SCHOOL BOARD ESTIMATES. City Must Provide Over Half a Million to Reach the Young Idea to School.

The Public School Board met last night to pass the estimates. The expenditure this year will be \$38,672,911 more than last year. The large made up of increases in salaries. The total amount for school maintenance for 1901 is estimated at \$53,320,715. Of this the Government grants \$25,122,235, leaving \$28,198,480 to be raised by the city.

BLOCKS PUBLIC BUSINESS

Delay of School Board and Other Bodies in Not Forwarding Estimates is Criticized.

IS AGREEMENT BEING VIOLATED?

Electric Light Employees Say They Are Not Paid According to Contract Between City and Co.

Ald. Sheppard yesterday afternoon drew the Board of Control's attention to the fact that the High School Board, Public School Board and the Technical School Board had not sent in their estimates yet, while the law demanded that they must be in the board's hands by March 1.

The Mayor said that it was the case, then the Public School Board had perhaps technical objections to their rights.

Interim Appropriations. An interim appropriation of \$800,000 was granted to the separate school board.

The City Engineer asked for an interim appropriation of \$40,000. The request was referred to Ald. Sheppard and Hubbard.

Electric Light Men Kick. The City Solicitor was informing the board that in the contract with the city and Electric Light Company, it is provided that employees shall not work more than 10 hours per day, or 60 hours per week, and that they shall get 25c per hour during the day and 25c during the night.

What is True Cost? Ald. Lamb said that the City Treasurer's books showed that more money had been paid out for the City Hall than had been stated in the architect's report. Mr. Coady will be asked to bring in a statement of money paid out.

Railway Suits. Ald. Sheppard asked how the suits against the street railway company were getting along, and also how much the company owed the city for street cleaning, and their objection to settling.

Wanted Information. In connection with the by-law that it is proposed to submit to the ratepayers for \$138,000 for new buildings at the Exhibition Grounds, Ald. Hubbard asked for more information as to how the money was going to be spent.

City Hall Notes. A. McFarren in a letter to the Mayor suggests that a simple cross in High Park, that would cost but little in high level bridge at Wilson-avenue Grand Trunk crossing, and keeping on the high level bridge of the railway to the park.

A building permit has been issued to W. H. Hutchinson for 12 attached two-story brick and stone dwellings on Chestnut, near Balmuto, to cost \$10,000.

Committee of the Whole. The House went into committee of the whole on a number of bills. The act to award land grants to the south African volunteers, veterans of 1895 and 1896, again gave rise to considerable discussion.

Mr. Carson thought the next of kin of those who died at Blitzweg or from exposure there should be treated the same as the next of kin of those who fell in South Africa.

Hon. J. M. Gibson said he did not consider the veterans of '95 and '96 on a par with those who took part in the war in South Africa. The bill should be drawn without going back to the deed. After a strong appeal by the Opposition for the bill to be enlarged in scope, the Government agreed to add the minerals to the land grant, but refused to include the pine.

Several clauses in the bill were put over for further consideration.

Hon. J. M. Gibson introduced an act to provide that in mining suits, where the action is brought in Ontario on a judgment obtained elsewhere, the defendant may set up the same defence as in the original action.

That the Inspector of Asylums shall pass his accounts before the High Court of Justice in the same manner as any trustee, guardian or committee appointed by the court.

Some additions were also made to the schedule of fees payable in the office of the Surrogate Clerk.

The Attorney-General introduced an act to make the term "His" or "Her" Majesty in provincial statutes to apply to the sovereign for the time being.

Hon. B. Latchford introduced a bill to make technical changes in the Fisheries Act.

Premier Ross moved that after Monday next government business be suspended.

Anything for Business. Mr. Whitney agreed, but said that rather than not do justice to the business of the House the Opposition members would be willing to return for a day or two after Easter.

The Premier concurred, but did not appear to consider it would be necessary to return to the House on a 12 o'clock recess.

The formal presentation of the Government's university bill was made on the House floor. The House then went into committee of the whole.

Young Man Whirled to Death. Belleville, Ont., March 21.—Richard George, a young man, aged 17, was killed almost instantly, by a falling mortar, on Monday afternoon. He was caught in a belt, and whirled round the shaft with such velocity that many bones were broken. He died in about five minutes after being injured. Deceased was a son of Thomas George of this city.

Jury Assize Court. The suit of William Brock of Thorahill against the Metropolitan Railway Company, to get \$3000 damages for injuries received on May 24 last, was commenced yesterday afternoon in the Jury Assizes. 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NOW APPEAL TO WAR OFFICE

Ontario Legislature Remount Memorial Sent to the Imperial Authorities.

SOLDIERS WILL HAVE FREE MINERALS

Grant to South African Volunteers and Veterans Increased in Value, Thanks to the Opposition.

Hon. John Dryden moved an address to the Governor-General as the Legislature yesterday afternoon to be forwarded to the Imperial authorities urging the desirability of establishing a remount station in this province. The exports of horses to the United States had fallen under the hostile tariff to 1250 in 1900, but Great Britain had risen to 1252. Major Dent had, within a month of landing been able to ship 300 horses to South Africa, and they had stood the test as well as, if not better than, any other horses used by the British army in South Africa. There were 1380 aggregate of 55,812,200 horses in the country; this fell to 36,111,800. Since then it has steadily increased and the last report showed 42,257,517. The effort to secure the establishment of a remount station in Ontario could be advocated, not merely as a selfish one, but in a patriotic spirit.

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
