STRENGTH FOR WEAKNESS.

China Rejects Her Guarantee for a Loan.

THE LEASE OF KIAO CHOU.

Is for Fifty Years Only, Though Germany Wanted a 99-Year Term.

Britain Will Lead China Sixteen Million Pounds Direct, It is Rumored—Lord Salisbury Apparently Has the Upper Hand With the Chinese Government—He Will Make the Emperor Agree to His Own House—Japanese Warships Working With the British—Cable News.

Pekin, China, Jan. 7.—China has rejected the proposals for a Russian guaranteed loan.

Kiao Chou has been leased to Germany for 50 years only, although Germany had demanded a 99-year term.

To-day the Chinese Ministers and members of the Tsung Li Yamen (Board of Foreign Affairs), paid New Year's visits to the foreign legations.

Britain will handle the loan.

London, Jan. 7.—The Standard says it is now rumored that Great Britain will lend China £16,000,000 direct, without the issue of a private guaranteed loan.

SALISBURY IN THE LEAD.

He Will Help the Chinese Emperor to Assume the Throne.

London, Jan. 8.—The Cabinet will meet to-day, presumably to decide about the Chinese loan.

The Standard, in an important editorial, apparently inspired, says: "For the present, it must suffice to say that China has made earnest overtures for Great Britain's good offices, and that Lord Salisbury is giving the closest attention to the matter in its practical aspects. The probabilities point to a settlement, which will be a stabilizing factor in the East, and will be a great benefit to the British empire, which will secure for England advantages the value of which cannot be appraised in any monetary terms."

The editorial proceeds to state that the loan is a necessary condition for the Japanese indemnity and "will thus make the Emperor of China master of his own house, and will enable the Mikado to increase his army and fleet and to render Japan a power which has the strongest western state cannot afford to affront."

The editorial declares: "It is the common policy of England and Japan to bring the commercial development of China into harmony with its territorial integrity, and the purpose of this policy is the cordial cooperation of the United States may be presumed upon."

With reference to difficulties in the way of a British guarantee loan the editorial says: "Happily there is no ultimate dearth of expedients."

Japs Are With Britain.

London, Jan. 8.—A special despatch from Shanghai states that a Japanese fleet of the battleships, 10 first-class cruisers and numerous smaller vessels has received orders to sail for Japan, and that the Japanese Government has decided to support the Chinese Emperor.

The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says he understands that the peculiar form of the lease of Kiao Chou was the outcome of prolonged negotiations between Germany and Russia, ending in an agreement and the mediation of Russia between China and Germany.

The correspondent says: "This happy conclusion of Baron von Goltzow's (German) Foreign Minister negotiations is the cause of universal satisfaction here."

Death of Ernest Hart.

London, Jan. 7.—Ernest Hart, editor of the British Medical Journal, is dead.

Mr. Hart, who was for several years editor of The Lancet, was born in June, 1828. He was educated at the London School and the School of Medicine attached to St. George's Hospital.

His reports on criminal pathology from 1868 led to the passing of the Infant Life Protection Act, and he was instrumental in promoting the movement that resulted in the establishment of the so-called coffee taverns in London some twenty years ago. For the last fifteen years he has been conspicuous for his devotion to social and sanitary progress in London.

ENGINEERS OF ENGLAND AND U.S.

In Which Country Are Better Wages Paid?

—Employers' Federation Strongly Opposed.

London, Jan. 7.—The cable despatch from Mr. A. F. Farrow of the engineering and shipbuilding firm, of Poplar, who is at present visiting the United States and who is expected to return to London on Monday, has been the subject of much discussion in the trade centres from Boston to Philadelphia, in order that they may confirm or refute his observations regarding the higher wages received by, and the greater output of, American engineers, machinists and toolmakers.

When Mr. George Barnes, general secretary of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, was asked to comment on the subject, he laughed and said: "That's right, if he finds the money, we will find the men. We do not object to visiting America being formed. We want the facts."

The Engineers' Society only received 2000 resolutions towards its fund. A report that the society had collapsed was circulated in London, and the effect of bringing Scotch railway securities has later been denied.

The Employers' Federation has been further strengthened by accessions of firms in Leeds, Wigan, Preston and Nottingham.

