

# REBELS IN CHINA

Yet That Harmony Among the Allies Which Is Necessary to  
Meet the Grave Situation Is Still Deplo-  
rably Lacking.

Russia Refuses British Admiral's Request to Hand Over the Tien Tsin Railway to  
the English Company—London Standard Calls for Prompt Action—Japan  
Up-to-Date—No News as to Legations.

London, July 18.—(4 a.m.)—While evidence  
accumulates daily that China has long  
been preparing a formidable military  
organization in anticipation of the  
present conflict, and that the state  
of rebellion is continually extending,  
harmony among the allies, which is  
necessary to meet such a grave situation,  
is still deplorably lacking. The Russian  
admiral's refusal to hand over the Tien Tsin  
Railway to the English company, and it is  
rumored that Germany purposes taking a  
serious independent step, namely, to patrol  
the Yangtze with German men-of-war,  
is a step which would be greatly resented by  
England.

In Germany Grabbing, Too?  
Still more alarming news has been con-  
ferred to the Daily Express from Tokio  
to the effect that the apparent reluctance  
of Germany and Russia to consent to the  
Japanese commander for the army corps  
has led the Japanese Government to delay  
the forwarding of the division already  
mobilized.

What the Standard Says.  
The Standard, in a scathing editorial,  
says: "It is useless any longer to hide  
from ourselves the fact that China has de-  
clared war on civilization, and has plunged  
into the conflict with rapid frenzy. It is  
equally futile to discuss whether the hos-  
tilities are being waged by the Chinese  
Government inasmuch as it is evident that  
an administration of some kind exists, and  
is directing the anti-foreign movement. Un-  
less unmistakable evidence compelling the  
Peking Government is promptly forthcoming,  
the powers should treat China as a  
belligerent state, and act accordingly."

A similar line of comment is taken by the  
morning papers. All applaud the  
course of Count Yui Hsien-shan, the  
Chinese Secretary, in stopping cipher telegrams  
from the Chinese Legation in Berlin; and  
all urge the other powers to follow Ger-  
many's example.

Russia Denies It.  
The Russian general staff denies the  
report that the Chinese have captured  
Biogovschensk, capital of the province of  
Amur, and it is reported from Mukden that  
the Russians have taken Aigun.

A special despatch from Tien Tsin dis-  
cusses the number of those killed at the  
capture of the native city as follows: 100  
Chinese, 100 Japanese, 50 British, 40, and  
Americans.

Thousands of Chinese Killed.  
The correspondent who sends this asserts  
that thousands of Chinese were killed, and  
lighting was still going on when his dis-  
patch was sent in various parts of Tien  
Tsin. With reference to rumors that the  
Europeans were working parties of Chi-  
nese at Tien Tsin, the Standard learns  
that eight Russian battalions, which  
reached the Russian lines only a few  
days ago.

Japanese Up to Date.  
A special correspondent of the Daily Ex-  
press at Tien Tsin contrasts the splendid  
work and perfect equipment of the Japa-  
nese with "inadequate supplies of the Brit-  
ish, German and American contingents,  
which are terribly lacking in the most im-  
portant necessities."

Boxer Proclamation at Shanghai.  
The first Boxer proclamation has made  
its appearance in Shanghai. It declares  
that Kuan, the war god, desires the help  
of foreigners, and that the provinces of  
Hupei, Hunan, Peking and Honan have  
specially joined Prince Tuan, and are mar-  
ching overland with their armies to Peking.

Were the Missionaries Safe?  
A German relief column, sent into the  
interior of the Province of Shantung to en-  
deavor to rescue a party of 30 missionaries,  
and their families, has returned without  
having obtained any tidings of their  
whereabouts; and it is feared that  
all have been slain.

Russia is Hauling.  
A special commission is sitting in St.  
Petersburg fully to discuss the de-  
spatch of troops to the Far East.

General Nish Killed?  
It is announced from Shanghai that  
Nish has been killed, but there is no con-  
firmation of the rumor from Tien Tsin.

# CANADIAN MOUNTED INFANTRY LOST TWO LIEUTENANTS, KILLED

Boers Made a Determined Attack on Several Positions Held by  
the British and Broke Thru the Cordons—  
Lieut. Borden's Bravery.

London, July 18.—The War Office has re-  
ceived the following despatch from Lord  
Roberts: "Pretoria, July 17.—Yesterday the enemy  
made a determined attack on the left of  
Pole Carew's position and along our left  
flank commanded by Gammans.

assault the positions, coming in close range  
and calling to the Fusiliers to close range.  
"The enemy suffered severely.  
"They had 15 killed and 50 wounded, and  
four were taken prisoners.

den and Burch), 20 wounded and 21 mis-

LORD LANDSDOWNE'S SYMPATHY.

The native city of Tien Tsin, The Associated Press correspondent at Shanghai writes, under date of July 16, that there is no doubt that the Chinese Administrator of Telegraphs is withholding information as to his position. Massacre Has Taken Place.

The news of the massacre, as already reported, is believed to be correct. It is evidence that the Woo Sung force (at the mouth of the Wong river and ten miles north of Shanghai) are being strengthened and supplied with large quantities of ammunition. It is hoped in London that the landing of 22,000 Japanese troops, which is expected will be effected to-day and the arrival of the troops will enable the allies to reinforce Shanghai.

Legations Were in Bad Shape.

Chicago, July 18.—A dispatch to The Record from Tientsin, July 15 (Shanghai, July 15), says:

A communication was received to-day by the Japanese consul from the Japanese Minister at Peking, dated June 25. It said that all the Ministers were in the British legation short of food, hand pressed and unable to hold out many days.

Brussels, July 18.—The Belgian consul at Hong Kong reports that Li Hung Chang passed there on his way to-day on his way to the north. Before his departure he had a long conference with the Governor of Hong Kong.

Germany Shuts China Off.

FELL INTO BOILING VAT.

The Awful Injuries Received by Charles McCulgan at the Canada Foundry—He Cannot Live.

Charles McCulgan, a cormaker in the Canada Foundry at the corner of Beakley and Front-streets, received terrible injuries yesterday morning, from which he cannot recover. He now lies in St. Michael's Hospital in an unconscious condition, hovering between life and death.

McCulgan was standing near a large vat, which contained boiling water and clay, the top of which is on a level with the ground. In some manner he slipped and, before he could regain himself, fell into the vat. The water in the latter reached his breast, but before many minutes had elapsed he became almost senseless to the pain and would have toppled over had not his fellow-employees gone to his assistance. He was hurriedly lifted out of the vat and carried into the open air. Dr. Coatsworth of East Queen-street was called in and he was wrapped in blankets. He was then removed to the Hospital in the ambulance of the Hospital. On his arrival at the hospital McCulgan had received very serious injuries. His legs, arms and body are terribly burned and for about six hours he lay in a state of unconsciousness. McCulgan is 25 years of age and lives with his parents at 18 Power-street. His father, Mr. Mack McCulgan, is engineer in the Canada Foundry.

Were Nearly Drowned.

A canoe in which they were seated was upset near the water. All three were thrown into the water. After being in the water for over 30 minutes they were picked up by Williams and Connors and brought to the city. After a short rest the three young men paddled to the Point.
