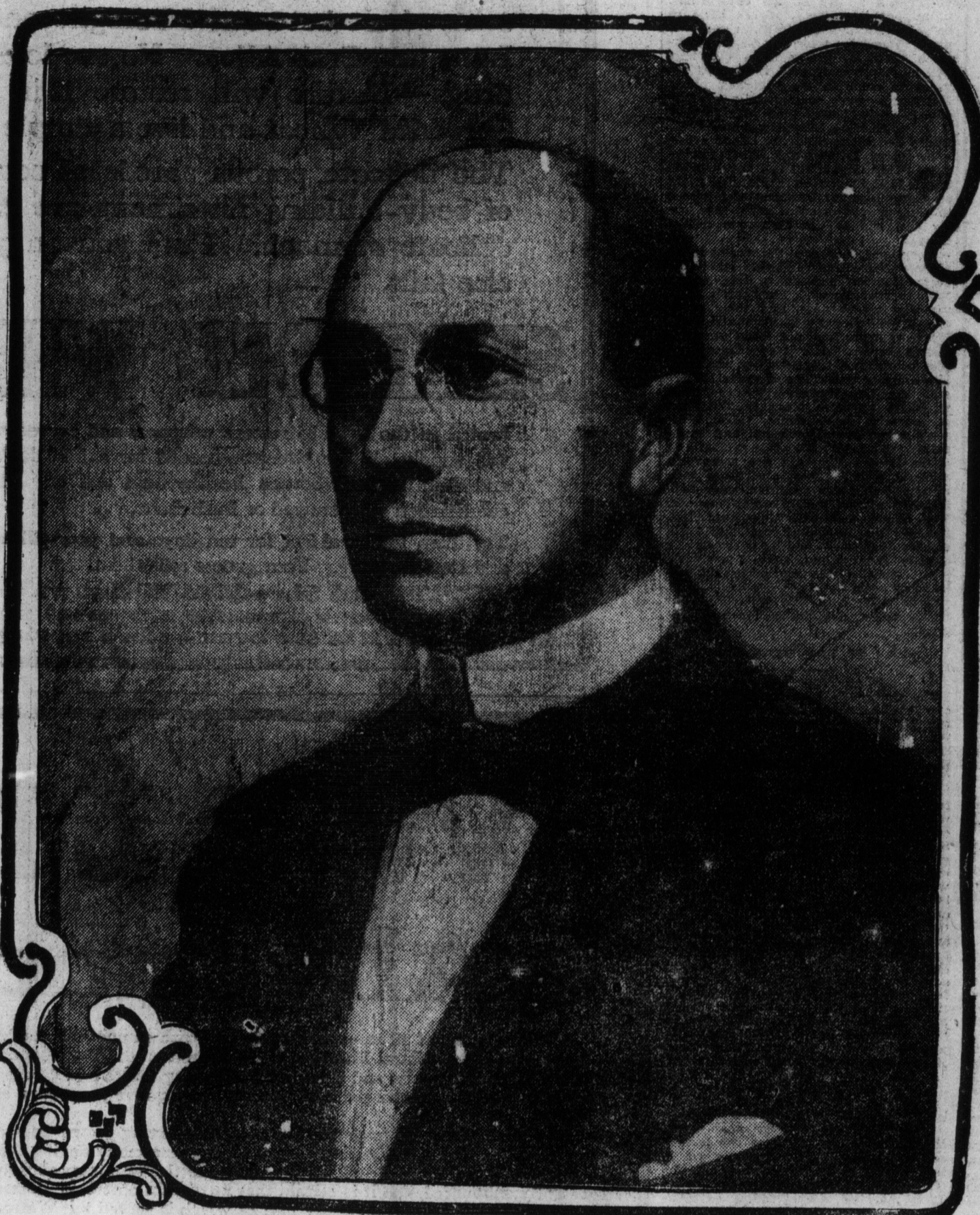

AT THE ROYAL ALEXANDRA.

Madame Kalich in "The Kreutzer Sonata." 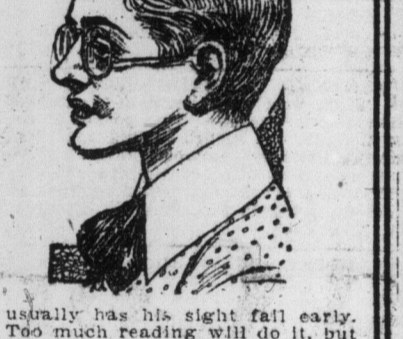

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Natural Reaction is Experienced in Some Mining Issues

Trend of Market is Turned By Underwriting Scalpers

Porcupine Shares Under Pressure of Offerings in Some Instances—Mining Securities Act in Irregular Way.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 31.
The market for mining securities was highly irregular today, and definitely reflected the attempt of speculators to take profits in some of the Porcupine issues which they had bought at lower levels.
Hollinger held its own better than almost any other security in the market, but even in this case the pressure of offerings influenced the price to the extent of nearly 25 points.

Dobie was the weakest issue in the gold stocks, these shares being offered down to \$3.90, as compared with yesterday's price of about \$4.25. This stock was underwritten at \$3.50 a share, and the assumption is that those who got the stock on the ground floor are endeavoring to take profits, unwilling to await future developments.
Vipond was also under the influence of realizing sales, and the price readily dropped to 64, a decline of 6 points from the recent high.

Pearl Lake was the central feature of strength of the market today, and at the close 14 1/2 was bid for this stock, representing a rise of nearly 5 points for the day.

Swastika was bid up during the afternoon session without any reason, and closed at higher prices.

Great Northern, owing to its holdings in Porcupine, was in good enquiry, but yesterday's rally served to bring out considerable stock, and the quotations were lowered in accordance with these offerings.