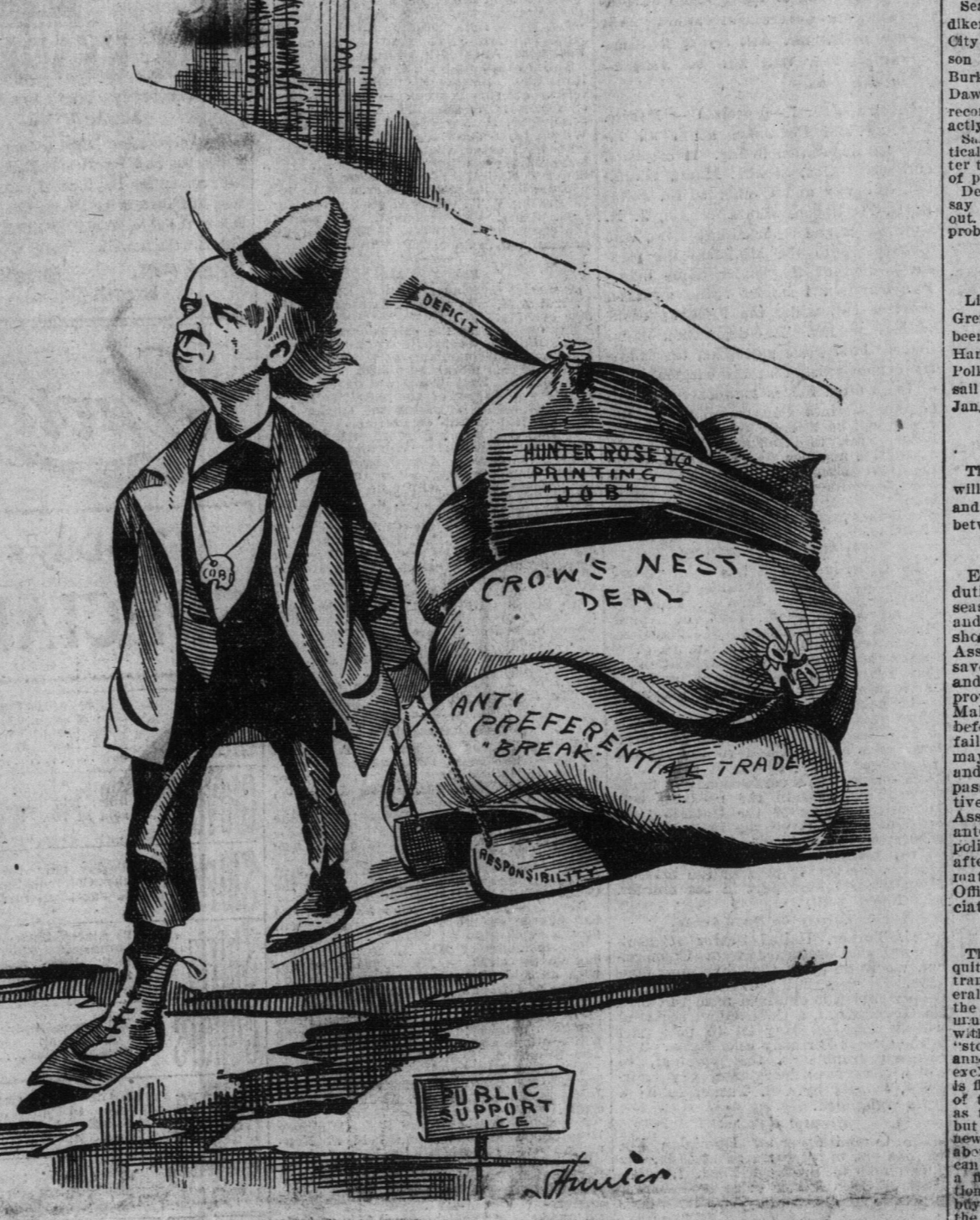

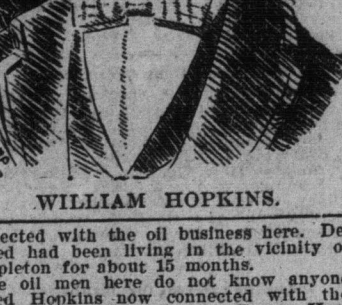

ANOTHER ROYAL COMMISSION

Hardy Suggests One to Look Into the Departmental Store Question.

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THE PIGGERY INVESTIGATION

Strong Evidence in Substantiation of Mr. St. John's Charges.

Thomas Whitehead and Dunn Was All True—The Carcasses Sent to the Central Prison—Dunn's Spots on Them—Thomas Smith, Given Damning Evidence and Sent to the Government Penitentiary—Sa Defending the Employers.

As the Hunter piggery investigation before the Public Accounts Committee progresses the facts brought out grow more and more to prove the criminal negligence of the Government in having sold diseased hogs. The evidence of Thomas Smith and Thomas Whitehead, who assisted at the killing, and of William Newton, who carried the carcasses to the Central Prison, more and more confirm the charges of Mr. St. John.

Under cross-examination by Mr. St. John, Curator Warner of the piggery said that in 1887, he was left for the night on June 15, 1887, to sell his farm in Stormont, only the hog had died of disease and he thought that the disease was inflammation of the lungs. He said that he had seen the carcasses of the hogs in the piggery on the morning of June 15, 1887.
