REGARDING GOOD ROADS

Dominion Division Should Be Established, is the Idea of the Deputation.

In connection with the agitation that has been in progress for over a year to lead the Dominion government to establish a Dominion division for good roads, a strong deputation is to wait on the government next Thursday at Ottawa. Among the members of this deputation will be the wardens of all the various counties in Eastern Ontario, representing the Eastern Ontario Good Roads Association, members of the Union of Canadian Municipalities, whose annual convention will be in session at the time in Ottawa, representatives of the Canadian Warden's Association and of the Ontario Municipal Council, and a number of other prominent citizens will also be represented. Many of the members intend to have their representatives in parliament act on the deputation with them.

While this agitation was first started by the Ontario Good Roads Association, the cities have taken the matter up in the belief that such a deputation would be of great value to them. Every year cities expend large sums of money in the construction of pavements and roadways. It is believed that a Dominion division would take steps to collect particulars showing the cost of construction and durable roads built in the various cities in Canada, but by cities in the United States and Great Britain as well. This information would be prepared in such form as to be available for any city desiring particulars concerning such work. In this way it is believed thousands of dollars can be saved. Many cities in the States are at present experimenting with upwards of fifteen to twenty different kinds of roadways, and find it very expensive. A Dominion division such as is desired could save Canadian cities this expenditure.

Country districts are anxious for a division for much the same reasons. Very few graded earth roads, as well as yet constructed stone roads. It is believed if particulars were readily available to county council members concerning the cost and best method of constructing not only stone and gravel roads, but graded earth roads as well, they would be the more ready to take the matter up. These particulars could be prepared much more easily by a Dominion than by a provincial division.

Urges Good Roads.

The Good Roads Associations throughout Canada are going to urge legislation, but have not funds or means to conduct a thorough investigation concerning the various forms of legislation that have been tried not only by certain provinces in Canada, but by many of the states in the American Union. It is believed that it would be of great value, particularly to provincial governments, if they came to deal with the subject of good roads.

It is also believed demonstrations in the construction of good roads could be given at many of the large exhibitions that are being held in connection with the transportation and engineering conventions to be held in Toronto, and that the Dominion government could be assisted in their efforts to hold large conventions; reduced rates could be secured for railroads for the transportation of such material; classes of instruction could be established in the various provinces as regards the proper method of building roads; and much other work of a similar nature could be carried on. In view of the large sums of money now being expended by the government for the improvement and construction of railways and the fact that money is being expended by the government for the improvement of common highways throughout the country, it is felt that attention should be given to the improvement of common highways through the construction of good roads.

So wide has the agitation become that cities all thru Canada have adopted resolutions favoring the establishment of such a division. Among the cities are Ottawa, London, Winnipeg, Vancouver, and many others in numerous county associations. The Ontario Municipal Association, which represents nearly every city and town in Ontario, passed a resolution at its recent convention in Guelph.

Hon. Sydney Fisher, under whose department the Dominion division is being organized, is said to be in favor of action on the part of the government. The deputation is expected to meet on Thursday next, and it is certain just how soon such a division is likely to be established.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

WORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS (GIFTS NOT FOR CAPITAL)

Schools Cannot Keep Pace With Increasing Population at Toronto Junction.

Dominion Exhibition Closed in Blaze of Glory, 37,000 Seeing the Spectacle.

Trans-Siberian Road Needed Terminus and Russian Minister Had It Built.

London, Sept. 13.—There stands a little to the east of Port Arthur, on the Liao Tung Peninsula, the most remarkable city in the world. It is Dainy, the new terminus of the great Trans-Siberian Railway.

It is as yet a city without inhabitants. Save for masons and workmen its streets are as deserted as those of a decaying village.

In it the Russians are building houses and administrative offices for a population which is yet to come and erecting docks for a trade which does not exist.