In the Cobalt little business was done; Trethewey was weaker, but Timiskaming was picked up on the decline, and as few shares were offered, the price rallied a couple of points.

In a speculative way the market is thought to be saturated with securities for the time being, and it will necessitate a little while for a distribution, which will not interfere with the general market improvement.

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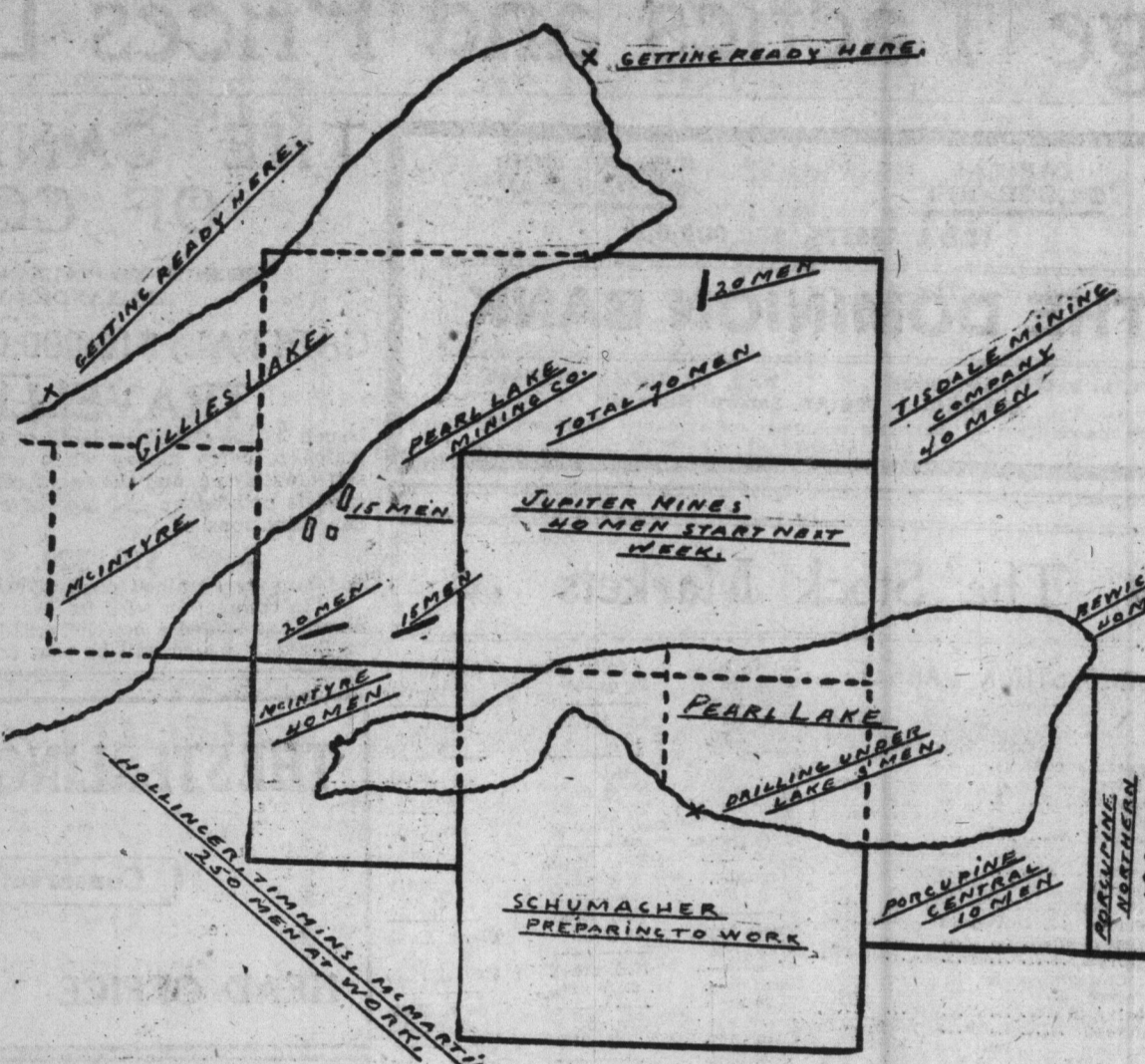

Buying in many issues is good, but in the absence of any attempt at a speculative movement, prices are simply steady.

New York Stocks Have a Setback And No Reason is Assigned

C.P.R. Fools Speculators Who Want Quick Profits—Some Toronto Stocks Are Advanced by Pool Support.

World Office, Friday Evening, March 31.
 A decided break in C.P.R. to-day had no special significance in the local markets, as very little of the stock has been dealt in by speculators on this exchange.
 The undertone to prices was about the same as has been the case for several days, and in one or two instances prices were advanced for specific reasons.
 Sao Paulo was one of the strongest features to the market, the shares rising to 122 3/4, a rally of over a point from the previous market's close, and with a price at the end of the day equal to the high. Special efforts are evidently being made to put this stock up, but it is based on legitimate grounds, and therefore warranted.
 Rio was incidentally influenced by the advance in Sao Paulo, and these shares sold up to 107 1/4, a rise of almost an equal amount to Sao Paulo.
 The only other stock which showed definite strength was Richelieu & Ontario. The campaign in connection with this issuer is still on in the Montreal market, and any buying which is coming into the local exchange is entirely on account of Montreal affiliations.
 Toronto Electric Light was wanted by the pool who are operating these shares, and this stock sold up to 125. Whether this means the movement to sell to the city or a chance of depositing of the proposition in another way is not revealed.
 No general buoyancy was exhibited by the market, and the only evidence of improvement comes by way of such specialties as have been seized upon. Responsible stocks have a good market owing to the low values in relation to money, but no broad movement can be brought about because of the lack of interest by the public in general.