Dainy is the paradox of cities. Its growth is contrary to all the natural laws of a city's growth. It was forced into existence, not because men in the course of human progress found it convenient to meet and trade there, but because M. De Witte, the Russian Finance Minister, on the far distant Neva, ordered "Build me a city."

Chinese Did Work.

Dainy is the lifeless body of a city, but throbbing citizens will vitalize it. It might be called the modern city of Aladdin—M. De Witte rubbed "the lamp" and it was there.

The extraordinary fact is that the Russian railway, which has been one of the greatest factors in making Manchuria virtually a Russian province, was possible only by the labor of the Chinese themselves, and thousands of Chinese coolies, engaged in hundreds of Russian colonies, under the supervision of Chinese overseers are building Dainy.

Politically, England regards with grave apprehension the completion of this railway, which runs thru the disputed province of Manchuria. Yet civilization and commerce must rejoice that the Chinese Eastern Railway, as it is officially named, will bring the Pacific coast so much nearer to Europe.

Town Was Necessary.

The Trans-Siberian Railway was a tremendous step toward bridging the gap between the West and East, but it was comparatively useless until the Manchurian section was completed.

It was necessary to have a large commercial town as a terminus and M. De Witte conceived the tremendous idea of building one. Dainy is the result.

To the east its silent streets look out on Corea Bay. Behind, to the west, is the Gulf of Liao Tung, and to the southwest is the Gulf of Pe Chih, across which the Tien Tsin steamers run.

When China leased Port Arthur, the Liao Tung peninsula to Russia she guaranteed that Tollen Wan should be free port. Dainy is the city on Tollen Wan Bay, which is to be the free port in Russian territory.

All Modern Improvements.

Looking into the future, M. De Witte made every possible arrangement for the personal comfort and business success of Dainy's inhabitants.

Drainage and electric wires were laid down; electric light and telephones were installed; parks, gardens, electric trams, municipal buildings, hospitals, schools, prisons, docks and jetties were provided.

Before a single lot of land was offered to the public for purchase, the original estimate of the huge work was \$15,000,000, and it has been exceeded long since.

That Dainy will be peopled and will flourish is certain as anything mundane can be. The harbor is ice free, a great factor for success in North China. Now Chungking, the only other Manchurian port, is frozen fast for more than four months in the year.

Besides, Dainy is a free port; it is the terminus of the railway, and it possesses all the conveniences of a modern city.

Civil Law to Govern.

Nothing of hardship to fear, as if Dainy were an ordinary newly forced settlement. Radiating from the municipal building are new avenues named after the various nations, and at the end of each avenue will be a national church.

The city has been and will be governed by the civil and not by the military authorities. It needs no no prophetic words to see that Dainy trains from Moscow and St. Petersburg, carrying passengers from all over the world, will be along the steamer from Japan, China, America and Australia, passengers and goods having to be transferred to the only a few yards from train to steamer, or vice versa.

PETTYVILLE DROPS OFF.

When the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme first announced it found a bitter opponent in H. J. Pettyville, Liberal M.P. for West Lambton.

According to this week's Free Press, the government at Ottawa need expect no more trouble from Pettyville.

"The Grand Trunk Pacific is one which, having once been entered upon, will be carried out," he said, "and it is important that loyalty demands that it should not be abandoned by the government. Instead of keeping silent on a question that is past recall, let us all endeavor to see how we can help that will relieve the people from some of the unpleasing burdens now imposed upon them by the corporations which control the corporation and other facilities which should be under the control of the state."

Among the questions which demand immediate attention are the following: 1. Taxation, freight and rates. 2. Telephone franchises, rural mail delivery. 3. The settlement of grievances should not be allowed to hinder the passage of the public bill.

FOUND MURDERER'S BODY.

Lynchburg, O., Sept. 12.—Samuel Shaper last night shot and seriously injured Mrs. C. Woodrow while she was being escorted from a party. A few hours later Shaper fled to the woods and a party of bloodhounds spent the night hunting him. To-day the posse found his body in the woods. He had shot himself.
